CITY COUNCIL HELD

Ald. Farrell then asked the City Clerk if the account concerned by the question should not have to be paid by the auditor.

The City Clerk said it was not necessary for the account to be passed by him.

ALD. MITCHELL'S REMARKS.

Ald. Mitchell said that Ald. Farrell had changed his base. He had been the principal person to block this item. Ald. Farrell had announced himself as leader of the opposition of the City Council. What consisted of that opposition—the rum-sellers of the city. Ald. Farrell had posed as a temperance man at the time of election. The people could now tell where he stood.

Ald. Farrell—"If I was a temperance man then I am now."

Ald. Mitchell went on to say that every effort had been made to block the enforcement of the Canada Temperance Act.

ALD. FARRELL INSINUATES.
Replying, Ald. Farrell said that if the rum-sellers were the opposition what was the state of affairs if it were true that liquor had been and was being sold on the steamer Victoria? If that were true rum-sellers were seated about the Council board.

CHALLENGE FROM MITCHELL.
Ald. Mitchell replied that no member of the City Council was selling liquor. Ald. Farrell was too foxy to make any direct statement. He placed his insinuation in the form of questions. Let him make any direct statement and he would be dealt with by the law of the land.

OTHERS HEARD.

Ald. Scott followed and denied flatly that any liquor has been sold upon the steamer Victoria with the consent of the directors or officers of the company.

Ald. Osborne stated that as an officer of the Victoria S. S. Company he could state that no liquor had been sold upon the steamer Victoria with the knowledge of the directors of the company. Strict orders had been issued that no packages of liquor be accepted as freight and that no liquor be permitted to be sold. If any person knew that liquor had been sold let him prove it. The members of the company would stand by the result and would go to jail if necessary.

ALD. CLARK REPLIES.

Ald. Clark characterized a statement of Ald. Farrell that he had refused to sign the affidavit connected with the sum of \$17.50 as untrue.

Ald. Farrell denied having made such a statement. What he had said was that any member of the Justice Committee could have signed the affidavit.

Continuing, Ald. Clark characterized the stories that liquor had been sold on the Victoria as lies made out of whole cloth. He also termed them outrageous slanders. The Gleaner had even published that Rev. Dr. Smith in the course of a sermon, had mentioned the fact. Rev. Dr. Smith had said nothing of the kind. The only foundation to the stories was the fact that on a moonlight excursion some man had taken liquor on the steamer.

The motion of Ald. Clark was then passed.

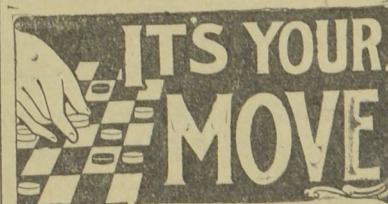
