UNKNOWN ROBBER
CAPTURED YESTERDAY
AT FREDERICTON JCT.

Young American Had Stolen Goods on Him When Captured---Refused to Give Name---Taken to Burton Jail

A young American who refused to give his name was arrested at Fredericton Junction yesterday afternoon on the charge of robbing the stores of S. D. Alexander and T. B. Hartt, also the post office which is located in Hartt's store. Constable Thomas Heenan made the arrest, having been informed by Cyrus Kingston that while hunting for partridge he had seen the man lying underneath some trees near the C.P.R. Demonstration Farm. The young man made no resistance when captured but informed the constable and Kingston that he had been expecting his three companions and that otherwise they would not have captured him so easily.

HAD GOODS ON HIM.

The young fellow acknowledged that he had been concerned in the robberies and the blowing of the post office safe Tuesday night. He was wearing a pair of boots stolen from Alexander's store and had another pair in his possession. He also had a hunting knife stolen from Alexander's. This knife was lying upon his breast when Kingston first saw him. He had buried some more money in a handkerchief and showed where it was
