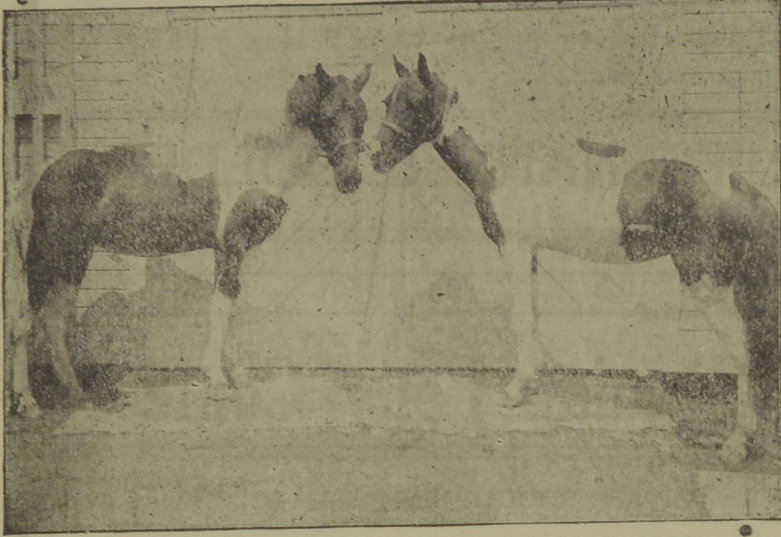


Nine Rules for the SECOND -GRAND- Pony Contest

- RULES FOR A DUNLAP PONY COMMERCIAL CONTEST -

RULE 1.—Any child not over sixteen years of age who is not a child of any employee connected with Business House mentioned in Folders or grandchild or niece or nephew of any of the participating merchants, may become a Contestant in the DUNLAP PONY COMMERCIAL CONTEST by enrolling his or her name at the places of business of all of the merchants who are joint participants in this Contest.

RULE 2.—For all money paid to any of the participating merchants during the progress of this Contest, either on old accounts or on cash business, 25 votes shall be given for each 25 cents so paid; 10 vote coupons and 5 vote coupons may be used at the discretion of the merchant.

RULE 3.—Under no consideration shall the schedule mentioned above be changed nor shall any additional votes be awarded by any merchant at any time during the progress of the Contest. No coupons except those printed by THE DUNLAP PONY COMPANY shall be considered valid coupons.

RULE 4.—A sealed ballot box shall be placed in the store or office of each participating merchant for the reception of said votes. Said box shall be opened by said merchant in exactly two weeks from the date on which this Contest starts. The votes contained in said box shall be counted by him or by parties selected by him and the result of said counting shall be kept a secret.

RULE 5.—Said ballot box shall be opened every two weeks thereafter during the progress of the Contest; the ballots counted in like manner and the result thereof kept a secret.

RULE 6.—As an incentive to the early casting of votes and to facilitate the counting thereof, the following bonuses shall be given. The votes cast for each Contestant during the first period shall be increased 50 per cent. In other words, if Contestant A has 100,000 votes and Contestant B 90,000 votes, 50 per cent. shall be added to the vote of each so that A will be credited with 150,000 and B with 135,000 votes.

RULE 7.—The votes cast for each Contestant during the second period shall be increased 40 per cent.; the votes cast for each Contestant during the third period shall be increased 30 per cent.; the votes cast for each Contestant during the fourth period shall be increased 20 per cent.; the votes cast for each Contestant during the fifth period shall be increased 10 per cent.; the votes cast for each Contestant during the last, period shall not be increased at all.

RULE 8.—At the conclusion of the Contest three disinterested judges shall be selected by said merchants who shall tabulate the results certified to them by each participating merchant and shall award the Grand Prize of the Shetland Pony, Carriage and Sleigh and Harness to the child who has received the greatest number of votes.

RULE 9.—Each merchant agrees to carefully keep his records and not to divulge the contents thereof to any Contestant, to any of their friends or to any other participating merchant. By so doing no one will know who is in the lead at any stage of the Contest.

HARTFORD WINNER OF EASTERN ASSOCIATION

New Haven, Sept. 5.—The Eastern Baseball Association's schedule will be completed tomorrow. Hartford takes the championship pennant beyond dispute, as the team can lose its remaining games and then easily beat out its rival, New Haven. The latter team held the lead and had championship aspirations until three weeks ago. Hartford took a spurt and New Haven a slump, and the emblem of leadership goes to the capital city for the first time in years.

UHLAN MADE NEW MINNESOTA TROT RECORD

Hamline, Minn. Sept. 5.—The State trotting record of 2:05, established by Cressius on Aug. 31, 1901, was broken by the champion Uhlan today when the great steed went against time on the Hamline track. Billings' trotter circled the mile in the wonderful time of 1:59.

The king of trotters fairly flew through the air and made the first quarter in 30 seconds flat. The half mile was negotiated in 59 seconds and the three-quarters in 1:30.

Coming down the homestretch, Uhlan let out a tremendous burst of speed and with the pacemaker setting a beautiful pace and Doc Tanner urging him on the great trotter crossed the wire in 1:59.

The crowd rose to its feet as Uhlan came down the stretch and cheered madly. When the timekeepers hung up 1:59 the 15,000 in the stands gave Uhlan and his driver, Doc Tanner, one of the greatest ovations ever tendered anybody at the State Fair.

RITCHIE FAVORED OVER WELSH

Vancouver, Sept. 7.—Willie Ritchie world's lightweight champion, did his first boxing yesterday in preparation for his world's title match with Freddie Welsh on Sept. 20. Ritchie weighs 139 pounds. Welsh has been training for a week. Odds at present are 10 to 7 on Ritchie.

GREAT RUGBY PLAYER OF WALES PASSES AWAY

D. H. Bowen Member of Welsh Rugby
Union for Twenty Years--Famous
Drop-Kicker

The death has occurred at Gray's fields, Llanelly, of Mr. D. H. Bowen, head master of Bynea Council School and one of the most prominent men in Welsh Rugby football. For twenty years Mr. Bowen was a member of the Welsh Rugby Union. He represented Wales in the international councils from 1883 to 1887 and since has officiated as referee in international matches in England, Scotland and Ireland. In his football days he won many matches by long drop kicking, his sensational feat of drop kicking a goal from his own "25" against the Meories in October, 1887—the only points scored in the match—being still remembered. Mr. Bowen who was forty-nine years of age, leaves a widow and nine children.

THREE NEW PLAYERS FOR CHICAGO CUBS

Chicago, Sept. 5.—Pres. Murphy of the Cubs, today announced the signing of three new players. They are J. J. O'Connor, a right-handed pitcher from the University of Illinois; Willis Valandingham Hieronymus, a right-handed pitcher from Clinton county, O., and Charles Pauwen, a first baseman, who has been playing semi-professional baseball here.

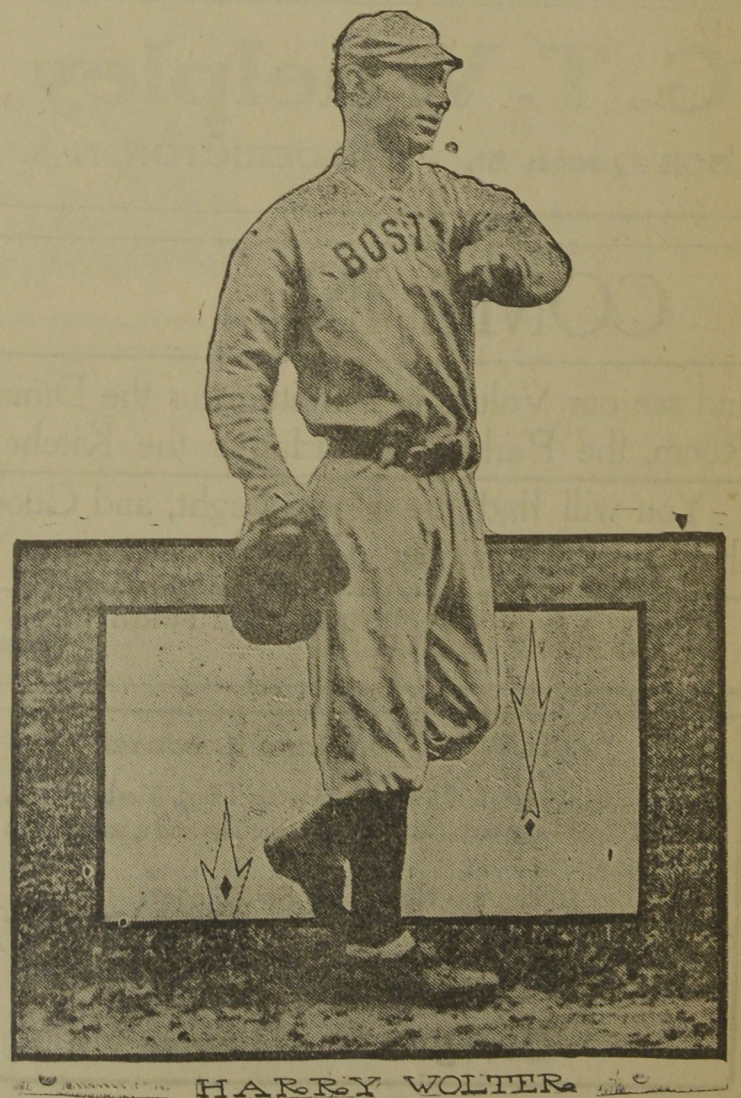
