## BRITAIN DEFINES THE POSITION CLEARLY

China Has Not Yet Answered Japan's Demand for an Apology for Insults Against Her Flag—British Government Promises to Support Japan Diplomatically at Peking—Believed That Japan Has Tactic Support of Russia

London, Sept. 17.—China's acceptance of Japan's demands in connection with the killing of several Japanese at Nanking, is confined thus far to minor points. No answer has been received to the demand for an apology for insults directed against the Japanese flag and uniform or to the demand for the dismissal of General Chang-Guan from the governorship of Kiang-Su province.

Before presenting the demand, the Japanese foreign office sounded Great Britain regarding her attitude in the event of military action being taken, and learned that Great Britain would view it with apprehension, as such action would be likely to encourage the partition of China among the powers. The British government promised its support to Japan diplomatically at Peking, in the demand for

indemnity and an apology, but refused to countenance military or naval action.

Military circles are pressing the government to amend the demands so as to obtain an extension of certain concessions and the right to establish a military barracks at Hankow.

The premier is urging Prince Yamagata and Prince Ooyama, who are members of the council of marshals, to use their influence to modify the militarist attitude.

Berlin, Sept. 17.—A Shanghai despatch says that the Chino-Japanese situation has become accentuated. In Peking it is believed Japan is acting with the tactic support of Russia. The Chinese government is determined to avoid a conflict by all means, but danger lies in Japan's possible insistence in the removal of General Chang-Hsun.

## STOCK MARKET IS WEAKER

Canadian Pacific Took a Dip Below 232 in Today's Trading

The Market Still in the Dark In Regard to Disbursements of Union Pacific

New York, Sept. 18.—Reactionary tendency in our market was produced and mainly brought disappointment. The annual report of the Reading company has made a very strong showing and it is estimated that taking account of the appropriations from earnings for betterments, the road earned a surplus of over 20 per cent. on its common stock, compared with 10½ per cent. in the year ending June 30th, 1912. In spite of this the directors did not take any action on any increased rate or extra dividend.

The Union Pacific disbursements of proceeds of Southern Pacific sales are still a negligible factor. The speculative public is further away than ever for enlightenment on this matter.

## Attendance at the Exhibition Close to 10,000 Mark

Yesterday One of the Biggest Days in the History of Fredericton Exhibitions—People Flocked to the City From all Points of the Compass and Were Delighted With the Big Show—Daylight Fire Works a New Outdoor Attraction—Good Progress Made in Awarding the Prizes

Yesterday saw the largest number of people pass the turnstiles of the Fredericton Exhibition that ever attended a fair in this city in a single day. The turnstiles registered 9,975 admissions, almost ten thousand. Today, it is expected that there will be another big day's attendance, although the rain which set in last night will certainly keep many away. About noon today the weather showed signs of clearing so that the weather is expected this afternoon and evening. The rain was heavy enough to cause a suspension of judging in some of the classes this morning but this important part of the fair was resumed at 3 p.m. The racing program set down for this afternoon has been postponed until Friday on account of the heavy condition of the track. If the weather is unfavorable tomorrow the races will be held on Saturday.

### MANY IN CITY.

Many people arrived in the city today to attend the exhibition. The fine Milltown Cornet Band of twenty-five pieces is here and will furnish music today and tomorrow. The management will introduce new features today and tomorrow. The famous Japanese daylight fire-works which are being shown in Canada this year for the first time will be one of the free attractions today and tomorrow. There is also to be a parade of the horses from the Dominion Experimental Farm tomorrow afternoon.

### FAKIRS CLEARED OUT.

Five Midway shows to which objection was taken were closed yesterday by City Marshal Roberts, who is in charge of the exhibition police. All were games of chance which were being run so that the outsiders had no possible chance of winning and were losing considerable amounts. One countryman lost twenty-eight dollars but the fakir was made to disgorge by the city marshal. Those connected with the show followed the man to get the money again but he was given police protection.
