The Cost of Strikes

The latest available statistics show that during the past 12 years there were 1,319 labor strikes in Canada, involving 319,880 men. Nine million working days were thus lost at a cost to the country of \$18,000,000 figured at an average wage of \$2 per day.

CHEAP FARES TO TORONTO EXHIBITION.

Maritime Province travellers will have their choice of two through vestibuled trains, the Ocean Limited and the Maritime Express, both of which connect at Bonaventure union station, Montreal, with the through Grand Trunk trains for Toronto. It will be well for intending travellers to apply early for reservations.

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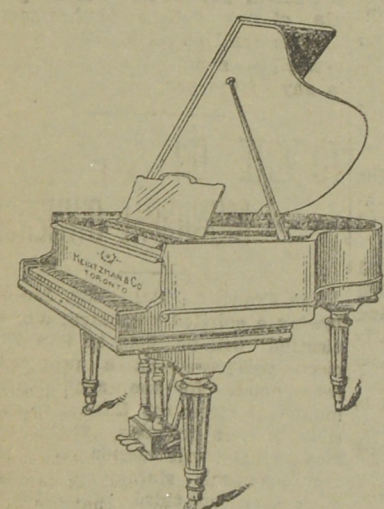
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
