## McSHEFFREY-SWEENEY.

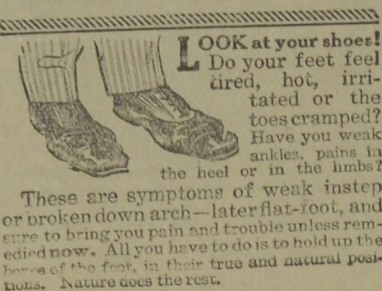

## CHAMPION MIXERS.

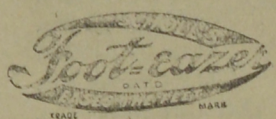

## HAINES MILL AT NASHWAAKSIS UNDER OPTION

J. R. McConnell of Marysville and George Mann of Vancouver Concerned in Negotiations for Property

The sawmill at Nashwaaksis built a couple of years ago by Moses Haines and operated by him until the present season, is now the subject of negotiations for purchase. The mill is now under agreement for sale and it is expected that the transfer will be made this week.

Mr. John R. McConnell of Marysville, is connected with the prospective purchasers, and Mr. George Mann, formerly of St. Stephen, who has been in Vancouver for some time, is also concerned in the matter. Rumor has also connected the names of Mr. W. P. Lowell of this city, with the prospective transfer, but Mr. Lowell informed The Mail today that he was not concerned in the matter.

The Haines mill was sold under mortgage by Mr. Alex. Watson of St. John, early in the summer and was bid in for him. While in operation, the mill sawed lumber cut on the Nashwaaksis and also lumber towed up that stream from the main river. A considerable amount of employment was furnished by the mill and it is hoped that it soon will be in operation again.

## NICHOLAS SACOBIE SHOT THROUGH FACE BY PETER POLCHIS

First Shooting Accident of Hunting Season Occurred Near Oromocto Last Night—Both are Indians

The first accident of the hunting season in this province is reported from Oromocto. Nicholas Sacobie, an Indian of the reservation near that village, was shot through the face last night by Peter Polchis, another Indian, while the two were hunting ducks. Sacobie is painfully injured but will recover, according to present expectations.

The two were together at Thatch Island, a short distance above Oromocto, hunting ducks. They took positions about a pond and Polchis fired when a duck appeared. In the dusk he was unaware of the position of his friend and was horrified to hear him cry out. He plunged through the pond in the direction of the cries and found Sacobie bleeding from severe wounds in the face but not seriously hurt.

WOULD HAVE KILLED HIMSELF.

After bringing Sacobie to his home Polchis told the other Indians that had he found that he had killed his friend he would have shot himself at once.

## THROUGH BOTH CHEEKS.

Sacobie is injured by No. 2 shot, which are of fairly large size. Part of the charge entered his right cheek and came out the left cheek. Medical aid was obtained today and the injured man's wounds dressed.

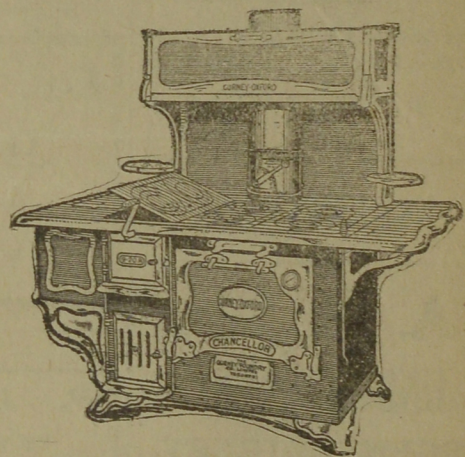
