WIFE NOW LIVING
IN MONTANA

Thos. H. Bulyea of Brighton Brings Suit--Defendant Has been Married to Another for Nineteen Years

Papers have been filed with Mr. H. G. Fenety, registrar of the Divorce Court, in the suit for absolute divorce brought by Thomas Henry Bulyea against Annie Maria Bulyea. The plaintiff resides in the Parish of Brighton, Carleton county. The defendant, who before marriage to the plaintiff was Miss Tompkins, is now a resident of Kalispell, Montana. Statutory grounds are alleged.

The parties to the suit, according to facts set forth in the libel, were married at Brighton, October 11, 1882, by Rev. Thos. O. Dewitt. They lived together as man and wife until July 25, 1892, when the defendant left her husband. She then went to the town of Minot, Ward county, North Dakota. At that place, in 1894, she went through the form of marriage with George Wilson, a resident of Minot, and has since lived with him as his wife.

Mr. Marvin L. Hayward is proctor for the plaintiff.

The case will come before His Honor Judge McKeown at the October term of the Divorce Court. There promises to be a very heavy docket for that term, the cases probably numbering about fifteen.

IN ATTENDANCE

Number of Students is Slightly Below That of Last Two Years--Two New Members on Teaching Staff

The Provincial Normal School opened this morning for the academic year 1913-14. The principal, Dr. H. V. B. Bridges, announced today that the total attendance is 301. This is slightly less than that of last year, when the attendance was 308. In 1911-12 the institution had the largest attendance on record, 327.
