DAIRYING INDUSTRY IN THE WEST

Cardston, Alta., Aug. 30.—No feature of the commercial development of Southern Alberta in recent months has been so marked or called forth more favorable comment than the rapid growth and expansion of the dairying industry in the Cardston district. Owing to the abundance of grass and water, the country to the west of the town is now receiving the special attention of the dairymen, who express the belief that Cardston will eventually take its place as the leading dairy centre of the West. At one of the local creameries the management is now showing something like 300 cheeses, with weight running from 15 to 80 pounds each, this amount of cheese exceeding in value probably the cost of the entire plant. A steadily expanding market for dairy products is now available at Lethbridge and other important centres.

CATHRINE OF RUSSIA

"Semiramis of the North" Held Her Own Among Contemporaries.

Catherine II, the "Semiramis of the North," came to the throne a little over 151 years ago—July 10, 1762.

Catherine, daughter of the Prince of Anhalt, was born at Stettin in 1729. She had a hard time of it in her childhood, her mother being as mean to her as Frederick the Great's father was to him. At 16 she was married, against her will, to Peter, Duke of Holstein. Peter was a big, strapping animal of a fellow, but a degree or two above idiocy. He passed most of his time flirting with low women and playing with dogs and rats.

This fact explains, though it does not justify, Catherine's various little flirtations on her own hook.

By the death of Elizabeth, the semi-diotic dog fancier became Czar in 1762, but he was almost immediately set aside in favor of Catherine. So far as intellect and will power went the Princess of Anhalt was well qualified for the big place that came to her. She was well read in history, philosophy and literature; had absorbed, in fact, most of the knowledge of her time, and was mentally able to fill any throne on earth. She proved to be a great sovereign, as sovereigns went in those days. She made Russia powerful, and was in many ways a worthy successor to Peter the Great.

But the magnificence of her court, the marvelous extent of her dominions, her foreign conquests, and the imposing position she held among the "majesties" of the world could not hide the fact that at heart she cared but little for the Russian people, and did but little for the promotion of their political, social and economic advance.

Catherine demonstrated to perfection the fact—that at that time somewhat in dispute—that a woman could fill a throne as well as a man, but she also proved that the woman sovereign can be as cruelly unjust as the man sovereign; for was not Catherine one of the leading spirits in the partition of Poland, the "foulest deed in the history of the world?"

The Ever Busy Bee.

The life of the bee has been extolled to us as a virtuous, industrious, satisfactory sort of affair. Among other insects and animals, which have been presented to us as models of social and domestic propriety and felicity, the bee has always held an important position. We have been told that we should consider the ant and the tree toad and the early bird and the caterpillar, but the all-round example is the ever busy bee.

There should, however, be a limit to all things and there is such a thing as being too ambitious and too industrious. A hive of bees has been drowned in its own honey. It may have been the fault of the warm weather, but the bee made a big mistake in making honey this kind of weather. The bees were occasionally drowned in the fruits of their endeavor, but the fruits of their endeavor are not often so messy as honey—a most uncomfortable sort of thing to be drowned in.

Insects are the busiest and perhaps the most useless creatures there are, and the ambition which stirs a bee to industry at such unseasonable hours deserves a tragic death. Everybody is busy all the time trying to get ready to enjoy himself when the best way to have a good time is to enjoy doing nothing at all.

Remarkable Memories.

When this feat was once mentioned to his great rival, Disraeli, the latter remarked, nonchalantly: "That is quite simple. I could do the same sort of thing myself within an hour." Canadian Immigration.

Into a booklet of thirty-two pages issued by direction of the Hon. W. J. Roche, Minister of the Interior, has been packed quite a mass of information on the subject of Canadian immigration. The figures are brought down to include those of the fiscal year 1912-1913, which again broke all records in the number of British-born persons entering the Dominion. From 123,013 in 1910-11, it rose to 138,121 in 1911-12, and in the following year to 150,542. During those three years the corresponding figures from the United States were: 121,451, 133,715, and 139,000, and from other countries 66,620, 82,406, and 112,881. The total immigration for 1912-13 was 402,432.

SIZES OF SILOS

Depend Upon Amount of Silage Required—How to Determine

The amount of silage required and the size of silo needed to hold it can be quite closely calculated provided the number and kind of animals to be fed from it are known before building.

An average cow or beef animal may be fed about thirty-five pounds of silage per day and the usual period during which silage is used in this latitude will be about 210 days. Large animals, or those that are being fattened, may consume considerably more than thirty-five pounds per day, but this has been found a fair average.

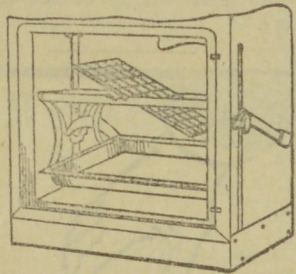
In a silo of ordinary depth, the average weight of the silage is about forty pounds per cubic foot. Near the top of the silo, however, where the pressure is not great, it will weigh only twenty-five pounds per cubic foot, while at the bottom of a thirty-five foot silo it may weigh sixty pounds. Taking these averages, if a cow eats thirty-five pounds of ensilage in a day, she will eat thirty-five fortieths, or seven-eighths, of a cubic foot per day; and with this as a basis it is easy to determine the number of cubic feet of ensilage required to feed a cow or any number of cows throughout the season. The diameter of the silo must be such that the stock on hand can use one or two inches of silage off the top each day during the winter, and at least three inches per day when summer feeding of silage is to be practiced. This is necessary to keep the silage from spoiling.

A silo ten feet in diameter is adapted to feeding ten mature cattle. One twelve feet in diameter will feed fifteen head, and one fourteen feet in diameter will meet the needs of twenty head; but if there are thirty or more cows to feed a sixteen-foot silo should be erected. These silos should be thirty or forty feet, or even more in height.—A. D. Wilson.

IMPROVED BROILER

Revolves on Pivot and Meat Can be Done on Either Side

An improved type of broiler for gas ovens has been invented. It can be moved up and down in the oven and turned about so that the meat is done equally on both sides. The broiler proper is pivoted to a framework that moves up and down in grooves on the inside end walls of the oven. By a lever outside this framework it is operated. Like most broilers it is in two hinged sections that receive the meat between them. When they

are locked the device can be revolved at will. A removable drip pan sets in the lower portion of the framework to catch the drippings from the steak, chops, or whatever the meat may be. The advantage of being able to move the broiler up and down is that you can get it close to the flame or some distance off, according to whether you want it done quickly or slowly.

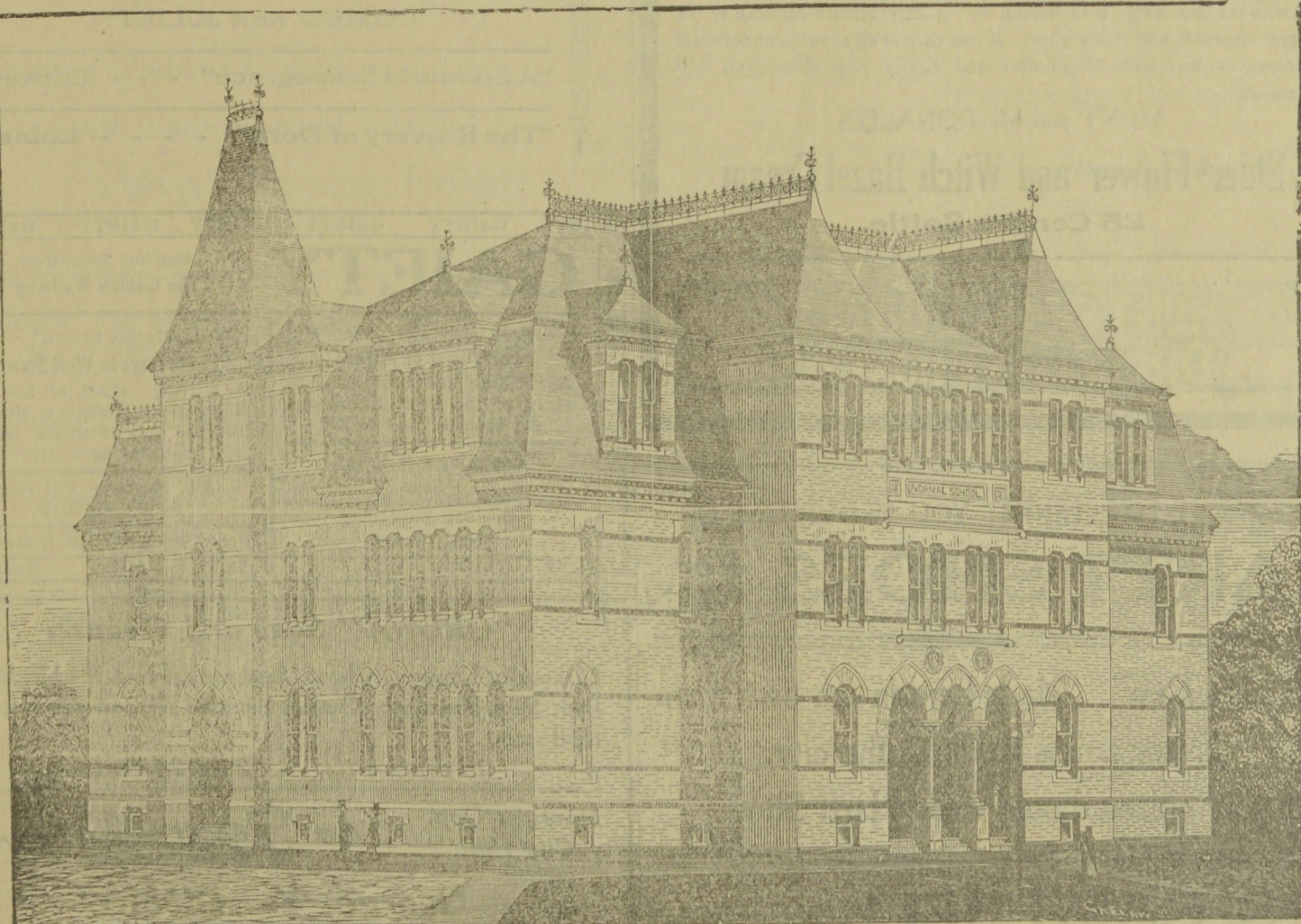
