FOR AMATEUR GOLF TITLE

New York, Sept. 1.—The national amateur championship tournament, one of the biggest events of the year in the golfing world, is to be staged this week on the links at Garden City, L.I. The program was opened today with a medal play qualifying round at thirty-six holes. Tomorrow the first round of match play at thirty-six holes will be run off, with subsequent rounds for a similar distance carded for each day following until the decisive test on Saturday. The east, the middle west and the Pacific Coast sections have sent their best amateur players to compete for the honors. Chief interest, of course, centres largely in the performances of those rated among the leaders on the list, with the climax at the top, where for the first time, Jerome D. Travers, three times the national title holder, stands alone.

BRADEN DIRECT MADE SEASON'S RECORD MONDAY

Stepped First Heat of Free-for-all in 2.02 1-4—Tenara led Field in Charter Oak

Hartford, Conn., Sept. 1.—With clear skies, a fast track and a holiday crowd, in excess of 80,000, the Grand Circuit races at Charter Oak Park were ushered in today with some fast racing and exciting finishes and featured by the fastest heat of the season. Braden Direct set the new season's record of the first heat of the free-for-all pace when he stepped the mile in 2:02½ and in the third heat this time was equalled when Earl Jr. came through a winner and took first money. Tenara, the mare that has been the sensation of the season, coupled her fourth big race when she led the field in the historic Charter Oak stake of \$10,000 in straightheats. In the 2:24 trot selling, McDonald drove Allenworthy through in easy fashion.

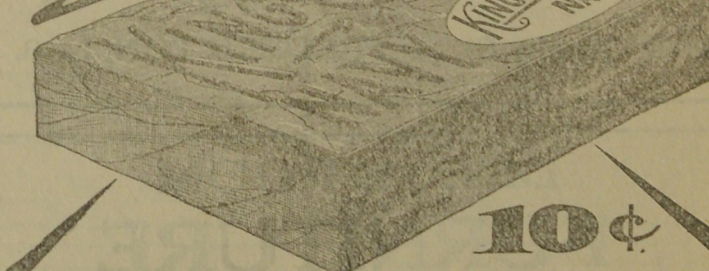
DREW OF SPRINGFIELD EQUALLED SPRINT RECORD

Hartford, Conn., Sept. 1.—Howard P. Drew, the Springfield, Mass., high school sprinter today equalled the world's record in the 100 yards dash on Charter Oak track at the Connecticut Fair, going the distance in 9 3-5 seconds. Five stop watches caught the time as 9 3-5, and this time was officially announced, but it was given out later that two stop watches had caught 9 2-5.

Following the 100 yard dash Drew ran the 220 yards in 22 seconds flat. The silver loving cup, given to the team winning the most points was awarded to the New Haven Athletic Club, whose points totalled 26, and second prize went to the Pastime A. C., of New York.
