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WHERE THE C.P.R. COMES IN

Not long ago our esteemed contemporary the St. John Telegraph published a diagram showing the distance from the G. T. P. at Napodogan to St. John via a branch line of fifty miles to Fredericton and seventy five miles by the Valley line to St. John. In a headline our contemporary asserted that "the G. T. P. will be handling through freight next summer" and asked "How will St. John get it?" That's easy. St. John won't get it, nor will it get a pound of Transcontinental freight by any other line than the C. P. R. while the present government is in power at Ottawa. And more than that, if the contract had not been let for the Courtenay Bay works before the present government came into power, there would not have been a blow struck yet for their construction. It would have gone the way of the ship building plant. The Courtenay Bay works if used at all will be used by the C. P. R. As to the Valley Railway, it will go over the C. P. R. line from Grand Falls to Andover, (as the Dominion subsidy of \$6,400 per mile, for a road between those points, secured through the influence of Hon. Dr. Pugsley, was withdrawn at the last session of Parliament) and it will go into St. John over the C. P. R. line from Welsford. It is pretty well understood that the proposal to build bridges over the St. John and Kennebecasis for the use of the Valley Railway has practically been abandoned. The C. P. R. attended to that and the big corporation is determined to control both ends of the line, and Tory politicians will feather their nests out of the middle section. The people of St. John might as well make up their minds to accept just what the C. P. R. will give them. Canada put them in that position when it dismissed the Laurier government and put in the present Tory nationalist combination. It is claimed that there is no politics in the railway question. It is all politics, and the people of St. John need not expect a square deal so long as the present incapables remain in power at Ottawa.

A WISE CRITIC

The would-be police magistrate of Fredericton, who is now engaged in grinding out editorial dope for the local hack organ, has made the discovery that the Liberals maintain a press bureau at Ottawa and supply matter to the party newspapers. In commenting upon the fact he rises to remark:

"Some of them, such as The Fredericton Mail, The Richibucto Review and The Moncton Transcript, not having any editorial staff with enough mental ability to write their own leading articles, take the copy bodily from their weekly letter and print it as their own original composition."

It is scarcely necessary to point out that those employed on the staff of newspapers mentioned above are men who were helping to advertise and build up New Brunswick when a certain great and wise "jelly-bag of an Englishman," having blown in his patrimony, was scouring about the Old Country endeavoring to borrow sufficient funds to enable him to emigrate to Canada. The near police magistrate may have a monopoly of mental ability and swelled head, but he is sadly lacking in other qualities which count for something in this democratic country.

MACDONALD NOMINATIONS FOR FEDERAL HOUSE

Winnipeg, Dec. 7.—Nominations for the Federal bye-election in Macdonald were held in St. James, a suburb of Winnipeg, yesterday, and resulted in the nomination of Dr. A. W. Myles of Treherne, Man., Liberal, and Alex. Morrison of Carman, the Government minister, unseated through admissions of corruption at his election in 1912. The nomination passed off without incident, there being a very small attendance of voters and no speeches of any kind. The Liberal candidate has lost no time in organizing, and largely attended meetings in different parts of the constituency have been held in his interests each afternoon and night, commencing last Thursday. Mr. Morrison has not held a meeting yet, and no announcement of Conservative meetings has yet been made.

Hon. Frank Oliver, J. G. Turiff, M. P. for Assinabola, and a number of leading Liberal speakers from Winnipeg are addressing the meetings with Dr. Myles.

Hon. H. F. McLeod and Organizer Harry Woods were the principal speakers at a rally of the North End Conservative Club at St. John last evening. Mr. Woods is anxious that the Valley Railway shall enter St. John by way of Welsford but Mr. McLeod announced positively that the east side route would be chosen. The colonel also discussed the reciprocity question and dilated on his recent trip to the Old Country with Col. Sam Hughes. He predicted that Hon. Mr. Hazen would one day be premier of Canada. Mr. J. 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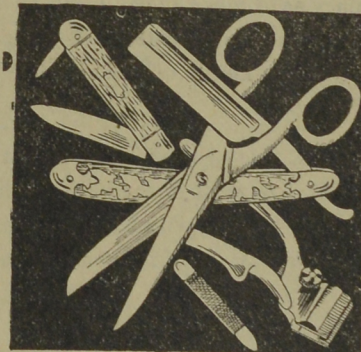
