BARNEY DREYFUSS PROPOSES INTER-LEAGUE SERIES FOR AUTUMN

Thinks Thirty-two Games Could be
Played Before World's Series---
National League Will Consider

Pittsburg, Oct. 21.—Barney Dreyfuss the owner of the Buccaneers, has a very important suggestion to make to the other magnates of the National League at their meeting in December, and if the plan is accepted by his fellow club owners in the old circuit and later approved by the American League men, a big interleague series, bringing all the clubs of both leagues together, will be staged at the close of the 1914 season.

The Pittsburg magnate wants to have the regular seasons close on August 31 and fill out the month of September with a special series in which each club of each league will meet the eight teams of the other league. Thirty-two games are proposed for each club.

"I have been thinking out this plan for some time," Mr. Dreyfuss said today, "and I am going to suggest it at the coming meeting of the league. I have no doubt that I can convince most of the other club owners that it would be well to give the thing a trial.

"It looks to me as if a special series of thirty-two games, each club playing two games at home and two abroad with each team in the other league, would meet with the approval of the public and prove a popular attraction, in addition to being far more profitable to the club owners than is the present system.

"I do not mean that the World's Series should be abolished. Let that stand, just as it is now, the two pennant winning clubs of the regular season to come together for the world honors after the close of the interleague all-round series.

"I believe a chance to see all the clubs of the other league would keep up enthusiasm here during September and the same might hold good for all other cities.

"As things are at present, only the pennant winning clubs and the second clubs make profits that can be called fair. If my plan is adopted it will give the other six clubs in each league a chance to increase their receipts and at the same time provide patrons with a new form of baseball entertainment which I believe they will appreciate."

Dreyfuss stipulates in his plan for the interleague series that the players shall receive no extra money above their salaries during the series of games.

The regular line-up of the Wanderers' forwards were present with one exception, but they were not at their best after Saturday's game. Bauld, Medcalf, Wood and DesBrisay were the best of the Wanderers; Welton, Andrews, Archibald and Kitchen excelled for the visitors.

"The game was too scrappy for Rugby football; there were players on both sides ever ready to retaliate. There were also too much tripping and interference. Lieut. Germaine, who is such a splendid referee, had a busy time in refereeing a game of the style of play which prevailed, as well as many offences for rough play. These outbreaks, though not of any great duration, became so numerous that just after the visitors scored for the last time the referee called the game when two players began a rough and tumble, though there were some words to play."

Some Changes Expected

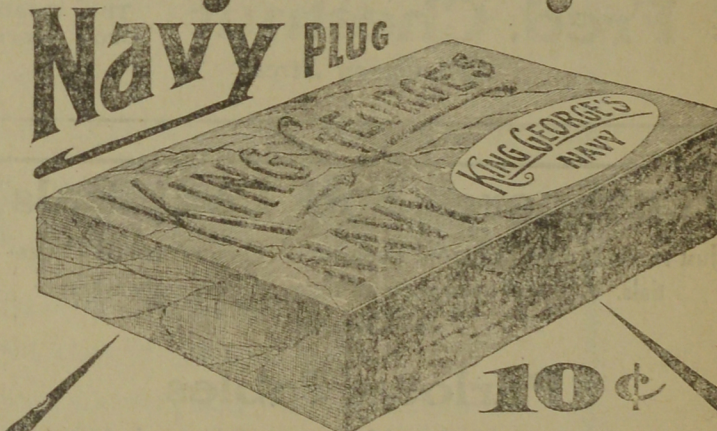

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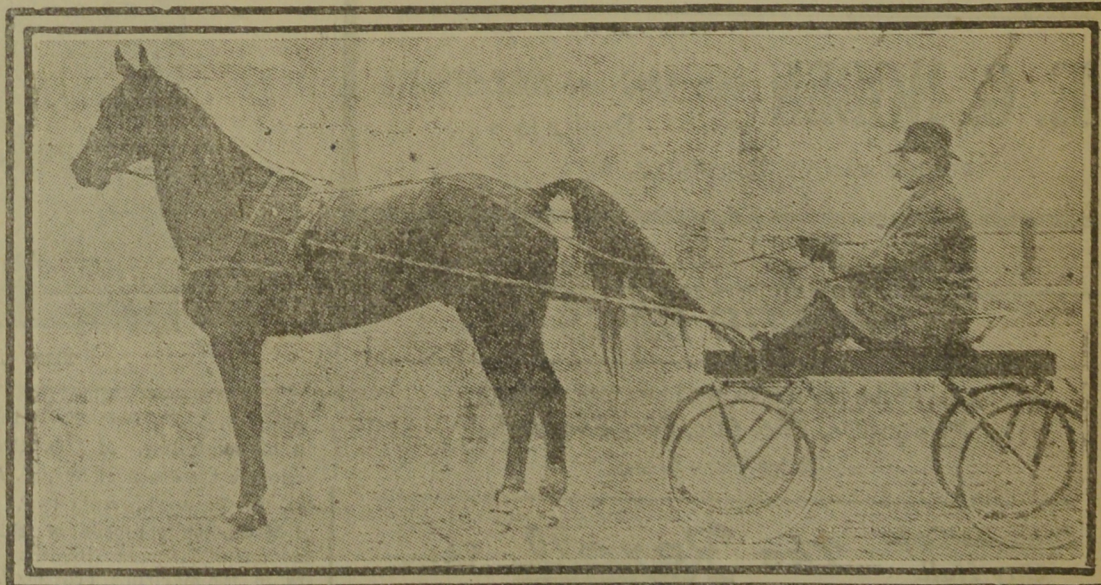
