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THE SEAT WAS STOLEN

At Joliette, Quebec, on Saturday, Sir Wilfrid Laurier spoke in no uncertain sound as to the Liberal party's intentions respecting Chateaugay. Here are his own words: "We were defeated," he declared, "but we are not disheartened. My courage is the same in victory or defeat and when I said that we were defeated I was mistaken, the county was stolen from us."

"The ministerial press has told you—members of the government have said—that the result in Chateaugay was a glorious one for the Conservative party, that it means a ratification by the people of a contribution to England. There are people who have the effrontery to tell you that the result in Chateaugay means so little the ratification of the government's naval policy that the elected candidate, Mr. Morris, had not the courage to defend it. Mr. Morris never had any wish to defend the Borden naval policy and if the result is a glory unto the Conservative party, if electoral debauchery and demoralization of an electorate are a glory, let us bow down before them. The government are entitled to glory."

"The Chateaugay result was no triumph for the Conservative party. It was a triumph for electoral demoralization. It was a triumph of theft. It was a triumph of vile instincts directed by skillful hands. Had we been fighting a general election the result would have been different. Had we been in a general election, Mr. Fisher would have been elected by two hundred of a majority for the government would not then have been able to concentrate all the demoralizing forces it was able to concentrate on a by-election. To say that the Conservative party were victorious in Chateaugay, would be just as true as it would be to declare that the revolt of the angels in Paradise was a triumph for Archangel Gabriel and not for Lucifer."

"Chateaugay, was won by fraud and corruption and by nothing else. I am making serious statements," Sir Wilfrid continued, "I recognize my responsibility but what I say I affirm and we shall be able to prove it to you when the time comes. If there are any Conservatives here let me say this to them: You may carry one bye-election; you may carry two or three bye-elections by scandal, demoralization and debauchery, but you are making way for the downfall of your country."

"We have free institutions and I wish to maintain them. I was beaten in 1911 and no one has heard me make accusations. I yield to the majority, although, as I have stated before, a majority may be wrong. But I say that it is the duty of every honest man to rouse himself and lay violent hands on those whose desire it is to corrupt elections."

"Let it be the work of the Liberal party to make a stand against the corrupter, to see that light is thrown on what was done in Chateaugay. I am sure that honest men will be on our side and desire to see the triumph of principles rather than of corruption."

Commenting on the above The Toronto Globe says:

"Sir Wilfrid Laurier has always been noted for refusing to talk scandal unless the facts warranted. When, therefore, he says that Chateaugay was won by fraud and corruption and by nothing else, and that he will be able to prove this when the time comes, the people of Canada may trust him to see that the protest is pushed in the courts and the guilty punished."

Having retired Sir Wilfrid Laurier and sent Mr. F. B. Carvell, M.P., to the west, the local organ of Toryism should now devote some attention to the affairs of its own party in this constituency. For instance, it might enlighten the public as to why Mr. O. S. Crockett, M.P.; Mr. J. K. Pinder, M.P.P.; Dr. O. E. Morehouse, M.P.P., and Mr. C. H. Thomas, president of York Conservative Association, refused to have anything to do with the polymorphian parade, organized in connection with Col. McLeod's return from the Old Country.

In the event of Mr. O. S. Crockett, M.P., landing a judgeship or its equivalent, Col. McLeod will be the Tory candidate for Ottawa. It was with a view of facilitating matters along this line that the Guthrie parade and fireworks display was pulled off on Tuesday evening.

Discussing the election in East Middlesex The Toronto Globe says:—"The falling off seems to have been largely in the Conservative farmers' vote, which was evidently not so friendly to Mr. Glass as to the late member. The energetic personal canvass conducted by Mr. Fisher appears to have had more influence than the very effective organization of the Conservatives. If a majority of a thousand would have been regarded by the ministers who swarmed into the riding as an endorsement of Mr. Borden's naval policy, it can reasonably be argued that a reduction of almost three hundred in the majority of 1911 is an indication that the electors of East Middlesex think a good deal less of the Borden trade and defence policies than they did two years ago."

Premier Sifton brought down his budget in the Alberta legislature last week. He announced a revenue of \$5,272,175, an expenditure of \$5,164,390 and a surplus of \$108,145. The surplus from the government telephone system during the year was \$100,000 and the announcement was made that \$1,000,000 would be spent on extensions during the coming year. Another million dollars is to be expended on trunk roads, bridges and drainage. It is scarcely necessary to add that Alberta is blessed with a Liberal government and it is a most progressive one.

The graft element of the Tory party in York, who organized the "demonstration" in Col. McLeod's honor Tuesday evening, are determined that Mr. J. K. Pinder, M.P.P., shall not have a chance to write M.P. after his name. It is just possible however, that certain of the electors who are not feeding at the public trough may have some say in the matter.

Toronto Globe:—Sir Wilfrid got rid of about a third of our tariff on taking office. He since got rid of more of it and went out of office trying to get rid of still more. His announcement at Joliette that we must get still more relief is an attitude that should be endorsed by the Canadian electors.
