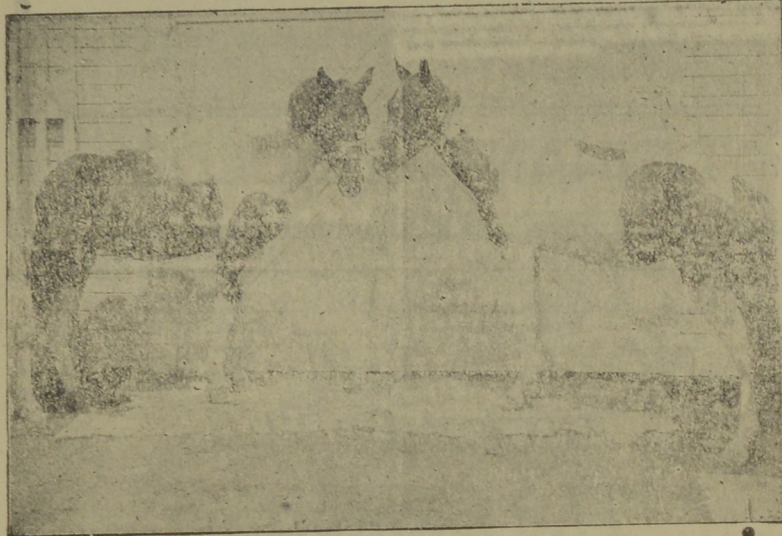


## Nine Rules for the SECOND-GRAND-Pony Contest

### - RULES FOR A DUNLAP PONY COMMERCIAL CONTEST -

RULE 1.—Any child not over sixteen years of age who is not a child of any employee connected with Business House mentioned in Folders or grandchild or niece or nephew of any of the participating merchants, may become a Contestant in the DUNLAP PONY COMMERCIAL CONTEST by enrolling his or her name at the places of business of all of the merchants who are joint participants in this Contest.

RULE 2.—For all money paid to any of the participating merchants during the progress of this Contest, either on old accounts or on cash business, 25 votes shall be given for each 25 cents so paid; 10 vote coupons and 5 vote coupons may be used at the discretion of the merchant.

RULE 3.—Under no consideration shall the schedule mentioned above be changed nor shall any additional votes be awarded by any merchant at any time during the progress of the Contest. No coupons except those printed by THE DUNLAP PONY COMPANY shall be considered valid coupons.

RULE 4.—A sealed ballot box shall be placed in the store or office of each participating merchant for the reception of said votes. Said box shall be opened by said merchant in exactly two weeks from the date on which this Contest starts. The votes contained in said box shall be counted by him or by parties selected by him and the result of said counting shall be kept a secret.

RULE 5.—Said ballot box shall be opened every two weeks thereafter during the progress of the Contest; the ballots counted in like manner and the result thereof kept a secret.

RULE 6.—As an incentive to the early casting of votes and to facilitate the counting thereof, the following bonuses shall be given. The votes cast for each Contestant during the first period shall be increased 50 per cent. In other words, if Contestant A has 100,000 votes and Contestant B 90,000 votes, 50 per cent. shall be added to the vote of each so that A will be credited with 150,000 and B with 135,000 votes.

RULE 7.—The votes cast for each Contestant during the second period shall be increased 40 per cent.; the votes cast for each Contestant during the third period shall be increased 30 per cent.; the votes cast for each Contestant during the fourth period shall be increased 20 per cent.; the votes cast for each Contestant during the fifth period shall be increased 10 per cent.; the votes cast for each Contestant during the last period shall not be increased at all.

RULE 8.—At the conclusion of the Contest three disinterested judges shall be selected by said merchants who shall tabulate the results certified to them by each participating merchant and shall award the Grand Prize of the Shetland Pony, Carriage or Sleigh and Harness to the child who has received the greatest number of votes.

RULE 9.—Each merchant agrees to carefully keep his records and not to divulge the contents thereof to any Contestant, to any of their friends or to any other participating merchant. By so doing no one will know who is in the lead at any stage of the Contest.

## DIRECTUM I. EQUALLED WORLD'S PACING RECORD

Stepped Fourth Heat of  
Glynn Stake at Syracuse  
in 2.02 1-4—Great  
Sport at Opening of  
Grand Circuit Meet—  
Walter Cochato Pressed  
Directum I.

Syracuse, N. Y., Sept. 8.—Directum I., capably driven by Ryan, equalled the world's record at the opening of the Grand Circuit races at the State Fair grounds this afternoon, when he stepped the fourth heat of the Glynn stake, 2.05 paces, in 2.02 1-4, tying the mark of Evelyn W. This time also equalled the season's record for the fastest heat made by a pacer, held by Braden Direct and Earl Jr.

The big chestnut finished sixth in the first heat, which was won by James Gentry, and in the second heat Walter Cochato challenged the son of Directum Kelly and the pair came down the stretch so close together that the result of the heat was in doubt until it was announced by the judges. In the fourth heat Walter Cochato again held close to Directum I., until the stretch was reached, then faltered and finally gave up.

The Ka-Noo-No stake for three-year old trotters, 2.24 class, who won by George Rex after he lost the first heat to Tuna Z. But three horses faced the starter in this event.

The 2.17 trot proved easy for Dr. Thorn, Snow driving the gelding to victory in three straight heats. The 2.14 (pace) went to Zanzibar in straight heats.

Several of the drivers registered a protest with the judges after the first heat of the 2.17 trot, following the wetting of the track by a sprinkler. Summary:

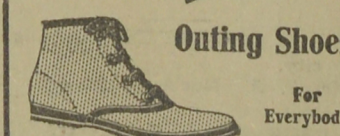

Prospects in Welsh as in English, Rugby, appear to be good this year. Soccer has come in rather strongly in Wales and the Rugby enthusiasts are going to fight all they know to keep their national game on top. Frank Williams, the great wing at Swansea, has left them to go to Halifax, the Northern Union Club, and W. J. Trew has retired, but there are plenty of good youngsters to take the places of the older men. Cardiff, however, will, it is feared, not be so strong as last year, but Newport, Llanelli and Neath should all do as well as formerly. In London the Harlequins will very likely suffer from Anno Domini, as though there are plenty of good youngsters, they do not get much chance of showing their paces while the old 'uns are fit enough to raise any sort of a gallop. Rugby should be good this year and it will be interesting to observe whether it will retain the hold which it made on the public last year.

The White Sox manager informed the fence buster today that his indiscretion would cost him exactly \$600. It was not exactly a fine as that would be out of the question for one offense of this nature, but the punishment administered by the Sox leader robbed Bodie of a bonus of that amount to have been given him in case of total abstinence this season.

Bodie was seated with several players in front of the Panthers Hotel here this morning when a bellboy told him:

"You are wanted in Manager Callahan's rooms at once."

With a look on his features as though he were walking to his doom, Bodie departed to meet his manager face to face. In fifteen minutes Bodie returned in a rage, muttering dire

threats. He said he had been fined \$600. He said the customary things said by most ball players returning from a grilling handed them by such an artist as Callahan.

GATHER EASTERN PLAYERS

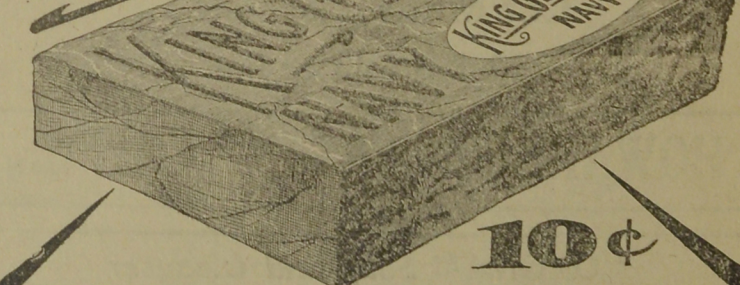
