GOVERNOR OF NEW HAMPSHIRE SURRENDERS THAW

Concord, N.H., Nov. 10—Governor Samuel D. Felker Saturday morning granted the petition of the State of New York for the extradition of Harry Thaw, charged with conspiracy to escape from the insane asylum at Matteawan. The case now goes into the United States courts.

A writ of habeas corpus was obtained by counsel for Thaw from U. S. District Attorney Judge Edgar Aldrich soon after Thaw found temporary refuge in this state, after having been deported from Canada. Proceedings on the writ were postponed awaiting the decision of the governor on the matter of extradition.

Governor Felker based his decision on the indictment returned against Thaw in New York County and has charged him with conspiracy to escape from the insane asylum at Matteawan to which he was committed following his trial for the killing of Stanford White. Thaw made his spectacular flight from Matteawan on August 17 and a few days later was arrested near Coaticook, Que.

Thaw was not present when Governor Felker announced his decision at the state capital. The governor's audience was composed of newspaper correspondents and the attorneys representing the fugitive and the State of New York. Thaw will remain here in the custody of United States Marshal Nute and Sheriff Drew pending the federal proceedings.

Governor Felker said in his statement in part:

"In the matter of the application for the extradition of Harry K. Thaw at present within the State of New Hampshire and an alleged fugitive from justice in the State of New York.

"The sovereign State of New York, by its governor, has demanded of the proper authority of this state, the inter-state rendition of Harry K. Thaw. A proper respect for the public interest manifested therein demands that I should state the views which form the basis of my decision.

"By the petition of Governor Glynn and accompanying papers it appears that the grand inquest of the County of New York has duly returned in open court, indictment against Mr. Thaw. That is sufficient to warrant the arrest, arraignment and trial of the respondent, if he may be found within the state wherein the indictment is pending and it is furthermore safe to establish that Mr. Thaw is—if found in any state or county while such indictment is pending a fugitive from justice.

"The provisions of the federal constitution and the acts of Congress enacted to give force and effect thereto, as construed by the court of last resort upon such matters limit me to the consideration of the questions (1) whether the person demanded has been substantially charged with a crime, and (2) whether he is a fugitive from justice. Such was the decision of the Supreme Court of the United States in the most recent case wherein a sister state demanded of New Hampshire the interstate rendition of a person within her border. *Muncy v. Clough*, 196 U. S. 372, decided in 1903.

"In that case it was decided by a unanimous court in the proceedings in matters of this kind before the governor are summary in their nature. The person demanded has no constitutional right to be heard before the governor on either question and the statute provides for none. To hold otherwise would in many cases, render the constitutional pro-

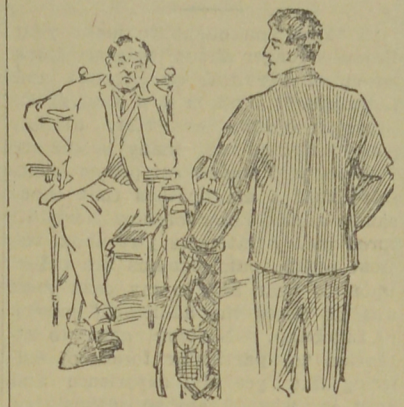
"I have, nevertheless, owing to the urgency of the demands of his counsel, men in whose integrity I have confidence, and for whose opinion I entertain deep respect—given Mr. Thaw the fullest possible opportunity for expression of his case. With profound respect thereto, I am unable to view my duty in the premises as including a consideration of Mr. Thaw's mental condition or his probable guilt or innocence. To do so would hardly be consistent with the mandatory purposes of the constitution that a person charged in any state with treason, felony or other crime, who shall be found in another state, shall, on the demand of the executive authority of the state from which he escapes, be delivered up! It would furthermore involve an attempted supervision by myself over the procedure of courts of criminal jurisdiction of another state in a manner entirely beyond the power of such state to control.

"Such a course would likewise involve an inquiry into the motives of the demanding state in making the request. Any one of these would manifestly lead to the virtual suspension and eventual nullification of the provisions of the federal constitution by states supposed to be subject thereto. I have and I shall continue to assume that the course of the State of New York in its present demand does, and its subsequent conduct with reference to the arraignment of the respondent upon the indictment for which alone the extradition sought is hereby granted, will demonstrate her full appreciation of the dictates of fair play and a righteous and effective administration of justice."

BIRCH MORE USED THAN MAPLE

The popular idea that because Canada is the Land of the Maple, the maple must necessarily be the hardwood of first importance in Canada is incorrect judged by the data gathered by the Forestry Branch of the Department of the Interior at Ottawa.

There are three species of birch of commercial importance in Canada, the black, yellow, and white, or paper birch. The former two have the more valuable wood, but are confined to eastern Canada, whereas the paper birch is found in every province of the Dominion, ranging to the limit of tree growth towards the north and growing well within the Arctic circle in the McKenzie River basin and in the Yukon.

It is this wide range which contributes largely to its present importance, but the qualities of the wood promises a still greater use in the future, for it is a strong, hard, fine-grained wood which takes a high polish and can be strained to imitate the more expensive woods, such as mahogany, cherry or walnut. 'Wavy' birch is an accidental form due to cross-grain, somewhat similar to 'curly' maple, and is highly prized for ornamental work. In another recent report issued by the Forestry Branch on the Wood-Using Industries of Ontario, birch is reported as being used in the manufacture of over one hundred different articles, ranging from ships to spoons. As a fuel-wood it takes first place and it is also one of the principal woods used in wood-distillation, while its only objection as a pulpwood is that it is too heavy to be readily floated down the stream to the mills.

Birch also formed 28 per cent. of the square timber reported from Canada in 1912, according to the bulletin on the production of lumber, square timber, lath and shingles for that year, which has been prepared by the Forestry Branch and will shortly be issued. The remainder was largely white pine. Until 1912 the export of square timber had steadily decreased since 1877, but last year showed a surprising increase, the quantity exported in 1912 exceeding that exported in the previous year by almost 90 per cent.

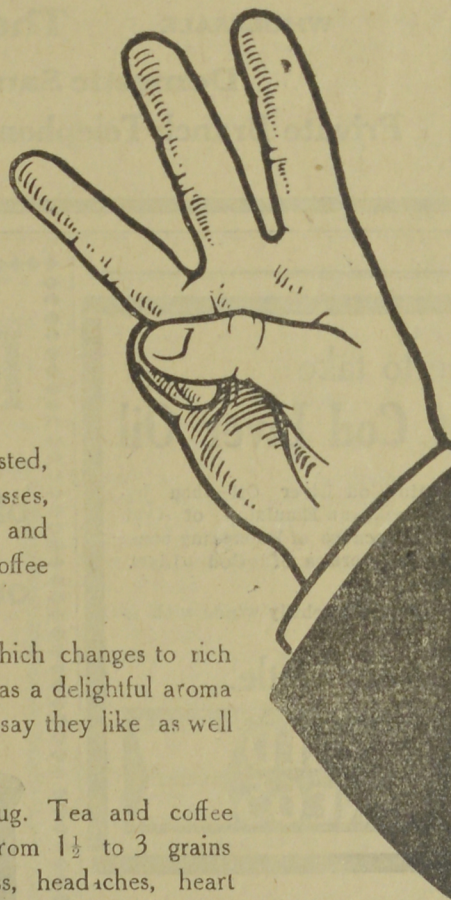
