

# JUNKETING EXPEDITIONS

Junketing expeditions under the auspices of the Public Works department are becoming very common under Fleming rule, and the people who have to foot the bills are wondering what it all means. These expeditions usually travel by auto and head for some point up river. The Valley Railway between this city and Woodstock has been inspected a number of times this season by members of the government, and on one occasion the Lieutenant Governor was taken along to give tone to the affair. The last expedition, which was headed by Hon. John Morrissey, left here on Tuesday 10, to be gone three days. The chief was accompanied by the Secretary of his department, several Valley Railway contractors and engineers, and Dr. Mullin of St. Marys. Making a total of eleven persons. Before leaving they announced that they were to inspect the Valley Railway and some "road diversions." Although they travelled nearly the entire length of York county none of the representatives of this county in the local house received the courtesy of an invitation to accompany them. The reason for this is that none of the York members except the gallant colonel who is now in Europe, are on speaking terms with the Public Works department. They get the cold shoulder every time and they are chumps enough to stand for it. The condition of affairs which has developed in this county under Fleming misrule is a positive disgrace to any community which has representative government. If the members for York are powerless to bring about an improvement they should have the decency to resign their seats. They could bring things to a head in short order if they only had sufficient backbone.

## ROGERS' DECEPTION

Hon. Mr. Rogers is enthusiastic but careless when it comes to denying disagreeable truths. A short time ago The Canada Gazette, the official government publication, announced that the name of the dredge "Sir Wilfrid" had been changed to "P. W. D. No. 117." The pettiness of this attempt to wipe out even the name of the great Liberal leader created much amusement, and the government was unmercifully satirized in the press.

Then Hon. Mr. Rogers tried to retrieve his blunder, with his customary declaration that it was all a lie concocted by the wicked Liberal newspapers. He said they were "false and lying statements" and added: "When they cry and attempt to justify their tears by the statement that I have put through an order in council changing the name of 'Sir Wilfrid' on a government dredge to 'P. W. D. No. 117' they MAKE A STATEMENT THAT IS A DELIBERATE LIE AND FALSE IN EVERY PARTICULAR."

The Canada Gazette of September 13th last, contained the following official government notice:

"Public notice is hereby given that under the provisions of Section 27 of the Canada Shipping Act, the minister of marine and fisheries has granted permission to change the name of the dredge 'Sir Wilfrid' of the Port of Toronto, Ont., official number 112, 186, to that of 'P. W. D. No. 117.'"

P. W. D. stands for Public Works Department. Hon. Robert Rogers is minister of public works. Either the government's official Gazette or Hon. Robert Rogers has made "a statement that is a deliberate lie and false in every particular." The publication of this notice should not have been overlooked.

Premier Borden told a delegation of St. John citizens at Ottawa on Wednesday that the arrangement for running rights for the C.P.R. over the Intercolonial from St. John to Halifax had been made by General Manager Gutelius and that the government had no knowledge of the details. This is certainly a most remarkable state of affairs. It is little wonder that the St. John delegates

decided to remain in Ottawa until they could obtain some satisfactory information. It is quite evident that Mr. Gutelius is under the impression that he is still in the employ of the C.P.R.

Premier Fleming put in a very busy day here yesterday. Among the great men who had an audience with him were Senior Organizer W. B. McKson, Junior Organizer Harry Woods and the redoubtable J. K. Pinder. At last accounts the country was still safe.

The east and west haul, about which much was heard at the last election, has received quite a knock already, so far as the potato trade is concerned. If the upper provinces want New Brunswick potatoes in future they have got to pay more for them.

ing a boat belonging to Mr. Slipp, he went across the river to Cambridge and then rowed into Grand Lake.

Meantime the unfortunate victim of his crime had managed to get clear of her lashings and crawled on her hands and knees to her home. On the return of the neighbors from the funeral her plight was discovered and Dr. Caswell was hastily summoned to attend her. Dr. Caswell fears she will not recover. An examination showed that her ribs had been broken on both sides and that she had sustained other injuries as well. Owing to her advanced age, it is doubtful if she will survive the shock and injuries.

When the old lady revived sufficiently to tell the story of the crime, Sheriff Williams was notified and he started out on the hunt for the young criminal, with a party of deputies. Leslie Slipp and George Colwell, taking a motor boat, started out for Grand Lake and late this afternoon they caught the youth about three miles from The Narrows as he was making for the Washademoak. When captured he was carrying a 22-calibre revolver and a small box of cartridges. He was taken to Gagetown and lodged in the jail.
