### ONTARIO WILL LOOSE FOUR MEMBERS

Ottawa, Nov. 23.—By the new Redistribution bill Toronto will likely get three new members and possibly four.

South York, which now includes a portion of the city is being made a city seat.  
Toronto now has five members

which will give the city eight and probably nine members.

Ontario will lose four seats, reducing the total from 86 to 82.

New Ontario will get two or three new seats and with three new seats in Toronto, it means rural Ontario will lose nine seats.

Middlesex is certain to lose one seat, and the representation of Huron will be cut down from three to two.

### PROPOSED LAW TO CONTROL LITERATURE

London, Eng., Nov. 2.—An influential conference on "the control of Reports and Literature of a Demoralizing Tendency" was held at the Guildhall under the auspices of the National Council of Public Morals. Bishop Boyd Carpenter presided, and among those present, in addition to representatives of the leading London and provincial newspaper publishers, librarians, newagents, and schoolmasters were the Bishop of Birmingham, Sir John Morst, Principal A. E. Garvie, D.D., Mr. J. A. Hobson, Prebendary Carlile (Church Army) etc.

The chairman said he understood the Government had received very favorable suggestions concerning legislation on the matter, and if he was not mistaken, a Government measure was already in preparation. It would have the effect, he believed, of producing greater stringency in the law regarding publications which might be looked upon as objectionable. In the long run, however, it was public opinion which would settle questions of this kind.

### WOULD DEBAR CANADIAN SPUDS FROM THE U. S.

Washington, D.C., Nov. 24.—Maine folks have been to Washington pitching battle against the admission of diseased potatoes. Aroostook county has a bulging potato crop this year, as Washington understands the matter, and there is lively interest in taking care of the Aroostook product and protecting it from the ravages of potato wart and likewise against the powdery scab. A year and more ago the department of agriculture authorized a quarantine against potatoes from Great Britain, Germany, Austria Hungary, Newfoundland, St. Pierre and Miquelon.

There have been very earnest efforts from New York and other importing centers to have this quarantine of the Taft administration lifted. The federal horticultural board has formally decided that this quarantine shall not be lifted. But this is only half of the controversy for Maine growers are urging that it be extended against Canada, because of powdery scab.

I. E. Melhus of the department, has recently been on a trip of investigation into Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, from which he has concluded that the powdery scab does exist in those provinces. Indications seem to be that a quarantine will be declared against Canadian potatoes.

#### BOTH SIDES ARGUE.

Importers say the powdery scab is not particularly dangerous. The federal horticultural board seems inclined to the opposite view, although this scab in many instances takes the form of lesions on the tubers. Those interested in bringing potatoes into this country say that the product is the poor man's food and that no undue restrictions should be imposed which might enhance the price. That is regarded in official circles as a very pertinent point.

Aroostook growers sell their product alike for food and also for seed purposes. There are large regions in the south that get their supply of seed potatoes from Aroostook annually. Texas is one of the southern states which buys large quantities of seed potatoes annually from Maine, as the Texas grown potato will not reproduce itself when planted in the ground.

#### EXPECT MORE HEARINGS.

There have been hearings recently at the department of agriculture over the matter and apparently will be more. If Canadian potatoes are to be barred, it will only be after more evidence is submitted and further hearings granted.

Maine farmers have been warned by their friends that they should be careful and not over-reach themselves. For if they have sufficient influence to bar out infected potatoes from certain foreign countries, the price to the American consumer may soar so that potatoes from other foreign countries will come here in large quantities. Belgian potatoes, which are of fairly good quality, are already being brought into the American market.
