GALE DAMAGED
TELEGRAPH LINES
TO THE WEST

Communication Not Restored Today--
Last Week's Rainfall Equalled
Average for Month--Period
of Fine Weather Expected

Telegraphic communication between the Maritime Provinces and the United States and Canada is interrupted or entirely broken today on account of serious damage done in Maine early this morning to the telegraph lines by the southwesterly gale which followed last week's continuous rain. The gale had the effect of putting an end to nine days rain and a period of fine weather is now expected.

The gale reached its height early this morning, and the damage to telegraph lines was due to its gusty nature. At the observatory at the U. N. B. a wind-velocity of thirty-miles per hour was observed. Western Union and C. P. R. wires to Montreal were damaged the trouble occurring soon after midnight. The damage is extensive.

The gale was accompanied by heavy rain about half an inch falling bringing the total rainfall for nine days up to 4.7 inches which exceeds the average monthly fall.

POTATO SHIPMENTS.

Two potato shippers gave out interviews to the local press last week to the market. One of them, who was interviewed by The Mail, said that the United States market was all right while the other claimed that it was all wrong. It now transpires that the party who condemned the U.S. market has shipped no potatoes there this season while the other is sending forward four and five car-loads a day.

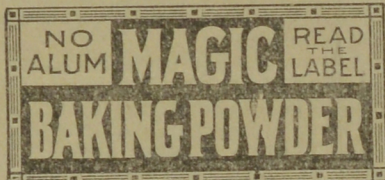
NEW DIVISION
HAS OFFICES AT
C. P. R. STATION

Supt. Sherwood and Engineer H. G. Deedes to be Located Here--Dis-patcher to be at Norton

Officers of the new Fredericton-Norton division of the C. P. R. are to be located in the upper story of the present C. P. R. station. Supt. Sherwood who is to reside in Fredericton will have an office there with members of his staff. The engineering department is also to have its offices in the station building. H. G. Deedes formerly of this city, who has been located at Woodstock for some time in the engineering service of the C. P. R. is to be in charge of this branch on the new division and will reside in Fredericton.

It has been expected that the new offices would be occupied by this time but matters have not moved as swiftly as had been anticipated. Nothing definite is known yet with regard to the hour of the departure and arrival of trains.

It is understood that the train despatching will be done from Norton and not from this city.

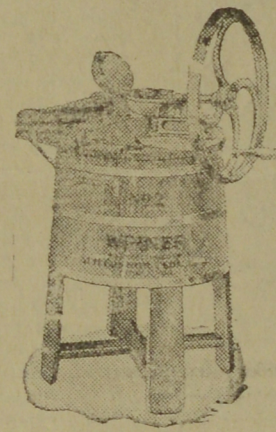
