IS MINISTER COCHRANE ABOUT TO QUIT POLITICS

(Montreal Mail, Ind.)

Ottawa, Nov. 20.—I have seen a letter addressed to a Montreal politician, stating that Hon. Frank Cochrane has resigned as minister of railways and canals in the Borden cabinet.

It is added that his resignation awaits the return of the prime minister, who will not be back, as planned, for another month. The reason assigned for the minister's resignation is ill-health. But it is an open secret that the relations between him and some of his colleagues have been of late somewhat strained, there being marked differences of opinion over certain questions. Mr. Cochrane, in several instances, found measures which he had favored blocked by the opposition of certain of his colleagues and the situation finally became such that he decided upon his resignation.

HAS LEFT OTTAWA.

He has left the capital for an indefinite period, according to the writer of the letter; and in the meantime the department is in charge of Hon. Robert Rogers, who is acting minister of railways. These statements, sweeping as they may seem, were embodied in the communication before referred to. My informant added that strong pressure is being brought to bear upon Mr. Cochrane to induce him to reconsider his resignation, as it is felt that such an action, at the present time, will be detrimental to the interests of the party, especially in Ontario.

Should he persist in his determination, his withdrawal from the cabinet may precipitate the reconstruction of the ministry, which was foreshadowed in The Daily Mail some time ago.

WAITING PREMIER'S RETURN.

No official announcement is likely to be forthcoming until Mr. Borden's return, as some of Mr. Cochrane's colleagues hope that he will be induced to stay in the ministry, at least for some time longer.

It was stated at the railways department today that Mr. Cochrane "is improving in health in Toronto and he is expected back here next week." Whether he takes another trip will depend on the state of his health. Mr. Cochrane was expected here this week but his departmental estimates were sent to him, enabling him to remain away a week longer. A member of the cabinet said tonight that Mr. Cochrane went to Toronto ten days ago and that his health was not serious, that he only needed a rest. He denied that Mr. Cochrane had any intention of retiring. The way Mr. Cochrane's absence is explained gives rise to confirmation of the reports of serious trouble. It is not unlikely that Mr. Borden will be back in Ottawa before long, unless he has purposely gone away during a period of unpleasantness.

Meantime there is dissension; Mr. Cochrane is apparently "on strike," and what the next development will be it is hard to anticipate, because in situations like that which exists "diplomatic evasions" are de rigueur, especially among some of the members of the cabinet now in Ottawa, who constitute themselves mouthpieces of the administration.

The Largest Chrysanthemum

By removing all the flower-buds except the terminal they have produced the large globular heads with which we are all familiar. ENORMOUS SHEEP OF NOVA SCOTIA

They Are Perfectly Wild And Are Quite at Home in the Sea

On the east coast of Nova Scotia is an archipelago of thousands of isles, wooded and rocky. Four hundred years ago the hardy French voyagers who first settled this part of Canada hailed these pretty islands with delight. They settled there before they would trust themselves upon the mainland, and there they turned out the live stock—shaggy Breton ponies, hardy little Jerseylike cows, and lanky sheep.

The sheep thrived where the cattle and the horses found the problem of existing difficult. Soon they paddled in the shallow waters of the outgoing tide in their desire to catch at the floating eel grass and luscious kelp. Then the discovery came that swimming was not beyond their powers, and they need not remain prisoners on single islands when there were scores of others for them to visit.

So they peopled numbers of the islands, and straggling along the whole coast line became no man's flocks, having returned to a pristine wildness.

So it comes that in Nova Scotia, especially in Guysboro County, there is a breed of big sheep loaded down with heavy wool of as many years growth as they are old, perfectly wild, living on the sea coast. Swift on their feet they are as alert to danger as their cousins the mountain sheep of the Pacific coast. They jump from cliffs of considerable height, trusting to their heavy fleeces to save their bones from harm. They are ready on the instant to plunge into the waves and swim off to safety.

They are sure footed as antelopes, vigilant as chamois. This, too, despite the fact that they are always rolling in fat. Ragged looking the old-timers grow to be especially about the neck, but this is when maturity has been passed and old age is coming on. Otherwise they are tidy looking creatures, though their fleeces are prodigiously exaggerated.

They are partly carnivorous, these sheep of the sea coast. At least an observant watcher will notice that they nose away at the soft spots of the beach after eel worms and mussels, and chewed clam shells are commonly to be met with on their pastures. But their regular food is dulce, eel grass, and kelp.

In the winter they are apt to suffer. The spray dashes into the fleece and freezes there in cold weather. All along the high water mark the sea walls of ice form. Many sheep are drowned here while feeding on sea weed. Were it not for the dangers of the winter season the sheep would become exceedingly numerous, for they breed quickly and not very many of them fall before the hunters.

TRAPPING ON FARMS

Chances For an Observant Country Boy to Earn Money

Over one hundred thousand dollars is paid to the farmer boys of Canada each year for raw furs," said Mr. John Hallam, a large Toronto fur dealer, "and many of these boys earn their first real money by setting out a line of traps and capturing the valuable fur-bearing animals."

Contrary to the popular impression, it is not necessary to go into the wilds in order to trap, as muskrats, mink, skunk, raccoon, ermine or white weasel and other valuable fur-bearing animals abound throughout the farming communities of the Dominion, and it only remains for the observant, active trapper to capture the same and turn their pelts into the big money that they bring on the market to-day.

Not only does the following of the trap line well repay the boy for the time and energy expended, but it leads him to enjoy the healthful life in the open, and to become a lover of nature. It causes him to become observant and sharpens his wits, when he attempts to match his skill against the natural instinct and wariness of the wild animals, and offers an innocent safety valve to the natural exuberance inherent in every boy having good red blood coursing through his veins.

A Happy Family

The belief that the cat is the natural enemy of the mouse does not always hold good. On the farm of William Wilson near Queenston is an old tabby, the property of his grandson Edgar, who is responsible for overthrowing this popular belief. Edgar entrusted a litter of white mice to the care of the cat. The cat offered no objection, and from the first day they got along without a hitch. The cat and rodents share their food, and form a very happy little family. The fact that heretofore the cat had been a noted "mouser" caused considerable comment.
