New York, Dec. 11-The first Chris tmas trees from the State of Mgine, mostly young spruce trees have made their appearance in the local markets and the docks near West street, where the coast schooners from Maine land their fragrant loads of holiday cheer, and loaded down with big stacks of the evergreen trees which fill the surrounding atmosphere with the balsamic odor of the pine woods. From the dock the trees are R distributed all over the city to the various markets and other retailers. Maine contributes the bulk of the Christmas trees used in New York City and it is estimated that nearly \$2,000,000 are spent for these trees every year. As the cost of the trees to the wholesalers and shippers does not exceed \$160,000, there is considerable profit in the businees foe them as well as for the retailers. R Allied with the Christmas tree business is the trade in holly, inurch and mist etce. 

Comparing yesterday's Toronte prices with those of Buffalo it is seen that for practically all classes of cattle prices here were higher than those for the same classes in the tig market across the line. The only exception is common rough bulls, and of these there were a few cars shipped from here to Buffalo No other kinds of cattle were shipped, or are likely to be shipped this week.

Not only the consumers, but so commission men and buyers of cattle are asking where it is going to end. All they know is thaet Ontaria has been undergoing the process of being drained of her cattle, and where prices will go before winter is over none will venture a suggestion, Prices will be still higher, they say, for the simple reason that the cattle are not in the country.
