DIED AT GRAND FALLS.

Mrs. Joseph Powers of Grand Falls, died very suddenly last night. She leaves a husband and one brother, Frank, of Grand Falls. She is well known in Fredericton.

DYNAMITERS FINED.

DIED IN ST. JOHN

Alfred Elliott formerly of this city but late of St. John, died in the General Public Hospital in that city on Tuesday after a brief illness. He was about twenty-eight years of age. The funeral took place yesterday afternoon and interment was made in Fernhill Cemetery.

WORKING ON MASONRY.

The crew of the Foundation Company Limited, is now laying the granite masonry of the draw-span pier of the highway bridge, the concrete base having been completed. The work is being done inside the coffer-dam. It is expected that the sunken span will be removed this week.

RENTS "FROGMORE."

It is announced that Lt.-Col. Belton, P.A.M.C., medical officer of No. 3 Station, R.C.R., has rented "Frogmore" for the winter. Since coming to Fredericton Lt.-Col. Belton and family have occupied the Brunswick Street Baptist Parsonage but with coming of Rev. Mr. Newcombe to assume the pastoral duties, the parsonage will be occupied by the pastor.

ELECTED COUNCILLOR.

At the councillor's election in the Parish of Grand Falls, Victoria county, which was held on October 21, G. LeBaron Anderson led the poll with 63 votes. Councillor B. Radeout got 57 votes and Councillor W. Murdochson 48. Mr. Anderson is a son Mr. John Anderson, ex-M.P.P., of The Barony, York county, and has only been residing in Victoria county a short time.

DEATH AT KINGSCLEAR

The death of Mrs. Duncan Cox, occurred yesterday at her home in Kingsclear at the age of sixty years. Five children survive. The sons are George F. Cox of Kingsclear and Douglas W. Cox of Presque Isle. The daughters are Mrs. Frank McArthur, of Springfield and the Misses Annie R. and Nora M. Cox at home. The funeral will take place Friday at 2 p. m. Rev. Mr. Flemington will conduct the service and interment will be made at the family burying ground Kingsclear.

BURIED LIQUOR IN SAND

The C. P. R. station at Caribou was broken into on Sunday and two barrels of liquor were stolen. Special Policeman A. R. Foster was sent on the case. A man living near the station was suspected, and on investigation the liquor was found buried in sand in the cellar of the suspect's home. The arrest of Elmer Cochran followed. He was brought before Trial Justice Robertson on Monday and was bound over to appear before the circuit court in Houlton on the second Tuesday of November.

HIS WORK COMPLETED

Mr. C. O. Foss, district engineer of the Transcontinental, arrived in the city last night and went to Gagetown this morning over the Valley Railway. He reports that all of the work in connection with the Transcontinental in this province has been completed and that the St. John offices will be closed on Oct. 31st. Mr. Foss who has superintended the work in this province has every reason to feel proud of the result of his labors. He has built a railway which will compare favorably with any line on the North American continent.

GEORGE McDADÉ
HAS RESIGNED
PUBLICITY AGENCY

Will Take up Study of Law at Dalhousie University--Publicity Committee Will Arrange to Continue Publicity Campaign

George M. McDade, who has been publicity commissioner of Fredericton for about a year and a half, has resigned the office and will leave next week to take up the study of law at Dalhousie University, Halifax. As Fredericton's first publicity agent, Mr. McDade has proved himself efficient and energetic and it is to the great regret of the Publicity Committee of the Board of Trade and City Council that he has seen fit to resign. Mr. McDade has also made a large number of close friends during his residence here and all regret his departure.

The Publicity Committee met last night and at Mr. McDade's urgent request, relieved him of the contract into which he had entered and which would not expire until next spring. The committee also discussed the continuation of the publicity work and decided that temporary arrangements should be made and something permanent decided upon at a later date.

Mr. McDade has been writing examinations as a student-at-law this week. On Monday next he expects to leave for his home in St. John and from there will go to Halifax to attend law school.

C.P.R. STOCK.

At 3.30 o'clock this afternoon C.P.R. stock was selling at 227½. Fredericton holders of new stock issued by the company paid their last instalment on Wednesday.

THIRTY MILES
SAVED BY PROPOSED
NEW C. P. R. LINK

Direct Line, Prince William Station to Moncton Via Fredericton and Chipman Would be Shorter Than Present Route

Rumor has it that Fredericton will be placed on the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway in the not distant future. This would be done by building a short connecting link between the present C. P. R. main line and the St. John and Quebec Railway west of this city and by the securing of running rights over the National Transcontinental Railway between Moncton and Chipman and over the St. John & Quebec Railway to Long's Creek or some adjacent point. Such a line would be approximately thirty miles shorter than that via St. John which now is followed by the C. P. R. and would have the additional advantage of requiring running rights over a shorter trackage.

The scheme of having a route via Fredericton and Chipman was to the fore twenty or twenty five years ago when the Harvey Short Line was surveyed. That proposed railway was to leave the C. P. R. at Harvey station, strike the St. John river near Lower Prince William, follow the river to Fredericton and proceed to Moncton via Chipman. With the building of the National Transcontinental Railway line from Moncton to Chipman was constructed and is now under operation.

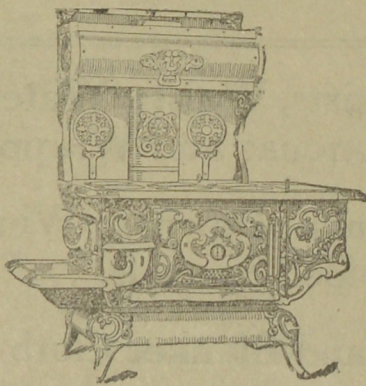

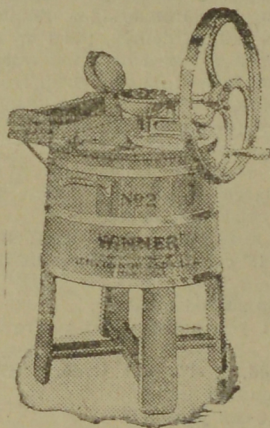
