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CARPENTIER KNOCKED OUT WELLS AT LONDON

English Heavyweight Champion Made
Poor Showing---Crowd Hooted
Him at End of Bout

London, Dec. 8—George Carpentier of France knocked out Bombardier Wells of England in the first round of a contest at the National Sporting Club tonight for the heavyweight championship of Europe.

The actual time of fighting was 1m 13s. Carpentier made it a hurricane affair, concentrating his attack on Wells' weakest point, his stomach, and soon had the Englishman groggy. Then with a tremendous swing to the jaw, followed by a smashing left Wells down for the count.

Throughout the brief contest the Englishman did not strike one effective blow. The fight was for a purse of \$15,000 and a side stake of \$5000. It attracted great interest among sporting men because it was the second meeting between the British heavyweight and the Frenchman with in a few months.

Their last fight took place at Ghent and Carpentier knocked Wells out in the fourth round after the Englishman had had all the better of the first two rounds.

Wells' defeat was a painful shock to English sportsmen, who, under the impression that his Ghent reverse was due to a fluke, made him a strong favorite over the Frenchmen. Wells was backed free, the prevailing odds being 5 to 4.

The match attracted more interest than any fight fought in England since the Salvin-Jackson contest. The National Sporting Club was packed, and extravagant prices were paid even for standing room.

The crowd "hoped" Wells at the end of the fight, and their fallen idol had some trouble in getting a hearing to explain that he was unable to withstand Carpentier's terrific assault on his midsection.

The first and tenth rounds were even, the fourth going to Flynn, and in the others Levinsky proved himself the master of his opponent. Only once during the bout did Flynn appear to have an advantage, when with a blow to the right ear, he sent Levinsky to his knees. Two other times Levinsky fell, but both were attributed to tripping over his own feet.

Flynn weighed in at 187 pounds and Levinsky 167.

JOHNNY GALLANT BROKE ARM IN BOUT

Pittsfield, Dec. 8—Johnny Gallant of Chelsea broke his arm in a swing around Grover Hayes' neck in the fourth round of their 10-round bout tonight, and although Gallant continued through the round despite great pain, the match was called off at the close of the round.

PACKY McFARLAND GOT NEWSPAPER DECISION

Milwaukee, Dec. 8—Packy McFarland outpointed his old enemy, Jack Britton, in an unsatisfactory ten round, no-decision boxing contest before 6000 spectators here tonight.

McFarland had the better of five was Britton's. Both in the eighth rounds, while four were even and one and ninth Packy had Jack Groggy, but was unable to put his man out.

Britton at times fought McFarland to a standstill and even outboxed him, but this was only in flashes.

The crowd jeered the boxers during most of the contest and there were numerous cries of "Put 'em out" and "Stop the bout!"

Quebec Will Hold on to That Player
---Wanderers Without Hyland and
Art Ross

Montreal, Dec. 9—The deal whereby Jack Laviolette, of the Canadiens was to be traded to Quebec in exchange for Goldie Prodgers is all off. George Kennedy wanted a cash consideration in addition to Prodgers before he would part with his long-haired defence man, whom he considers the best hockey player in the east today. Quebec couldn't see the cash end of it, and Prodgers wanted a higher salary from Canadiens than from Quebec, as he had intended starting in business in the Ancient Capital, and his plans would be upset by the trade. So it looks as if the dashing John would still be in our midst this year, although he has not yet signed a contract. Donald Smith has signed up, as have all the other members of the Canadian team. They start in training this week to get ready for the opener.

Prodgers was here Saturday on his way to report at Quebec. Prodgers confirmed the recent report from London, Ont., where he has been for some time, that he would not report to the Canadiens if traded for Laviolette, unless he was offered a big advance in salary.

WANDERERS BEGIN TRAINING

The Wanderers team had their first taste of work for the season when they put in an hour at gymnastics at St. Patrick's gymnasium today. The team went through a series of exercises, loosening up their muscles and getting into condition for the opening battle. A new feature of the training is the bicycle exercises. Art Ross and Harry Hyland have not signed up, and are now automatically released from the club. If later on they want to join the club, the management will not even offer \$1,000, they say.

Carl Kendall, secured by the Wanderers in a deal with the Patriks has signed his contract and reported to Manager Boon today. Kendall played the position of rover in the seven-man game, and is a centre player in the six-man game. He is speedy and a good stick handler.

M. P. H. A. PLAYERS DECLARED FREE-AGENTS BY UPPER CANADA

Emmett Quinn President of N. H. A.
Says all Arguments Are Cancelled
---Murphy and Wilson Affected

Montreal, Dec. 9—All the players who until a few days ago were on the reserve list of the clubs in the maritime hockey league, are now looked on as free agents by the National Hockey Association, and the agreement between the N.H.A. and the east has been practically called off. This was announced today by President T. Emmett Quinn of the National Hockey Association, who had a letter from the east yesterday.

The agreement asked that the agreement made between the maritime league and the N.H.A. be allowed to stand until the new organizations was gotten underway.

President Quinn was prompt in his reply and notified the clubs in the maritime provinces that the agreement was cancelled, as the changes suggested by the new league would not be acceptable to the N.H.A., and they would look on the players as free agents. President Quinn gave the new organization until Saturday to put their league on a solid foundation, and accept the terms as in the agreement between the Pacific Coast and the N.H.A.

(This decision appears to settle all doubt about the status of Mike Murphy and Allen Wilson formerly of New Glasgow who have accepted terms with the Ottawa club. Mike is to draw \$700 for the season.)

MCGREGOR OF NEW GLASGOW TEAM WEDS


