### KILBANE GOT

#### KNOCK OUT IN THREE MINUTES

Eddie O'Keefe of Philadelphia Lasted  
Just 2 Minutes 40 Seconds With  
Feather-Weight Champ

Philadelphia, Nov. 10—Johnny Kilbane, featherweight champion, picked up the easiest money of his fighting career here tonight when he knocked out Eddie O'Keefe of this city, in two minutes and forty seconds of the first round in the wind-up at the Olympia A.C. A right hand jolt to the jaw spelled O'Keefe's downfall.

O'Keefe did not land a blow. After the handshake the champion jabbed a right left to the head, but Eddie warded this blow off. O'Keefe then essayed to follow Kilbane's action, but Kilbane brushed away the jab with a right guard, then retaliated with a light left jab to the nose.

O'Keefe jumped back after receiving the blow, then got careless enough to attempt to rush back his long hair with his gloves. This left an instant opening for Kilbane and the champion, taking a quick step toward Eddie, shot out his right with terrific force.

The blow landed fair to O'Keefe's chin, his feet shot from under him and he hit the floor with a crash which could be heard all over the building. The crowd was dumbfounded at the sudden ending of the bout and they waited with bated breath as Referee Frank O'Brien counted out the ten seconds. O'Keefe could not have responded in one hundred seconds.
