DID HIS DUTY

How the King, When a Prince, De-
ferred to Discipline

Presiding at a meeting at Devonshire House in connection with the "Duty and Discipline" movement, the Earl of Meath said: "We have in the King one who recognizes the meaning of the words 'duty' and 'discipline'."

On one occasion, said the Earl, the King, then a Prince and naval officer, arrived at Gibraltar, and rowed for an hour and a half in the teeth of a gale in order to pay respect to a senior officer.

On another occasion an order was given to the Prince to run out a torpedo-boat when he much desired to attend Goodwood Races. His senior officer suggested that perhaps the Prince could arrange with someone else to take his place. "No," he replied, "if it is the same to you, sir, I would rather do my duty."

The object of the Duty and Discipline movement is to bring home to parents and teachers the danger of allowing children to grow up without control.

Collapsible Tubes For Butter

They want butter in collapsible tubes in India. The heat is so intense there that it is almost impossible to pack butter in tubs or tins, as it is fluid almost from the moment it is made. Then again, it spoils rapidly when exposed to the hot, moist air. This seriously retarded the efforts of the Government to stimulate the dairy industry. So the Director-General of Commercial Intelligence opened negotiations with the makers of machinery for the manufacture and filling of such tubes as are used for oil-paints, vaseline and tooth pastes. One of those manufacturers says the tubes would have to be made of pure tin, as the volatile fatty acids of the butter would act upon lead and copper and form poisons. And such parts of the filling machines as are now made of copper would have to be of porcelain.

Skins Improve Flavor

New Zealand cattle raisers have found that the meat of dressed calves retains its flavor better when exported long distances if the skins be left on until ready for market.

Sugar For Wounds

Sugar has been added to the list of antiseptic and aseptic dressings, and we are told it not merely preserves the cells, but furnishes a nutrient element for them.

Wholesale Smuggling

Wholesale smuggling of horses, cattle and grain across the Canadian border, amounting to thousands of dollars, was unearthed by Collector of Customs Judson La Moure, Jr., of the district of North and South Dakota and Northwestern Minnesota. According to information from Hallock, Minn., near the centre of the smuggling district the operations were carried on along the border between St. Vincent and Warroad, Minn. There is no customs port between these two points, which are about 100 miles apart.

London City and Midland Bank has passed the Lloyds Bank and is now the biggest bank in the world, with deposits of \$450,000,000.

OLDEST LIVING THING

The Famous Cypress in the Church-
yard of Santa Maria del Tule

In southern Mexico there stands the oldest living thing in the world—the famous cypress in the churchyard of the village of Santa Maria del Tule. The tree is situated in the intendancy of Oaxaca, a few miles east of the city of that name. Experts judging by the gigantic bole of the Santa Maria del Tule cypress and by the slow growth of the species, have estimated the age of the monster to be between 5,000 and 6,000 years. These figures are staggering to the imagination. Taking the lowest computation, when the seed from which the tree sprang fell upon the earth, King Menes was reigning in Egypt—3,000 B. C. When Cheops drove his subjects with the lash to the labor of building the great pyramid, it was a slender stripling of 200 years. And it had reached a lusty youth of 1,500 years when the Hebrews made their exodus from the land of the Nile.

The discovery of America and the conquest of Mexico by Cortes would seem, in its life, things of only a few months ago. The last scientific measurement of the Santa Maria del Tule cypress was made by Dr. von Schrenk in 1903, a century after Humboldt discovered it, while on his famous tour of equatorial America. Dr. von Schrenk found that its trunk, four feet from the ground, had the astounding girth of 126 feet.

Before the broad and towering bulk of this one life, which has persisted without interruption since the date of the dawning of history, Dr. von Schrenk halted in awe. Had the foliaged creature possessed eyes and a tongue, what treasures of information could it have added to the annals of man. What revolutions in Mexico it could have related, what rises and falls of monarchies and civilizations in tropical America.

But flights of fancy gave way to immediate scientific duties. Authorities on trees had declared the discovery of the approximate age of this cypress to be one of the most important problems in arboriculture. They had expressed a hope that the new scientist who should visit the ancient living monument would not fail to complete the evidence needed.

The Mayor of Santa Maria del Tule, however, opposed a barrier of adamant. Measure the circumference of the tree? Surely. Photograph it? Indeed, yes. But to take an instrument and bore from the trunk a plug two feet deep and one-half an inch in diameter? Horrors, no!

In vain Dr. von Schrenk urged that this experiment had been made hundreds of times without damage to trees, and that by counting the rings shown on the plug he could learn the tree's average rate of growth and thus solve one of the greatest scientific problems of the world. The Mayor was all humility and submissiveness. Anything he possessed was at the disposition of the scientist. But touch the tree he should not.

So Dr. von Schrenk was compelled to content himself with measuring the bole and taking some photographs of the tree. He also observed a wood tablet which Humboldt 100 years before, had nailed to the tree the unimpaired vitality of which for all its fifty centuries, had been shown by a growth of bark covering the tablet.

FAST RESOURCES

Some Statistical Facts About British
Columbia

British Columbia has an area of about 253,000,000 acres, of which about 1,600,000 acres is composed of lakes in the interior. There are over 100,000 acres of timber land of no value for farming other than for stock purposes, and while it is estimated that 3,000,000 acres are either under cultivation or partly so, statistics show that the actual yielding acreage, other than for grazing purposes, is not more than 250,000 acres.

It is stated that with the exception of Siberia, Brazil and the Northwestern United States, British Columbia's timber wealth is unparalleled in any other country. The investigations of the forestry branch show that there are not less than 100,000,000 acres of forest land in British Columbia and that the total stand of commercial timber amounts to about 300,000,000,000. Taking the present lumber output of the province as a basis of figuring, which is about 1,250,000,000 feet per annum, and making no allowance for annual growth, it would take nearly 250 years to use up merely the mature timber now standing.

In the production of copper British Columbia stands first among the provinces, the output amounting to more than a third of that of all Canada. Fishing is one of the province's chief industries, and the vessels of all kinds which enter Vancouver total up to over ten thousand per year.

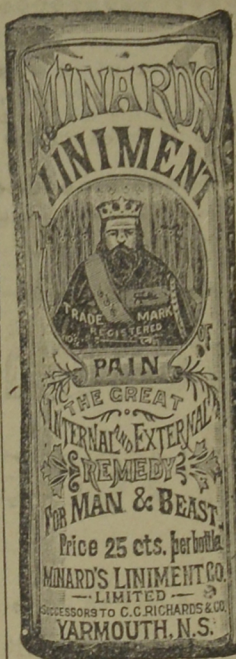
