CURIOUS FISH

Remarkable fish have been captured in depths of from one thousand to two thousand fathoms in the Atlantic, and brought to the surface. The majority of those living at great depths were jet black. Their luminous portions which light up the dark regions which they inhabit are marvellous.

These fish plough through the dark waters like flaming torches. Some have elongated snouts, with luminous tips emitting great volumes of light. Others have rows of luminous cells on top of and below their bodies, with reflectors and lenses which serve the function of projecting light in definite directions. This light serves the purpose of illuminating the surrounding water to avoid foes, to recognize their own kind or to capture prey.

The greatest depth found by soundings was until lately 5,239 fathoms, or 31,614 feet—nearly six miles. This is a point in the Pacific ocean off the coast of Guam, about 100 miles or so. But a surveying ship of the German navy has recently discovered a deeper spot in the ocean near the Philippines, about forty sea miles off the north coast of Mindanao.

FAITH IN THE NORTH

Peace River Man Looks for a Gold Rush Some Day

Big and bronzed, Sheridan Lawrence of Peace River, unfolded some interesting tales of the northland while on a visit to Winnipeg. For instance, he discovered to the world another Dr. Grenfell, another Dr. Luke of Labrador, in the person of a fine old man named Baldwin, who ministers to the wants to the settlers and the Indians and takes what they can give in return, perhaps a load of wood or the carcass of an elk, but more often his services are free.

That there will some day be a gold stamped to the Peace River is the prophecy of the northerner. In the sand bars of all the rivers there is gold, he said, but so far it could not be panned in paying quantities.

It is 600 miles by water from Edmonton to Fort Vermilion and measured by the map the distance between the two points as the crow flies is almost as great as between Moose Jaw and Edmonton, but here is the word of this man, who has lived at the northern point for over a quarter of a century, that grain planted later matures at the same time as the cereals of Alberta and Saskatchewan. The summer days are longer in the north, with more sunlight, hence the result.

"The conditions in the country are practically the same as when I entered it 26 years ago," said Mr. Lawrence. "Fur trading is the chief occupation. Good prices are paid and there is no want among the Indians. Independent traders have corrupted the morals of the tribes to a certain extent and they are not accorded the same credit as in the early days when they dealt exclusively with the Hudson's Bay, but the Indians are being taught some bitter lessons and they are improving. So far as I can see the Indians are decreasing somewhat in numbers."

In answer to a question as to how he came to go away up into that country where the mail comes in ten times a year, passing all the fertile lands of the west, Mr. Lawrence said that in the early days his uncle, E. J. Lawrence, was located at Fort Vermilion as a church missionary. This uncle induced his father to leave Frontenac county, Ontario, and go up there as farm instructor. They went via Calgary 26 years ago, traveling all the way in carts across an unbroken prairie to the Athabasca River.

They grow to immense size, and will produce a good many tons of roots per acre on good soil, are easily stored with little expense, and are highly relished as a part of the daily ration throughout the winter months.

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
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MUCH TROUBLE GETTING SOLDIERS

Canadians None Too Willing to Leave Their Jobs For Training at Annual Camps

That Canadians are a war-like people when their home or liberty is threatened or when the Motherland requires assistance, has been amply evidenced by the part taken by Canadian militiamen in the war of 1812-15, in the Fenian Raids of 1866 and 1870, the Red River Rebellion of 1870, the Northwest Rebellion of 1885, the operations on the Nile and throughout the South African war. But in "the piping days of peace," when the Department of Militia and Defence issues its call to the rural regiments to muster for a two-weeks' training camp, the amateur soldiers are not so ready to respond to the stirring notes of the bugles. Well the officers of the rural battalion understand the effort necessary in recruiting for camp, and they have come to half-dread the annual training period. One of them is authority for the statement that approximately one-half of the members of a rural corps are sons of the farmers, farm hands, and—in legitimate recruited in the regimental recruiting area. The other half are men who, out of work through circumstance or inclination, and without prospect of immediate employment, are ready to shoulder a rifle and draw the Government's good money for two weeks, or four weeks if they can re-enlist with another regiment when the first camp breaks up, as some do.

When a recruit takes the oath and signs the muster roll of a company, he swears that he will turn out with the regiment on all occasions during a period of three years. Less than one-quarter of those enlisting every year ever come to camp again. New men have to be found to take their places in the ranks and the regimental drag net is spread out, bringing in a motley catch.

One reason, of course, for lack of enthusiasm is that the pay is small compared with what an average man can earn in almost any line of industry. The system of efficiency pay is another bone of contention. If a man cannot shoot he cannot get the extra money. Naturally in the eyes of the Militia Department this is a wise provision, but not so does it appear to the recruiting officer. The men whom he should have under his command, the steady, industrious citizens or workmen can earn more money at home and not take any chances of not getting it because they cannot shoot.
