## PASSED AWAY SUNDAY.

Joseph Patterson died Sunday afternoon at his home, Woodstock Road, in the sixty-eighth year of his age, after a lingering illness with Bright's Disease. A widow, four sons and one daughter survive. They are Willis, Stephen, Leslie, Odour and Stella, all at home. One brother and three sisters also surviving, are George of Hampstead, Mrs. Charles Hamilton of Queens county, Mrs. Rosborough of Hampstead, and Mrs. Stewart of Boston. The funeral will take place Tuesday afternoon at two p.m. Rev. Canon Cowie will conduct the service. Interment will be made at the Rural cemetery.

## JUDICIAL APPOINTMENTS.

The last Canada Gazette contains a notice of the appointment of Sir Frederic Barker as chief justice of the Appeal Division of the N.B. Supreme Court. The other judges appointed to this court are Judges McLeod and White. Judge Landry is appointed chief justice of the King's Bench Division and is to have associated with him Judges Barry, McKeown and Crockett. Of the four members of the King's Bench Division, two reside in Fredericton, one in St. John and one in Dorchester. Two of the Appeal judges reside in St. John and one in Sussex.

## DEATH AT MONCTON.

Mr. H. Thaddeus Stevens, a well known Moncton newspaper man and founder of The Daily Times, died on Saturday, after a brief illness, aged seventy-seven years. Mr. Stevens was for many years a prominent figure in Westmorland County politics, and in 1890 was elected to the Legislature as an opponent to the Blair government. He only occupied the seat for one term as his election was invalidated by the courts and upon offering for re-election he was defeated. Mr. Stevens and his famous yellow valise will be well remembered by the older residents of the city. He met with financial difficulties and lost control of his newspaper soon after his retirement from politics. In 1896 the Liberals appointed him to an office in the stores department of the I.C.R., which he held up to the time of his death.

REV. W. W. BREWER  
PASSED AWAY AT  
GAGETOWN SATURDAY

Deceased Formerly Was Methodist  
Pastor at Fredericton and Marys-  
ville---Funeral at Gagetown  
Tuesday Afternoon

Rev. Waldron W. Brewer, twice pastor of the Fredericton Methodist church and afterward pastor of the Marysville Methodist church and a resident of Penniac for some years, passed away Saturday at midnight at Gagetown, where he had been stationed. Rev. Neil McLauchlan, pastor of the Fredericton Methodist church, announced Rev. Mr. Brewer's death to the congregation at Sunday morning's service and paid tribute to the worth and ability of the deceased. The news of his death has been received with general regret throughout the province. Death came after an illness of some length, nervous prostration being complicated with heart-trouble.

## STRIKING PERSONALITY.

The deceased was possessed of a striking personality, which marked him in any gathering as one who had been specially equipped of Providence for a position of leadership and influence. His fine gifts of oratory made his pulpit and platform deliverances the most popular and large congregations waited upon his ministry. With generous and loving impulses he was the friend of the poor and outcast and gained the esteem

ICY CONDITION  
OF CITY STREETS  
CAUSES ACCIDENTS

Miss Margaret Grieves Seriously In-  
jured Sunday as Result of Fall  
---Horses Fell on Streets---  
Other Accidents

The weather of Sunday and Saturday was such as to make the streets very icy and dangerous. Several accidents to pedestrians and horses are reported. Road Commissioner Jewett has had employees of the Street Department scattering sand on the sidewalks for the benefit of pedestrians.

The most serious accident occurred Sunday morning. Miss Margaret Grieves while on her way to St. Paul's Presbyterian Church slipped on the icy street and fell sustaining painful injuries. She was taken to her home, Regent Street, and Dr. Atherton was summoned. Miss Grieves is reported to be resting easier today. The full extent of her injuries are not yet known but it is feared a hip is broken.

Sunday night a horse with carriage attached fell in Carleton Street and had to be taken out of the shafts before it could be got upon its feet.
