CHATEAUGUAY

Manitoba methods as engineered by Hon. Bob Rogers, the prince of political cracksmen, have carried the day for the Tories in the County of Chateauguay, the by-election on Saturday having resulted in the return of Mr. James Morris, Conservative, over Hon. Sydney Fisher, Liberal, by a majority of 140. The Tory plan was to rush the constituency and carry it at all costs and it has succeeded. The county has been Liberal since Confederation but at the general election two years ago the late Mr. Brown's majority over Mr. Morris, the victor of Saturday, was only forty-three. By the aid of government patronage and lavish promises of public works, together with an unlimited supply of rum and money, the Tory candidate succeeded in making an overturn of one hundred votes.

When Hon. Bob Rogers left Ottawa for Chateauguay a short time ago it was announced that he would leave nothing undone to secure the return of the Tory candidate. He decided that a breakwater was needed on the Chateauguay River and at once set a large crew of men at work on the job. A correspondent of The Toronto Telegram, an independent Conservative paper, who visited the riding, sized up the Hon. Bob's activities as follows in a despatch to his paper:

"And then there is the big issue of 'Public Works.' For long years the riding returned Mr. Brown, the late member. He had close shaves but he always got in. The Liberal administration never thought it necessary to bribe the electorate of Chateauguay with public works; it was always a practical certainty that the Grit candidate would bob up serenely. Under the Laurier regime Chateauguay's virtue was its own reward—public money went to the doubtful ridings. "But just at present Chateauguay basin is a busy scene. Since the glacial period the river of that name, under the dispensation of Providence, has been overflowing its banks each spring. Every time the vernal sun melts the ice-jam a considerable part of the riding is inundated. Along comes Hon. Robert Rogers, now minister of public works. Hon. Bob will tackle anything, even Dame Nature. He will dam anything, even the Chateauguay River. So the riding, which has been neglected for many years, is bound to take notice of the two hundred men in rubber boots who at generous pay march up and down the river seeking some way to ward off the springtime floods. The Chateauguay by Rogers and his 'gumshoe brigade' as busy a scene of governmental industry, as was the Newmarket Canal in September 1911. 'By their works ye shall know them,' said the good book. By the public works you may speculate on the present election."

Tory papers all over Canada will boast of the victory won in Chateauguay by Rogers and his "gumshoe brigade" but they are welcome to all the comfort they can get out of it. One swallow does not make a summer and the fact that the Tories have been able to bribe a constituency into changing its political allegiance is not going to discourage the Liberals or cause them to swerve from their course. Under the leadership of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the greatest of Canadians, the fight will go on and there will be no let up until the Tory-Nationalist combination now misruling Canada, is hurled from power.

Discussing the Home Rule question in the Boston American Mr. C. O'Connell Galvin says:

"The real forces that are fighting home rule are silently organizing with a war fund whose limit is the skies. The purse-proud landlords, fighting in the last ditch for their vanishing privilege and their century-worn ascendancy; the wealthy brewers and distillers who dread the Irish Parliament and its possible laws for local option in the cities and towns, which would break forever the Czar-like grip of the whiskey and porter barons of the country; the double-eyed sweaters of the Belfast linen mills, who shiver at the thought of the new code of factory laws which the Irish Parliament will certainly pass all these are filling the money chest to help Carson and his dupes carry on their 'war.'"

TORY METHODS

In the Canadian Associated Press despatch, October 22nd, 1912, this despatch appeared throughout the country as a report of a speech made by Sir Rodolphe Forget in the Richelieu by-election. The report was not denied. In it Sir Rodolphe Forget is quoted as saying:

"I pledge my word of honor that if you elect Mr. Morgan on Thursday the Marine Railway will be voted during the parliamentary session which will open next month, and if the government does not keep the promise which was made to me in writing I will ask Mr. Morgan to resign his seat and I know he will do so."

The report continued: "Sir Rodolphe declared he had seen Hon. Mr. Rogers and that the minister had given him a written promise binding the government."

Hansard report of parliamentary proceedings, December 4th, 1912: Mr. Lemieux:

1. Has any promise, written or verbal, been made of late by the prime minister, the minister of marine and fisheries or the minister of public works, that a marine railway would be subsidized or built by the government at Sorel, county of Richelieu?

2. If so, at what date, and to whom was such a promise made?

Rt. Hon. R. L. Borden:

"There has been no promise, either written or verbal, with respect to the matter alluded to, made by the members of the government who are mentioned in this question."

MONTREAL'S NEW DAILY PAPER

The Daily Mail, Montreal's new morning paper, made its initial bow to the public on Wednesday morning.

Mr. M. F. Nichols, son-in-law of Governor Wood, is the president of the company, and Mr. B. A. Macnaught, a former Nova Scotian who has achieved fame as a journalist in Montreal, is the managing editor.

The first number contains greetings from Sir Charles Tupper, the Duke of Connaught, Right Hon. James Bryce and William J. Bryan. It also contains special articles on the Home Rule question by Sir Edward Carson and John E. Redmond, M.P. It was the late Mr. George E. Fenety of this city, who started the first penny morning newspaper in British North America at St. John, over sixty years ago. In this connection it may be pointed out that Montreal's newest morning paper, printed from the most improved machinery with an elaborate telegraphic and news service and other features which go to make up the great metropolitan paper of the present day, is sold at the low price of half a penny. The Mail congratulates its Montreal namesake on its bright appearance and wishes it every measure of success.

The Tory St. John Standard recently sprang this one on its readers: "There need never be fear of a stringency in provincial funds as long as the government headed by Hon. J. K. Flemming is in charge of affairs at Fredericton." How the sanctimonious Premier Flemming must have smiled when he read the sentence quoted above. If there is no stringency of funds at the present time how comes it that parties with claims against the government are being requested to hold them over until after October 1st, when the fiscal year closes. Only last winter the premier himself complained of a money stringency, and to relieve said stringency had twenty four hundred dollars a year added to his salary. Other members of the government have since complained of a similar stringency, which they say will have to be dealt with the coming session.

When Hon. Dr. Pugsley represented St. John in the Dominion Cabinet the people did not find it necessary to hold indignation meetings. Hon. Dr. Pugsley is a man of some backbone.

The people of St. John are not handing out any bouquets to Hon. Mr. Elzen these days, and it is over a week since his picture appeared in a Tory paper.
