

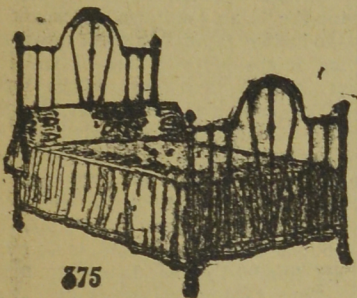

MAY SHORTEN

(Continued from page one.) hoped that its present president, Mr. J. T. Jennings would be heard. Mr. Jennings followed. He complimented the Guides' Association upon the results it had accomplished. Similar organizations could well be organized in other lines. New Brunswick was undergoing marked development but that had just begun. The people of New Brunswick long had been too humble, they had not told of their advantages. He hoped that the campaign of advertising would be carried on to greater fulfillment.

LT. COL. LOGGIE.

Lt. Col. T. G. Loggie, deputy minister of lands and mines, was the next speaker. He said that in the Crown Land Department times were prosperous. The high water mark of revenue had been passed. This, he thought, had been due to increased efficiency and better management. The subject of future tenure of timber-limits for many years, a bugbear in provincial affairs, had been amicably settled. In the matter of stumpage a change had been made which would give the province greater revenue.

Speaking of revenue from game, Col. Loggie said that it was about as large as it had been the year before. The members of the Guides' Association had been altogether too modest in their claims with regard to game protection. Then it had been thought a fad and the receipts from game licenses was only \$2,000. In 1912 from the same source, receipts had been \$52,000.

Col. Loggie issued a warning in regard to the number of game animals. About ten thousand animals were killed in a season now. Soon bull moose would become scarce. He thought the proposition to shorten the season should be carefully considered. He also urged that a game-refuge for both animals and birds be established. Fewer animals must be shot or the season must be shorter. He felt strongly in favor of cutting off the first two weeks of the present game season.

Inspector R. D. Hanson, in a short address, said that in the game districts the game was well protected. Near the settlements it was not. Partridges were going to be exterminated unless better protected. He gave instances of slaughter of these game birds. Protection was a difficult thing to bring about but he believed it could be done.

J. S. Neill was also heard in a brief address, in which he highly complimented the guides.

BILLY SUNDAY STIRS PITTSBURGH

Pittsburgh, Pa., Dec. 27.—Pittsburgh is stirred from centre to circumference over the coming of "Billy" Sunday, who is scheduled to open one of his characteristic evangelistic campaigns in this city tomorrow morning. Pittsburgh is the largest city that the noted evangelist has ever invaded and he has made his plans in proportion. A monster tabernacle has been erected in the heart of the city and a mammoth chorus has been trained to lead the singing. Three hundred ushers have been trained in their duties and one hundred dishpans of largest size are in readiness for use in taking up the collection. While the voices of 10,000 persons have been raised in nightly prayer in preparation for the opening of the campaign, an equal or larger number of persons have been active in opposing it. The opposition, which includes a number of ministers and many prominent church workers, went so far as to seek an injunction to restrain the building of the tabernacle.

NOTED ACTOR SAILS FOR AMERICA

London, Dec. 27.—Martin Harvey, the well known actor, sailed on the Empress of Ireland today to begin a sixteen weeks' tour of Canada and the United States. After filling a week's engagement in Montreal he will make a transcontinental tour of Canada as far as Vancouver. In addition to "The Only Way," in which he has already appeared before American audiences, he will be seen in "The Breed of Tresham," which is a royalist costume play, and "A Cigarette Maker's Romance," which is founded on Marion Crawford's well known novel.
