METHODIST MEET IN MISSION CONFERENCE

Amherst, N. S., Oct. 7.—There has been a wonderful interest shown in the Methodist Conference of Missions on account of matters centered around domestic missions. The superintendent of home missions for the Maritime Provinces today introduced the affair by outlining the policy of the general missionary board.

He showed how it took the responsibility of a wise and equitable distribution as it deemed it for the welfare of the whole church that the money raised for missions might go to that object alone and that the domestic fields might become self-supporting as soon as possible. He was followed by the Rev. Benjamin Hills of Hantsport, who viewed the matter from a minister's point of view.

Dr. Palmer of Sackville Boys' Academy, then gave the home mission problem from a layman's point of view and gave figures which showed that though the population has remained stationary, the givings had risen above thirty-three per cent. in a few days.

Rev. J. W. McConnell of the Sydney circuit, gave them a view of the pastor's standpoint of the work in cities like Sydney.

Col. Moore of Charlottetown, and Judge Chesley of Lunenburg, also spoke of the missionary problems.

Then the Rev. Dr. Heartz led the conference in a discussion of methods of best taking up this work with widening success.

He urged great care in amalgamating its fields or exchanging with the churches union was properly settled. He thought it much better to work along patiently till things shaped themselves for better results.

The discussion which followed showed how jealously these men from all the fields guarded their rights and were anxious to conserve the working of their church at large.

The great Methodist church of Canada has no body of men who more tenderly watch over the affairs of their church than these men of the Eastern Provinces.

LIVE STOCK SHOW AT KANSAS CITY

Kansas City, Mo., Oct. 9.—The annual Royal Live Stock show, one of the principal exhibitions of its kind given in this country, opened at the Kansas City Stockyards today and will continue through the remainder of the week. The showing of fine beef cattle has never been equalled here. More than a score of States and several of the Canadian provinces are represented among the exhibits.

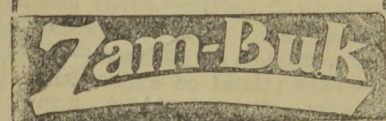

FIRE MARSHALS, CONVENTION

Philadelphia, Pa., Oct. 10.—Many of the leading cities of the United States and Canada were represented here today at the opening of the annual convention of the Fire Marshals' Association of North America. The sessions will continue several days and will be devoted to the consideration of numerous matters relating to fire prevention and fire fighting. A. A. Lindbach of Winnipeg, is the president of the association and the presiding officer of the convention.

OTTAWA TORY PAPER KNOCKS PROTECTION

Ottawa, Oct. 6.—Cabinet Ministers are today threatening to read The Ottawa Citizen out of the party and to cut it off the patronage list. The Citizen, which has shown of late unmistakable signs of independence, thought where the Government's night tariff policy is concerned, came out today with a clear-cut reciprocity editorial apropos of the new American fiscal revolution, and with this editorial was coupled another advocating practically free trade with Great Britain.

In the leading editorial The Citizen says in part: "Tariff reform is now an accomplished fact in the United States. Time alone will show how effectually President Wilson has overthrown the outer stockade of special privilege in America. If not a rout, the Underwood bill is at least a reverse to the monopoly interests fattened behind the protective tariff."

REMARKABLE POINT OF VIEW

The new fiscal policy of President Wilson should have a noticeable effect ere the next annual report of the Department of Trade and Commerce. Judging by current comments a remarkable point of view would appear to prevail in Canada regarding imports and exports and the policy of protective tariffs.

"For every dollar's worth of grain taken from Canada there must be imported at least a dollar's worth of goods in exchange—more than a dollar's worth if the transaction is to be a profitable one for the Canadian producer. Yet there is an opinion being circulated freely through the press that the Underwood tariff will benefit the people of Canada, because it may be possible to send produce into the United States without granting any concessions, by reducing the customs tax in Canada! The citizens of the Republic have decided to cease taxing themselves by a customs tariff every time they import foodstuffs. In return for Canadian foodstuffs they will send machinery, clothing, coal—whatever the people of Canada desire. The tariff will not be reduced in Canada. No concessions! What a triumph! Canadian citizens will continue to tax themselves as usual. Certainly the United States consumer will take more Canadian grain and farm produce. But Canadians, generous people will refuse to import anything in return, at most will take as little as possible, and will insist upon paying a tariff toll every time an exchange is made."
