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## NOVA SCOTIA LIBERALS WORKING FOR VICTORY

Hon. H. R. Emmerson Billed to Speak in Truro---Will be Supported by A. K. McLean M.P.--Mr. Carvell Pleased with Guysboro Roads

Truro, N.S., Oct. 8.—There is to be a Liberal revival in Colchester county this autumn. Active work toward getting ready for the next election has commenced. The willingness of prominent men among Sir Wilfrid Laurier's following to give assistance inspires our local men. They have got started—and well started. They propose continuing their efforts to an extent that will earn the reward expected—that of overtaking the losses of the past and placing Colchester again in the van of Liberalism.

The first meeting of a series to be held this month in this county has been fixed for Wednesday evening, October 15th, at eight o'clock, in Academy Hall, Truro. The topics to be dealt with will be Reciprocity and the United States Tariff, giving the differences between reciprocity as proposed by Ex-President Taft and the Tariff Bill as proposed by President Wilson; the Laurier naval scheme vs the Borden naval contribution and the Intercolonial; what its loss would mean to the Maritime Provinces if absorbed by the C.P.R. or the Canadian Northern.

The first two subjects will be taken by local speakers and Hon. A. K. Maclean, M.P. for Halifax, and the

third by Hon. Henry R. Emmerson, M.P. The railway question discussed by one who has made so great a study of it as has been made by Mr. Emmerson will doubtless attract very widespread attention. The attitude of the great railway corporations towards the control of the road both as to ownership, running rights freight and passenger rates, management and development, is clearly understood by Mr. Emmerson and every instance of the influence of the company railways in connection with the attempt to deprive the people of the Maritime Provinces of these rights to the control and operation of the railway as contained in the compact of Confederation will doubtless be fully described and illustrated. Arrangements are now being made for other meetings, of which information as to dates and places will be given out later.

#### MR. CARVELL'S VISIT.

Among visitors to Truro on Tuesday were Mr. F. B. Carvell, M.P., registering at the Stanley from Woodstock, N.B. Mr. Carvell had arrived in the morning from Eastern Nova Scotia, where he had been making

addresses on current political topics. Mr. Carvell described another meeting held in Canso on Saturday, at which Mr. Sinclair, Mr. Carroll and Mr. Tory, one of the local representatives, were also in the list of speakers. The meeting was held in the rink building and upwards of two thousand persons were present. Mr. Carvell said that he never witnessed a more enthusiastic gathering and that everywhere the fullest confidence seemed to be placed in the Dominion and Provincial representatives of Guysboro.

#### GOOD ROADS IN GUYSBORO.

During a short conversation, Mr. Carvell described how the road question in Nova Scotia had been practically solved by Mr. Tory in Guysboro county. Between Guysboro, and Canso is a stretch of thirty miles of newly made road which is a model of its kind for a dirt road. In a measure the soil and rock conformation in many parts of the county are favorable. With the aid of road machines by draining and placing vitrified tile culverts, faced with concrete, and by carefully grading and surfacing with material suitable for long-time wear Mr. Tory had in two years obtained the construction of fully one hundred miles of as good road as any autoist would ask for. This meant a great deal for the County of Guysboro and the example might well be followed by other counties in this province. The money granted was, in Mr. Tory's case, particularly well expended, spent so much better and not wasted as was common in the Province of New Brunswick, where road commissioners were given rather as a recompense for some political service rendered than to be expended on actual road making.

#### NOVA SCOTIA LEADERSHIP.

Mr. Carvell took note of the plan of permanent road making which is to follow the construction of concrete culverts along the lines of the principal highways as projected under Premier Murray's legislation last winter. He said it placed Nova Scotia more in the lead as a fore-handed and progressive province and tended to exhibit the intelligence of Nova Scotians generally, quite as much indeed as progressive educational schemes had gained for this province the praise of all who came in contact with her people.

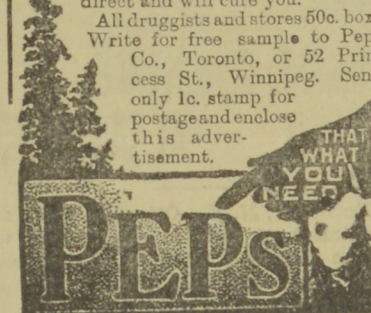

### A TITLED SHERIFF

Lt.-Col. the Hon. H. Aylmer, of Sherbrooke of Distinguished Family

Lieut.-Col. the Hon. Henry Aylmer, sheriff of the district of St. Francis, Que., into whose custody Harry Thaw came when that troublesome young man slipped across the border, was well known in Canadian politics nearly 40 years ago. He sat in the Dominion House of Commons as Liberal M.P. for Richmond and Wolfe, from 1874 to 1878, when he lost his seat. He was defeated in 1880 when he contested Richmond for the Quebec legislature, and in 1896 he was an unsuccessful candidate for Sherbrooke in the Dominion House. Earlier in his career he served 12 years in the Royal Marine Artillery. On returning to Canada he was called to the bar and practised his profession for many years at Melbourne, Que. In 1877 he commanded the Canadian Wimbledon rifle team. The year before he had organized the Richmond Field Battery of Artillery, and commanded it until 1887, when he retired from the service with the rank of Lieut.-colonel. In 1900 he was appointed sheriff.

The first Lord Aylmer, a distinguished naval officer in the reign of James II., was elevated to the peerage of Ireland as a reward for his professional services. The 5th baron was a general in the army, and commanded a brigade under Wellington in the Peninsular War. In 1828 he was appointed Governor-General of Canada, and held the appointment nearly five years. He died in 1850, and was succeeded by his brother Frederick, 6th baron, who died unmarried in 1858. The title then went to Mr. Adolphus Aylmer, a third cousin of the 6th baron, who resided at Melbourne, Que. Adolphus, who was born in 1814, accompanied his father, Capt. John Aylmer, R.N., to Canada during the governorship of the 5th Lord Aylmer, who was a second cousin of Captain John (the latter being son of Rear-Admiral John, and grandson of Rev. John, who was a son of the second baron). The young man remained in Canada, and when he was 23 years old, served in the Canadian militia during the rebellion of 1837. He retired as Lieut.-colonel in August, 1894. He survived until 1901, when he was succeeded by his eldest son, Colonel the Hon. Matthew Aylmer.

The present Lord Aylmer was inspector-general of Canadian militia, and retired in 1907 with the rank of major-general.
