(Mayor Hooper did not attend the Grand Lodge meeting.)



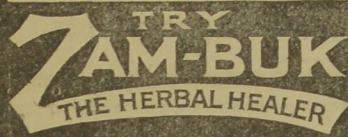

## WHAT HAPPENS WHEN IT THUNDERS

Simple Explanation of Cannonading in the Sky—Little Electric Particles Make Lightning

What is thunder?

Blow air into a perfectly tight paper bag until it is full. Hold the bag so that none of the air can escape and strike it sharply and suddenly. There will be an explosion like the crack of a pistol. That is what thunder is!

The scientific explanation for it is the expansion, compression and sudden escape of air. It is the same thing that happens in a cartridge shell when you press the trigger of a gun or pistol. In fact that is really a better explanation of thunder than the paper bag experiment because it has all the elements that cause thunder. The spark caused by the cap causes the ignition of the powder, forming a gas which pushes the bullet out of the barrel of the gun and when the gas comes in contact with the air, it makes a roaring, crackling sound trying to get through, because the pressure of the gas is greater than the air. The thunder therefore, is the result of the lightning.

Now, what is lightning? We don't know. We know that it is electricity—which is another way of saying we don't know because we don't know what electricity is. But we do have a general idea of what lightning does to make the thunder. There is electricity in the air all the time. Sometimes we feel it more than we do at others—or at least we are more conscious of it being there at one time than at another. This is due to the condition of the atmosphere. If a good breeze is blowing and the mixture of water and gas and dust that we call air is kept stirring we don't feel the electricity much.

But if there is not much of a breeze the air feels heavy and oppressive and seems to be filled with moisture. It is filled with tiny particles of water we call droplets which, when in large groups are rain clouds and when these clouds run into a cool strata of air they condense and form rain drops.

These droplets are curious things—curious because they are so small. It takes 300 trillion of them to make one drop of rain. And it is in the making of the drops of rain that the lightning comes. The surface of every droplet is covered with electricity. This brings out another curious fact. When you take two balls of the same size and make one ball of them you find that the surface of the one big ball is really smaller than the sum of the surface of the two original balls. So that when the 300 trillion droplets form the single drop of rain there is an enormous amount of electricity left over after the surface of the rain drop is covered as full as it will hold.

This great excess has got to go somewhere else. Whenever there seems to be a good place for it to go—to another rain cloud or to the earth a lot of these electrical particles get together and make a sudden break for it, making a lightning flash. They go through the air so fast they heat it considerably.

The heat causes the air to expand, to become greater in volume than it was originally and this volume of air—just like the gas in the gun barrel or the air in the bag when you hit it—has got to distribute itself over the atmosphere and it starts doing so with a roar and a bang just as there is a roar and a bang when the gas is shot out of the gun barrel and when the compressed air is released from the paper bag.

## TARIFF BILL PASSED BY CONGRESS

Washington, Dec. 30.—The Democratic tariff revision bill left the House tonight on what the party leaders hoped would be its last journey. After many hours of debate the House adopted the main conference agreement on the bill, 254 to 103, almost a strict party vote, and by this action gave its endorsement to everything in the measure except the cotton future tax.

At the end of a short but bitter fight that followed the adoption of the report, Representative Underwood, the Democratic leader, succeeded in carrying through the Smith-Lever cotton futures tax amendment by a vote of 171 to 161. Democrats and Republicans alike voted on this without regard to party and a large portion of the Democratic membership from southern states joined in the vigorous demand that the whole subject be carried over to another session of congress.

The cotton futures tax question now rests entirely with the senate. The House concurred in the Clarke amendment put into the tariff bill by the senate but added the Smith-Lever-Underwood plan as another amendment. Unless the senate will accept this change, which has the endorsement of the President, the whole cotton futures plan will again have to be considered in the joint conference committee and again reported to both Houses of Congress for action. The conference report will be called up in the senate early tomorrow by Chairman Simmons of the Finance committee, unless there are unlooked for developments.

Several Democratic senators who are dissatisfied with certain features of the bill today began a demand for a Democratic caucus to consider the conference report before it is taken up in the senate. Senator Reed of Missouri, insisted that unless certain changes were made in rates fixed by she conference committee, he might vote against the report and the tariff bill on its final passage.

## GIANT ICE BREAKER FOR ST. LAWRENCE

Ottawa, Sept. 30.—The department of marine and fisheries has completed plans for the construction of the second largest ice breaker in the world. The vessel is for use on the lower St. Lawrence. The cost is estimated at \$750,000.

A deputation from Sorel waited on the government today to ask that the new vessel be constructed at the Sorel ship yards. The deputation, however, was given little encouragement. The contract will be given to the British firm of Vickers Sons & Max.
