Laying a Ghost




Deep Mine Shafts

The problem before the large corporation owned plant is to provide that real touch which, by emphasizing the essential community of interests, establishes a sense of unity and fellowship. It can be done only by making this oneness of aim and interest a reality, and not merely the occasion for pleasant speech-making. It cannot be done by reducing wages; it may be done by dividing profits. Success depends principally on an unflinching insight into the needs and problems of the body of employees, and that insight can only be obtained by sharing the problems of management with the men. The degree to which employers are prepared to go in this direction is a sound indication of their earnestness in desiring the removal of the prevailing mood of discontent.—Engineering Magazine.

L. B. C. Phair's Mare Storm-centre of 2.22 Pace and 2.19 Trot—Owner Sent Her to the Barn and Refused to Bring Her on Track Again—Her Driver Tommy Raymond Taken out by Judges for not Trying—Race Went Over Until This Afternoon After Six Heat—Cochato Lady Won 2.24 Trot in Straight Heats

There was lots of excitement at the race-track yesterday but it was of the variety that will not do racing any good. Peter Carroll drove Cochato Lady to win the 2:24 Trot in straight heats, the last being the only close heat of the race. It was the 2:22 Pace and 2:19 Trot that furnished the excitement, however. This race went six heats and was not finished then, the judges declaring it unfinished and setting it down to 2 p.m. today. The sixth heat was run off barely in time to avoid conflict with the rule making sundown the end of a day's racing. The enthusiasts stayed till well on toward seven o'clock to see the last heat.

TROUBLE OVER PATCHEN LADY.

Patchen Lady, owned by L. B. C. Phair of this city, was declared suspended for life by the judges because her owner took her to the barn after the third heat and refused to let her race. This was the end of a mixup which delayed the race and raised some ill-feeling in the crowd. On account of the way the matter turned out, bets on the fourth heat and on the race were called off.

Mr. Phair's mare was driven by Tommy Raymond and was sixth in the first heat in a field of eight starters. She finished in second place in the second heat. The judges then announced that Driver Raymond was removed for not trying to win and that Driver Gerow would take his place. Gerow drove the mare a great heat, winning and giving her a mark of 2:18½. He then expressed a wish that Raymond be allowed to drive the mare again. Raymond refused and Patchen Lady was taken from the sulky she had been using and which belonged to H. G. Kitchen. The ground was taken that the mare was in the hands of the judges and they should supply a sulky for her. There was a long delay while a sulky was being got. When the mare finally was brought to the wire Driver Gerow refused to go up behind her, alleging that her rigging had been changed. Driver Raymond was instructed to inspect the rigging and see if any change had been made. Before he could make the examination the owner of the mare rushed on the track and seizing her by the head

Montreal's Narrow Streets

"Montreal is wrongly built," said Dr. Louis Laberge, Chief Medical Officer of Health of that city. "The streets are too narrow, and do not let enough sunlight reach the ground for the prevalence of good health. The sun is a good decomposing force. If it is allowed to shine on the ground the heat penetrates several feet and in the night it evaporates and breaks up all the putrescent vegetable matter. With our narrow streets this cannot be done. It is certainly a most serious problem for us to face. It cannot be remedied without the spending of much money."

ROUND-THE-WORLD BASEBALL TRIP BEGINS NOV. 19

Seventy-Five People Will be in Party
---Comiskey to Take Fifty and
McGraw Twenty-Five

Chicago, Sept. 17.—Seventy-five persons will go on the round-the-world tour to be made next winter by the New York Nationals and the Chicago Americans. President Comiskey of the local club announced today that there will be fifty in his party when the steamer sails from Vancouver, November 19 and the Gotham delegation will number twenty-five.

Each tourist fare will amount to at least \$1,500 but there will be countless minor expenses in addition. Each player will be required to post \$300 to guarantee his appearance on the ship, but the money will be refunded when the boat sails. Manager John J. McGraw of the Giants, and Comiskey today completed a payment of \$22,400 to cover part of the expenses and on October 10 will make a payment of an equal amount, which will carry the party to Port Said.

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
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
