## TOM SHARKEY HAS FIRST DOLLAR HE EVER WON

Report That Ex-Pugilist is Giving His  
His Wealth Away is Canard---  
Fortieth Birthday

New York, Nov. 26—Great excitement prevailed in East Fourteenth street today when a rumor was circulated that Tom Sharkey was buying a kettle of suds for all who entered his thirtieth birthday.

"Why this generosity on the part of the sailor?" queried a Tammanyite of his friends.

"It's Tom's fortieth birthday," was the answer.

"That may be," responded the Tammanyite, "but it was Tom's 140th birthday he wouldn't be spending anything but his time."

But the report was true, insofar as it concerned the birthday anniversary for Thomas J. Sharkey, former heavy weight pugilist, was born in Dundalk, Ireland, forty years ago today.

Before making his debut in the fight main, his principal duty being to arise at 3 a. m. and light the fire on board of Uncle Sam's battleships. He was so saving of the coal that he could have kept the job for life, but hearing one day that there was more money in pugilism, Tom quit the naval service and bought a pair of boxing gloves.

For a time the ex-sailor was wonderfully successful as a fighter and it looked as though he might have championship stuff in him. Before he finally quit the ring, now about ten years ago, he fought Jeffries, Corbett, Fitzsimmons, Rublin, Maher and all the big fellows of that day. It is said that Tom has every dollar that he earned in these fights.

## LALONDE OFFERED CUT OF \$1,000 IN HIS SALARY

Great French Canadian Hockey Player  
Far From Settlement With George  
Kennedy---Other Holdouts

(Montreal Herald.)

"Newsy" Lalonde, the great French-Canadian centre-ice man, and George Kennedy of the Canadiens, are at a dead-lock over the salary question and it was announced today that there is more than a possibility of Lalonde staying out of hockey altogether this winter.

Under the new salary scale, Lalonde is asked to accept a cut of a thousand dollars from his last year's figures. Part of the price offered him this year is in the form of a bonus conditionally upon Canadiens winning the championship. Last season Lalonde got \$2,000 for his services and the amount of this year's offer that takes the form of a bonus is \$200, leaving him a straight salary of \$1,000 for the ten weeks' pay, or a \$1,200 drop if Canadiens do not capture the title.

Art Ross, Lalonde and Harry Hyland, all hold-outs, met Saturday night at a dinner, tendered Cecil Hart, secretary of the City League, and each declared he would not play for the figures offered. Ross is understood to have been tendered \$1,500 contract by Wanderers, and Hyland five hundred dollars less.

Jack Laviolette has not yet come to terms with Canadiens, nor has Donald Smith, though in the latter's case the difference is only a question of a bonus in case the championship is won and is likely to be settled any time.

## THREE SADDLE HORSES SOLD FOR THREE THOUSAND

Miss H. D. Alterbury's Sale Feature  
of Yesterday's Proceedings at  
Madison Square Garden

New York, Nov. 25—The feature of the Old Glory horse sale which opened at Madison Square Garden today, was the sale of the prize winning saddle horses owned by Miss H. D. Alterbury of Washington, D. C. Miss Alterbury sold Nickel Plate, Patecia and Kildare for the aggregate sum of \$3,150. This amount just about repaid her for the money she gave for Nickel Plate early in the spring of 1912. Nickel plate brought \$1,425 to day. Patricia \$785 and Kildare \$850. Nickel Plate, 15.3, a gray gelding foaled in 1906, won six championship prizes from 1912 until just before the last national show, which closed Saturday night at Madison Square Garden. He was never defeated until the last horse show. He then "got the gate" for the first time and lost the championship.

At that time \$1,425 paid for him was the biggest sum that a saddler had brought at auction in this city in several years.


It is rumored at Hanover that Dartmouth will not play the Carlisle Indians next year.
