BARBERS DECLINED TO GIVE HIM A SHAVE

Winnipeg, Nov. 11.—W. H. Boyd, an old-timer, who was a blacksmith here in 1880, in the employ of Aikens and Ryan, and has spent the last thirty years in California and other Western states, revisited the scenes of his youth, and had a welcome which has disgusted him with some of the younger men of Winnipeg. For the last quarter of a century he has been in the horse and cattle buying business, and arrived in Winnipeg to purchase a few loads of cattle. Having completed his business, he came into the city. He was first to a Portage avenue bank, then went across the street to get a shave. He admits that he looked a little "wild and woolly," but he was clearly and well dressed and sober, and there was no suspicion of intoxication, yet his appearance was against him, and three barbers, one after another, passed him on, until he had gone the length of the barber shop. The explanation made later was that the shop catered only to the better class of customers, therefore it would be better for him to seek another place. He did so, but first asked to see the manager of the place where he could not get a man to shave him, but was told that the manager was out.

The Reversible Falls

THE ANIMALS' HEALTH

Dwellers in the Toronto Zoo Make Good Patients

"A long way the healthiest animal here," said Mr. F. Goode, superintendent of the Riverdale Zoo, Toronto, "is the elephant. We have had her about ten years, and she has only been sick or sorry once in the last five years, and then she had only a slight cold."

Speaking generally, Mr. Goode was of the opinion that the denizens of the Zoo made good patients. The great majority of them, he was convinced, are more insensible to pain than are human beings. And they have nothing like the same apprehension of death or suffering. To this rule, however, he made some exceptions. A sick monkey, he said, was one of the most pitiful-looking sights of the world. To see a monkey die was piteous in the extreme. It showed just the same kind of feelings as a human being does. "I should say that the leopard is the most delicate of the animals we have here. He has a shorter coat than either the lion or the tiger, and a cold wind affects him. We lost a leopard two years ago from pneumonia. That is really the chief disease of which we stand in dread. On the whole we are extremely free from illness at the Zoo."

"Black and brown bears give very little trouble. They are naturally strong. And when they are feeling not quite up to the mark, they will drink cod liver oil freely out of a cup. "Beavers are healthy, as well as industrious. But they fight like fury. Where a male and female are together, and have a family, and found a colony, they are all right. But put in a strange beaver among this colony, and they will kill him inside of twenty-four hours. They will cut his tail off, and tear holes in his back. And all this will be done under water. Beavers can stand any amount of pain. I have known a beaver badly mauled, and gangrene set in until half of him was really dead. And yet he would still keep on diving."

A Winged Ambulance

A hunter, of North Battleford, told a story about a goose which he wounded and which was apparently about to fall to the ground. It was actually supported by two of its mates, who, upon seeing the predicament flew underneath the bird in distress so that their wings on the upward flap would reach the injured member of the flock. In this way, remarkable to relate, the three geese—the ambulance and the patient—reached the river in safety.

While the hunter could easily have picked off the whole three geese with the second volley, he was prevented from doing so by the remarkable demonstration of brotherly kindness in the care of the injured goose. The ingenious method which was employed by the members of this ambulance corps seems to prove conclusively that sometimes a goose is not a goose!

HON. MR. CROTHERS INSISTED ON REPORT

Ottawa, Nov. 21.—In connection with the affair between Hon. T. W. Crothers and Dr. J. W. Robertson over the completing of the report on technical education, it is learned that the Minister of Labor wrote to Dr. Robertson, on October 25 last, referring to his previous efforts to secure the report, and then adding: "Now nearly five months after I was advised it was complete, you tell me today that you will require ten days at it after the 27 inst. It cannot, I think, be fairly contended that you have not had time to do this work, for during the last two years you have done much other work. As the end of this work must be reached soon by yourself or by others, I have to say that if you are unable to complete it by the 10th prox. you will please deliver it to me as it then may be, and I will engage someone else to finish it."

Dr. Robertson speaking of the affair today said: "I have absolutely no quarrel with the Minister. Our relations have been most cordial. The report was virtually completed when placed on the table of the House of Commons on May 31 last. Since then we have been going through the proofs and putting the reports through the printing bureau, the Minister having requested us to complete the work. The Minister has been insistent on having the work finished speedily; nobody can blame him for that."

Sawdust Bread

There is a bakery in Germany that turns out 20,000 loaves of sawdust bread daily and finds a ready market for this output. Although this "wooden bread" is intended for consumption for horses only, it is claimed by the manufacturer, that in case of famine it would furnish a nutritious and highly satisfactory food for human beings. The sawdust is first subjected to a process of fermentation and various chemical manipulation, and is mixed with one-third part of rye flour. It is then formed into loaves and baked in an oven like any other bread.
