thought he was asking for trial by judge and jury and that the defendant had not waived his common law right of election. Mr. Hughes contended that statutes tending to encroach on that right should be strictly construed. He further argued that as the value of the article alleged to be stolen was less than ten dollars, the stipendiary should have tried the case himself.

The attorney general, in reply stated that the magistrate, Hazen Chapman, had acted merely in the capacity of justice of the peace and not as a stipendiary and could decide only whether the evidence was sufficient to send the defendant up for trial. With regard to the argument on right of election, Hon. Mr. Grimmer said that the facts of the case as told by the magistrate showed that the defendant had understood what was asked of him and had elected for speedy trial. He also stated that the defendant had had a right of re-election and had not taken it.

Court considers:  
Ex Parte David A. McLeod and Heber S. Keith. W. H. Harrison moved for a rule absolute for a certiorari and for a rule nisi to quash a garnishee order in the suit of the Victoria Hotel Company vs David A. McLeod, dated October 2, 1913, and order of Judge Fortes to pay money out of court, dated October 2, 1913.

Rule absolute and rule nisi returnable before Judge McKeown December 18 at St. John in chambers.

### TO MAKE WAR ON DESIGN PIRATES

New York, Nov. 21—Plans to put an end to the piracy of trademarks and designs were discussed at an important conference of representative manufacturers, wholesalers and importers, which met at the Hotel Astor today. The present method of registering commercial designs was declared to be cumbersome and expensive, while at the same time affording inadequate protection to the owners. As a remedy for the evil Congress will be urged to pass a law providing for the establishment of a registration bureau in which the designs may be filed by their originators at a low expense. The idea on which the proposed measure will be based will do away with much of the time and expense consumed now in protecting designs. There will be no research preliminary to granting certificates of registration. This work being done afterward in case of suit for infringement. Registration will not protect the design beyond giving its owner definite proof of priority, which will, of course, be the deciding point in litigation arising from alleged infringement.

### "DAUGHTERS" PAY A VISIT TO PANAMA

Colon, Nov. 21—After a delightful voyage from New Orleans 150 members of the Daughters of the Confederacy arrived here today on the chartered steamship Abangarez. The Daughters were welcomed by a delegation of prominent women from Panama. On their arrival in the capital tomorrow the visitors will be received by President Porras. After the chief points of interest in the Canal embark for Port Limon, Costa Rica, Zone have been visited the party will from which point they will take the train for San Jose. A day will be spent in the highland capital of the Costa Rica republic.

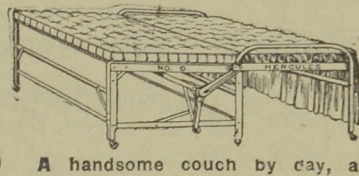
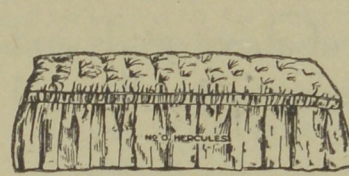

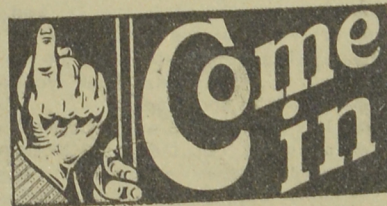
