MISDIRECTED ZEAL

The Toronto Saturday Night hands out the following to the Lord's Day Alliance:

"The most recent example of bulldozing in connection with the Lord's Day Act that has been brought to the attention of Saturday Night is an edict whereby the retail merchant who has a slot machine for the sale of chewing gum outside his shop is obliged to bring it indoors over Sunday or put it out of commission during that period. Such a restriction is based on a purely wanton desire to place iron restrictions on the general public during the first day of the week. No one can seriously believe that it imperils the spiritual and moral welfare of anyone to perform the simple act of dropping a penny in the slot and punch out a piece of chewing gum merely because the day is Sunday. Do Sabbatharians assume that even for a man's jaws to work on the Sabbath is a breach of the fourth commandment? The limited coterie which forced these laws on a lethargic community assuredly work their jaws seven days a week, though in a different way. It would be well if this matter could be tested in the courts, since the restriction can have no basis in law. The professed aim of Lord's Day legislation is to abolish unnecessary labor on the first day of the week. Since this involves no labor except on the mechanism of the slot machine the authorities are assuredly straining the statute. Saturday Night would willingly contribute toward the cost of a test case and there are many intelligent citizens ready to do likewise."

Hon. Bob Rogers, who is undoubtedly the greatest political crackman in Canada, indulged in some cheap talk about Laurierism at Vancouver a few days ago. The Hon. Bob is the hero of the McDonald election scandal. The people have already taken his measure and he will find out what they think of him just as soon as Premier Borden musters up sufficient courage to go to the country.

It was very kind of the Borden government to place ticket collectors on the trains running on the Canada Eastern branch of the Intercolonial. There are a great many Tories living in the section of country served by this railway and the twenty thousand dollar manager has come to the conclusion that they need watching.

There seems to be a lot of jealousy between the towns of Chatham and Newcastle. The Maritime Board of Trade met in the latter town this week and the newspapers of Chatham felt so sore over the matter that they refused to take any notice of the meeting.

Hon. George E. Foster, who has just returned from a holiday trip to the Orient, advises Canadians to eat Japanese-grown rice. Men of the stripe of Mr. Foster could exist on a diet of rice, but the general run of Canadians will prefer something more substantial.

DEMOCRATS HOPE TO WIN IN MAINE

Augusta, Me., Aug. 25.—The Democratic campaign in the Third congressional district, where an election is to be held September 8 to choose a successor to the late Congressman Goodwin, was begun today in earnest. The national committee has sent Representatives Cullop of Indiana, Murray of Massachusetts and Reilly of Connecticut to fire the opening guns. Later it is expected Secretary of Commerce Redfield and possibly Speaker Clark will be heard in several speeches. The Democrats have decided to stand squarely by the tariff measure now pending in Congress. The Democratic speakers also will give considerable attention to the Mulhall charges regarding election aid given to former Representative Littlefield of Maine, for many years a Republican leader.

NEWS FORECAST FOR THE COMING WEEK

Washington, D. C., Aug. 23.—The Hague, the capital city of the Netherlands, will be the scene of an event of world-wide interest Friday when ceremonies will be held in dedication of the Palace of Peace. The palace was erected with a \$1,500,000 donation from Andrew Carnegie and is to be the home and headquarters of the international permanent court of arbitration. The dedication ceremonies will be attended by official representatives of the leading nations of the world.

An event that will mark an epoch in the industrial development of a large section of the Middle West will be the dedication of the great power dam that has been built across the Mississippi River at Keokuk, Iowa. The dam is nearly a mile in length and is surpassed in size only by the great Nile River dam at Assouan. It is designed to furnish cheap and abundant electrical power to cities and towns throughout Illinois, Iowa and Missouri.

At the end of the week New York will welcome a most distinguished visitor in the person of Viscount Halsane, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain. Lord Halsane is to visit America in response to an invitation to deliver an address before the convention of the American Bar Association at Montreal. Before proceeding to Montreal he will spend several days in New York and vicinity and will visit West Point and other places of interest.

The sixth annual conference of governors will assemble in Colorado Springs Tuesday for a session of five days. The function of the conference is to bring the state governors together yearly for an exchange of views on subjects of general importance, the promotion of greater uniformity in state legislation and the attainment of greater efficiency in the state administration.

Cornell University, at Ithaca, N.Y., will be the meeting place of another notable international gathering of the week. This will be the Eighth International Congress of Students. The congress is a body of undergraduates from the leading universities of North and South America and of the principal countries of Europe. Its objects are to create a closer international understanding among students of all nations and to consider the problem common to students in every country.

After strangely neglecting its most famous son for many years, the little city of Franklin, N.H., will Thursday pay a real honor to the memory of Daniel Webster. The occasion will mark the completion and dedication of the rehabilitated birthplace of the famous statesman. Memorial addresses are expected to be made by Senator Hoke Smith of Georgia, and Job E. Hedges of New York.

Another observance of historical interest will be the celebration on Wednesday of the centennial anniversary of the battle of Chrysler's Farm. This engagement of the war of 1812 occurred on the Canadian side of the St. Lawrence, below Ogdensburg, between 1600 Americans under General Boyd, and 1500 British troops under Colonel Morrison. The centennial celebration will be held at the scene of the battle and will be participated in by prominent public men and a number of militia organizations of the Dominion.
