TRAIN AGENTS
WITHDRAWN FROM
CANADA EASTERN

Expensive System Introduced on Intercolonial Some Time Ago Proves Failure--Many Instances of Inefficiency

The train agents on the Canada Eastern Branch of the Intercolonial Railway have been withdrawn and it is said that the train agents on other parts of the system will also be withdrawn. The trial of agents of this kind has proven a most noticeable failure. The agents were most obnoxious to the conductors and other members of the train crew and very unsatisfactory to the public. At a salary of one hundred dollars per month not one agent has proved himself worth the money. Train Agent Fred Youmans of Marysville who was on the Canada Eastern Branch finished his work Wednesday. He has been transferred to the Sussex-St. John route and will work on a milk-train between those points.

Knocking on the part of the people living along the Canada Eastern has been loud and long since the train agents took up their duties. Some of the loudest complaints have come from the railway men. Section-men and other employes travelling to and from their work have been compelled to pay fare. Sharpness in this direction has been counterbalanced by slackness in others for the people along the line soon found out that the train-agents through lack of experience, could not remember for what stations tickets were bought, with the result that frequently a ticket between two stations supplied transportation over the greater part of the branch.

SUPT. SHERWOOD
TAKES RESIDENCE
FOR WINTER

Rents Residence of Mrs. Henry Chestnutt, Waterloo Row--New C.P.R. Line Inspected Yesterday--Marysville Spur Line in Use

Supt. Sherwood of the Fredericton--Norton Division of the C.P.R., has rented the residence of Mrs. Henry Chestnutt, Waterloo Row, and will take possession of it shortly. He will reside there with his family until spring. The new division is to be operated from this city and a number of others who will be connected with it will also be located here with their families, with the result that there will be a considerable influx of population. No announcement has been made yet of the time of the sacking over of the new line by the C.P.R. or of the time-table to be followed by the trains.

The line from Fredericton to Norton was inspected yesterday by General Supt. H. C. Grout of the Atlantic Division of the C.P.R., who was accompanied by Chief Engineer Wetmore of the division, Supt. Sherwood, W. B. Bamford and Mr. Rosemeier, engineer in charge of the Central Railway improvements. The party came from Norton in the private car Rosemeier, Conductor James Sproule being in charge of the special train. Supt. Grout left for St. John last night.




