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WHERE HAS THE MONEY GONE?

Inspired statements in the Government press set forth that the total estimates for 1913-14 were over \$200,000,000, of which probably more than \$175,000,000 will be actually spent by the end of the year. Of course the estimates do not include statutory expenditures, agricultural aid, railway subsidies, provincial subsidies, etc., all of which will increase the spendings of this year to over \$250,000,000.

Including every item, estimates and statutory expenditures, the total spending of the Liberal Government for the year ending March 1911, the last full year of Liberal administration was only \$87,774,198.

The controllable expenditure of the Borden government this year is there fore on its own admission almost exactly twice the amount of the total controllable and uncontrollable expenditure of the Laurier Government three years ago. What have the people received for this extraordinary increase.

Mr. Borden denounced the Liberal expenditure of 1911 as in itself prima facie evidence of corrupt and extravagant administration. Would Premier Borden now please give his personal opinion of the extravagance of Hon. Messrs. Rogers, Hughes, Reid and the rest of the wastrels?

The Borden Government's talking vaguely of an enquiry into the high cost of living, urged on by resolutions of the Montreal City Council and other bodies. The Liberal policy is not to waste time enquiring into conditions which everybody knows to exist, but to take prompt steps to apply the proper remedy by taking the high duties off foodstuffs. It is the historic contrast between Liberal action and Tory inaction.

The Brockville Times (Cons.) recently said: "The common-sense policy is obviously a comparatively small, but effective modern navy for Canada which would in case of war automatically go under the control of the Admiralty." The only difference between this Conservative paper and the Liberal naval policy is the word "automatic." The difference between it and the Borden policy of a \$35,000,000 contribution is just as great as that between the Government and the Opposition. Commonsense must be with the Liberals.

The good old Tory parish of Stanley listened to the empire savers two years ago and voted against a policy of wider markets. A few days ago an American made a trip through the parish in search of cattle which he wanted for consumption in Uncle Sam's domain, but his mission was unsuccessful, not because the farmers of Stanley are too loyal to sell beef cattle to an American but it happened that they had none to sell. They have been voting Tory and selling in the home market so long that they were unprepared to meet a demand for produce from a foreign country. They should now emerge from the wilderness of Toryism and start in raising produce for the larger market which has been made available to them.

When Mr. O. S. Crockett, M. P., becomes a judge we hope for their own sake that some of those Tories who have been making life miserable for him during the past two years will not be brought before him on a criminal charge.

Premier Flemming read the Mail on Friday evening, but evidently overlooked the report of some rather pointed observations made in one of the city churches on the previous evening by the chaplain of the Legislature. At any rate he failed to make mention of it in his letter to the local hack organ.

The people can scarcely expect efficient government from a bunch of kindergarten politicians who are incapable of governing themselves.

Although the new judicature act was signed by the Lieutenant Governor on Friday no mention of the fact has been made by the St. John Standard to date. Can it be that the St. John Tory organ is no longer in the confidence of the government.

The new Chieftain of the Tory party will soon be going about the county making promises looking for county making promises and looking for votes.

Make no mistake about it, the members of the Flemming government are a real happy family.

NO FIREARMS FOR CARSON'S WARRIORS

London, Dec. 5—The British cabinet, by a royal proclamation promulgated tonight, prohibiting the importation of arms and ammunition into Ireland, for the first time grasped the nettle of the revolution in Ulster, which it had hitherto ignored, although the followers of Sir Edward Carson for months had been advertising their military preparations in every possible way and daring interference with them.

Almost simultaneously with the publication of the proclamation, Premier Asquith made the longest step towards the conciliation of the Ulsterites that the government has yet taken by announcing his acceptance of the principle for a basis of agreement which Sir Edward Carson suggested in his last speech. These principles are:

First—That the settlement must not be humiliating or degrading to Ulster.

Second—Ulster's treatment must not be different or exceptional from that meted out to the other parts of the United Kingdom.

Third—Ulster must retain the full protection of the imperial parliament.

Fourth—The Home Rule Bill must not be such as to lead to ultimate separation of Ulster from Great Britain.

Thus the government extends to the signers of the Ulster covenant the olive branch.

The proclamation prohibiting the importation of arms and ammunition into Ireland, which King George signed at a meeting of the Privy Council Thursday, and which is published in The Royal Gazette tonight, was milder than rumors had anticipated it would be.

The only reason given in the proclamation for taking the step is the statement: "Whereas it is expedient that the importation into Ireland of arms and ammunition and other goods, hereinafter mentioned, should be prohibited, therefore," and the proclamation proceeds to specify all articles intended for or capable of being used for military purposes as being under the ban. It exempts, however, arms and explosives designed solely for sporting or mine uses.

The funeral service both at the house and church were conducted by the Rev. C. G. Pincombe, assisted by the Rev. H. H. F. Fausch, an old friend of the family, who preached the sermon from Rev. 14:13.

The large number which assembled at the house and afterwards filled the church bore testimony to the respect in which the departed was held and the sympathy felt for the bereaved family in their loss.

GUERRILLA RAIDER'S 80th BIRTHDAY

Washington, D. C. Dec. 6—Col. John Singleton Mosby, the much-feared chief of the guerilla raiders in civil war time, celebrated his eightieth birthday anniversary today. Of late years Col. Mosby has made his home the most of the time with his daughter in this city. Several years ago he underwent an operation and since that time his health had not been of the best, though he is still remarkably vigorous for a man of his years and continues to take a keen interest in the affairs of the day.

Born at Edgmont, Va., Dec. 6, 1833, Col. Mosby was practising law at Bristol when the civil war began. He enlisted immediately in the Confederate army, and with the exception of a short time when he was disabled by wound, he served continuously until Lee's surrender. The part he played in the big struggle made the Union commanders he harassed wish that he had never turned his attention to the art of war. His raid on the rear of McClellan's army on the Chickahominy was as bold a bit of enterprise as may be read in the history of warfare.

Mosby's famous "rangers" were as picturesque and brave cavalier a lot of fighters as ever went to war. No body of Confederate soldiers were feared as were Mosby's men, and the colonel was their genius. After Apomattox Col. Mosby disbanded his troop and gave himself up, and upon the recommendation of Gen. Grant was released on parole.
