DISTINGUISHED U. N. B. GRADUATE ARRIVED IN CITY

Wallace Broad of Shanghai, of Chinese Department of Mines, Visiting Province—Formerly Engaged in Mining in South Africa

Wallace Broad of Shanghai, China, arrived here last night, registering at the Barker House. He left this morning by steamer D. J. Purdy for points down the river.
Mr. Broad is one of the most distinguished graduates of the University of New Brunswick and has been away from his native province for some years. He was born at St. Stephen.
Mr. Broad was graduated by the U.N.B. in 1877 and after graduation took up mining engineering and followed the profession in various parts of the world. He was in South Africa for many years and was there during the Boer war. In 1902 he received an appointment to the Department of Mines of the Chinese Empire and since that time has been in that country under various governments.

DISASTROUS FIRE NEAR TAYMOUTH LAST NIGHT

Daniel Abernathy Lost Barns and Contents, Hay, Etc.,—Incendiarism Suspected—No Insurance—Loss About \$1200

Daniel Abernathy, a well-known farmer of the Tay, suffered a heavy loss by fire last night when his barns and their contents were totally destroyed. No insurance was carried on the buildings and the loss is estimated at about \$1,200. Mr. Abernathy cuts a large quantity of hay and the season's cut was burned with the buildings and also other property.

The fire is thought to have been set as there is no other way of accounting for it. The circumstances probably will be investigated.

The fire was discovered first by Mr. Abernathy's daughter, who went to the barns from the house. At that time the flames were burning among the beams in a place where fire was not likely to catch accidentally. Nothing could be done to save the buildings, which made a very spectacular fire, burning for some hours.
Mr. Abernathy lives about two miles up the Tay from Taymouth. The reflection of the fire upon the clouds could be seen from this city.

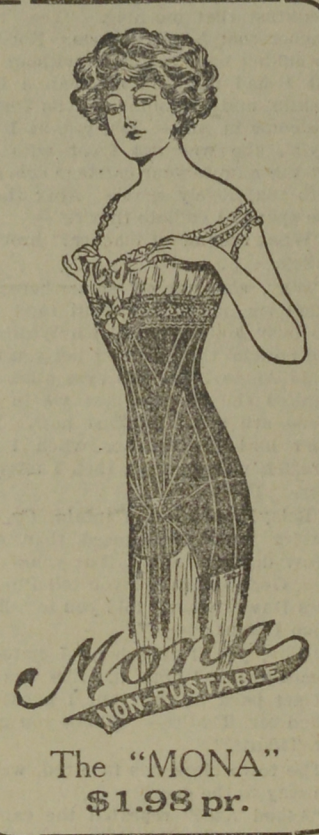
KING STREET STARS WON.
