Amherst, N. S., Oct. 7.—There has been a wonderful interest shown in the Methodist Conference of Missions on account of matters centered around domestic missions. The superintendent of home missions for the Maritime Provinces today introduced the affair by outlining the policy of the general missionary

He showed how it took the responsibility of a wise and equitable distribution as it deemed it for the welfare of the whole church that the money raised for missions might go to that object alone and that the domestic fields might become selfsupporting as soon as possible. He was followed by the Rev. Benjamin Hills of Hantsport, who viewed the matter from a minister's point of



If not a rout, the Underwood bill is at least a reverse to the monopoly interests fattenin- behind the protective tariff. REMARKABLE POINT OF VIEW

The new fiscal policy of President Wilson should have a noticeable eflect ere the next annual report of the Department of Trade and Commerce. Judging by current comments a remarkable point of view would appear to prevail in Canada regard-Ing imports and exports and the policy of protective tariffs.

"For every dollar's worth of grain taken from Canada there must be imported at least a dollar's worth of goods in exchange—more than a dollar's worth if the transaction is to be a profitable one for the Canadian producer. Yet there is an opinion being circulated freely through the press that the Underwood tariff will benefiyt the people of Canada, because it may be possible to send produce into the United States without grant ing any concessions, by reducing the customs tax in Canada! The citizens of the Republic have decided to cease taxing themselves by a customs tariff every time they import foods uffs In return for Canadian foodstuffs they will send machinery, clothing. coal-whatever the people of Canada lesire. The tariff will not be reduced in Canada. No concessions! What a triumph! Canadian citizens will continue to tax themselves as usual Certainly the United States consumer will take more Canadian grain and farm produce. But Canadians, generous people will refuse to import anything in return, at most wil time an exchange it made.'
