AT ST. PAUL'S—Rev. A. J. Mowatt will occupy the pulpit at St. Paul's Church both services tomorrow.

SERIOUSLY ILL—Grave doubts are entertained respecting the recovery of the Metropolitan, who is seriously ill.

ON THE FORCE—John O'Neill has been appointed a policeman on the city force. He is a pretty able man. The boys say that when he was on the section he could handle steel rails with anyone.

THE WESTON—The steamer David Weston arrived here on Tuesday and received a great welcome. She will continue her trips during the season.

BEAR POISONED—Some evil-minded person administered a dose of Paris Green to John G. Gunn's pet bear. The animal suffered greatly and despite all efforts died. It was a year and a half old and was very tame.

A CHALLENGE—David E. Crowe, our champion bicycle rider, has issued a challenge to any St. John rider for a half-mile race, to take place on the Fredericton Driving Park. Mr. Crowe, although taking part in some races, has not yet shown what he can do.

FREDERICTON IN INDIA—A very peculiar vehicle has just been completed at Cooper's Wagon Factory. It is a four-wheeled covered carriage finished in the highest style of art. The seats and cushions are so contrived that they can be converted into a comfortable bed. It will be hauled by three or four coolies and when it arrives in India it will be known as a jimickshaw. It has been built for Rev. I. C. Archibald.

A PUBLIC PARK—The City Fathers and others are again agitating the securing of a park that will belong to the city and will provide a place for enjoyment. Pine Park has been spoken of as well as the Odell property. One of the aldermen advocated buying the latter property, pre-

serving a place for a public park, running roads through the remainder and selling it out for building-lots. (Two years later a portion of the Odell property was purchased by the late E. H. Wilnot and presented to the city. It is known now as Wilnot Park.)

VISITING—The Miramichi Advance says:—"Messrs. T. B. Winslow, A. F. Street and E. H. Allen of Fredericton, visited the Miramichi this week. Together with Mr. Jones of Colorado, who is visiting Col. Call, they enjoyed a trip down river on Tuesday as the guests of F. Lee Street."

"SPORTER" ON DECK—The Fredericton racing stallion "Sporter," owned by Alonzo Staples, was observed below the Mouth of the Nashwaak the other day showing the residents of that section what fast going is. Charles Orr, his trainer, is keeping "Sporter" very dark. What's up?

MUNICIPAL POLITICS—An act was passed in the local House last year by which a county councillor holds his seat for two years instead of one as before. Since the change, many believe that the councillors' elected last October will not have to come forward for election this year. But such is not the case. Already signs of conflict are beginning to appear and most of the parishes will have an election. It is not thought there will be much change in the new board under the new act.

FACTS ABOUT THE BIBLE

It will surprise many persons to learn that there are two chapters in the Bible which are practically identical, these being the 19th chapter of the Second Book of Kings and the 37th chapter of Isaiah. There are 929 chapters with 592,493 words in the Old Testament, and 260 chapters and 181,253 words in the New Testament. Asked off-hand, one would probably say there were more words in the Bible than in Shakespeare's works, but, as a matter of fact, the balance is in favor of the Bard, who has the respectable total of 314,780, or 41,317 more than the Bible. Altogether his plays have no fewer than 1,277 characters, one of whom (Hamlet) has 11,610 words to deliver.

"Hamlet," indeed, is the longest play, containing as it does 3,930 lines, while the "Comedy of Errors," is the shortest, with 1,777 lines. The longest word is "honorificabilitudinitatibus," which is certainly a tongue-twister. The curious can find all the letters of the alphabet in the 21st verse of the 7th chapter of Ezra, while reference to the 117th Psalm will show that it is not only the shortest chapter in the Bible, but also the middle chapter of the book.

Lepers in Canada

There are in Canada, according to official reports to Dr. Montzambert, director-general of public health, twenty-five lepers. In the lazaretto at Tracadie, N.B., there are 21 patients, 11 males and 10 females. Of the total number, 17 are French Canadians, two are English, one is a Scotlander and one Russian. The second lazaretto is at Darcy Island in British Columbia. There are in it four leprosy Chinamen.

CHEAP FARES TO TORONTO EXHIBITION.

In connection with the Canadian national exhibition at Toronto, which will be held this year from August 23rd until September 8th, the Intercolonial Railway will give very low excursion rates which will give the opportunity to many to visit the Queen City on the occasion of its great annual fair.

The Toronto fair is the largest and most attractive of annual exhibitions in America, and this year new permanent buildings have been constructed and its extensive boundaries enlarged by new boulevards. Maritime Province travellers will have their choice of two through vestibuled trains, the Ocean Limited and the Maritime Express, both of which connect at Bonaventure union station, Montreal, with the through Grand Trunk trains for Toronto. 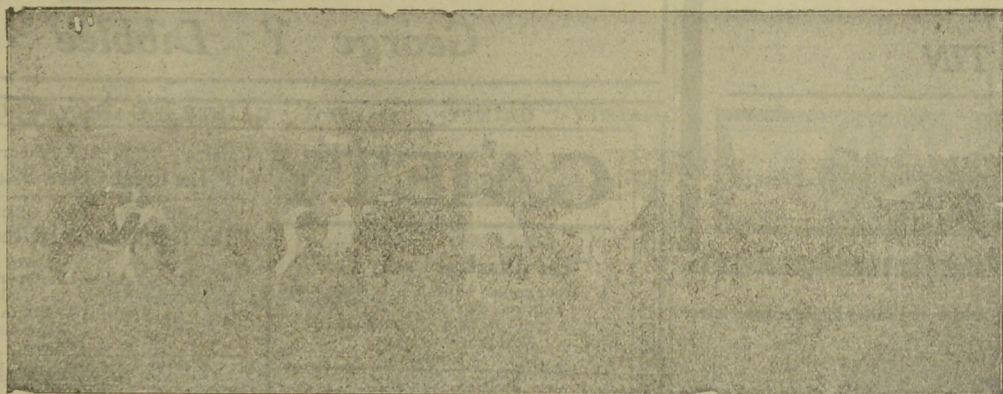
