## SAYS SIR JOHN WAS CONVERTED 26 YEARS AGO

(Montreal Star.)

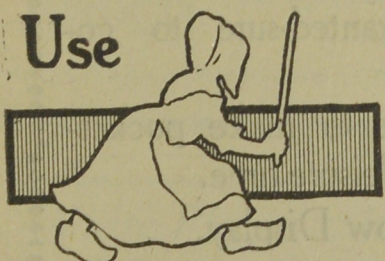
A chapter in the life of Sir John A. Macdonald, known to but very few were disclosed last evening by Evangelist T. H. Crossley, who related before an audience in the Westmount Methodist Church the incident of Sir John A. Macdonald's conversion at a Crossley Hunter meeting, twenty-six years ago, in Ottawa.

"Statesmen are always Christians," said Mr. Crossley last night, "and politicians rarely are. Every statesman I have known has been an out-and-out Christian."

Touching upon the evidences of Christian piety, the speaker cited, first, the Presidents of the United States, President Harrison, Garfield, Roosevelt and Woodrow Wilson; in the Old Country, W. E. Gladstone, who stated that in his forty-six years of ministry, sixty master minds had passed through his cabinet and of these fifty-five were men of God. Turning to Canada, he cited Sir Oliver Mowatt, Alexander Mackenzie, Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the Right Hon. R. L. Borden.

"Yes," said Mr. Crossley, "statesmen are always men of God. Now, for instance, I think we may come a

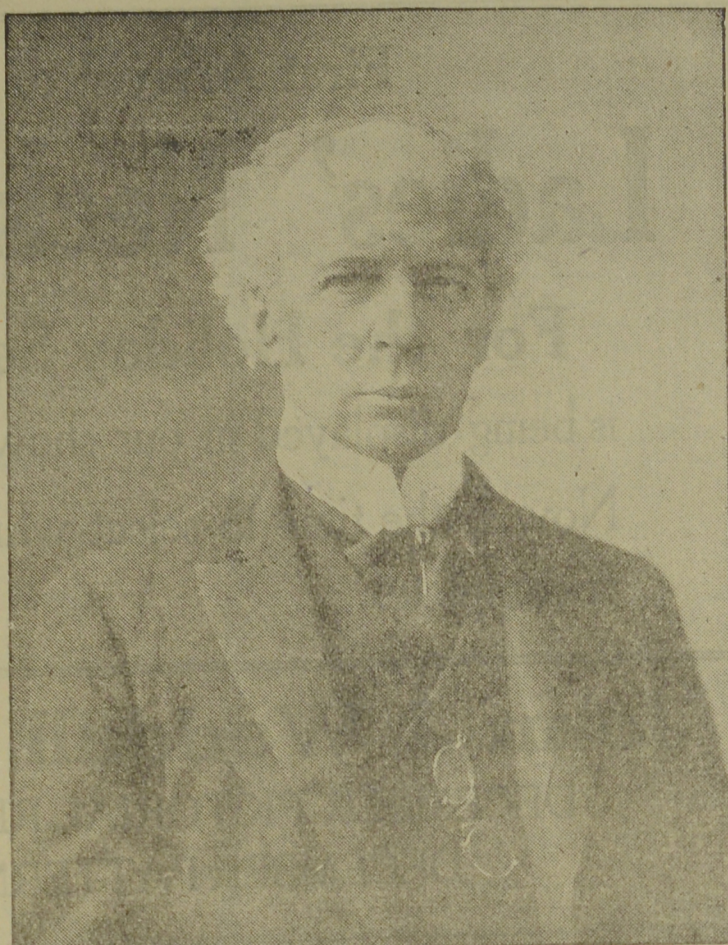

"When those converted were called to the front, he stood up with Lady Macdonald and the next moment they were side by side in front of us. When he came up, there was a little girl there and the child said:

"Sir John, have you given your heart to Jesus?"

"And he answered, 'Why, yes.'"

## WEATHER PROPHETS

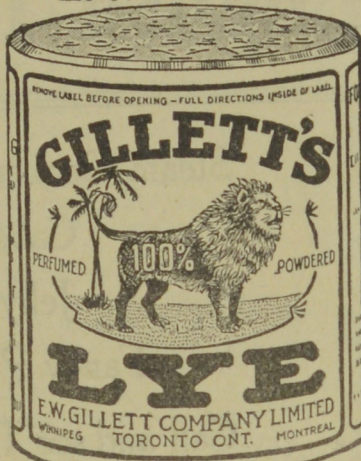
Cat's fur is full of electricity, and before a thunderstorm a cat is always extremely lively and playful, probably on account of its electrical condition. Before rain is expected you will see a cat assiduously washing its face.

Donkeys will bray loudly and continuously at the approach of a storm. If cows lie down in the early morning instead of feeding, or huddle together with their tails to windward, then there is rain about. Like cats, the approach of a thunderstorm makes cows extremely frisky. They run up and down the field and butt imaginary obstacles at such times.

Sheep turn their heads to the wind when the day is going to be fine. But if they graze with their tails to windward it is a sure sign of rain, so experienced shepherds say. Like cows, too, they show an unusual liveliness at the approach of a storm. Even the sedate pig is watched by country weather prophets, for it is always uneasy when rain is coming.

Most birds are restless when a change is expected. Rain is indicated by guinea-fowls and peacocks squalling, by parrots whistling, and by pigeons returning home unusually early.

## MAIL ORDER HOUSES BUY NEWSPAPERS

(From the Dry Goods Review)

The big departmental stores continue to extend their interests in or control of the too daily newspapers in Toronto, Montreal and Winnipeg. A large interest in, if not the control of, another Toronto daily has just been acquired. This makes three dailies in Toronto in which these mail order houses are financially interested. In Montreal it came out in legal proceedings recently that one of the oldest daily papers there passed some months ago into the hands of the chief owner of a rising mail order house which aims to monopolize the trade in Eastern Canada. There are now nine dailies in Toronto, Montreal and Winnipeg, which are known to be owned, or controlled by, the big store and financial interests, and while posing as the mediums of public opinion are the organs of these interests. The trade of these houses has grown enormously in these cities where these dailies circulate, but in the other cities and smaller places where there are good local newspapers, they have not made the same gains, because the local newspapers are well edited and are loyal to their local merchants and refuse to carry the advertising of the big city store. The only way in which the big dailies can make headway is by cutting their prices. They get \$3 to \$5 a year in Montreal, Toronto and Winnipeg, but sell in other cities at 50c. to \$1 a year. This does not pay for the white paper on which these newspapers are printed, but the heavy deficits are made up by subsidies through big advertising contracts and in other ways, and by the low postal rates. The merchants and newspapers outside of these three big centres should get together and insist that no newspaper should have the privilege of the mails which has a lower subscription price outside than in the centre in which it is published or which sells at less than the cost of the paper used.

A Chair From India

A chair presented to the professorship of colonial history at Queen's University, Kingston, was carved in Central India by Mrs. Nanton, known to Canadians as Miss Marguerite Joly, daughter of Sir Henry Joly de Lotbiniere. The chair is carved of specially selected teak of great beauty, and is probably the finest piece of modern wood carving in Canada. The design is symbolic of Canadian life.

## They Taboo Mirrors

There is a sect in Holland known as the Labadists, among whose members the use of mirrors is strictly prohibited. Their founder, Jean de Labadie, a seventeenth century Calvinistic minister, attracted many followers, but after his death they dwindled down, and now they are found only in a few remote villages of Friesland. Travelling in Holland in 1893, Lecy lit on a colony of Labadists. "Internally, among themselves," he wrote, "they have quite a distinctive type—a singularly beautiful one, with their delicate lips and a curious air of refinement. They are fishermen—very prosperous—and their houses, with their china and silver ornaments and prints of the house of Orange, and great Bibles with silver clasps and perfectly preternatural neatness, are very interesting to see."
