ST. JOHN NATURAL PORT
SAYS C. P. R. HEAD

Montreal, Oct. 5.—On his return to Montreal today Sir Thomas Shaughnessy was interviewed about the change in the company's policy in making Halifax the only port of call for the "Empress" steamers during the coming winter.

"St. John," he remarked, "is the Canadian Pacific's winter port, and traffic handled to and from Halifax Atlantic mail service during the past is by grace of the Intercolonial. The few years has been most satisfactory. The call at both Halifax and St. John involved undue risk to the vessels in making the trip between the two ports along the coast of Nova Scotia in all sorts of weather, and east bound passengers who embarked at St. John were necessarily subjected to a delay at Halifax of from twelve to twenty hours each voyage. The company would have sacrificed its interest in the mail subsidy rather than make the two calls again. With St. John the Atlantic terminus of the Company's lines, it would have been natural to adopt that port, but the outlook for steamship traffic during the coming winter made it evident that the facilities at West St. John would be overtaxed if an attempt were made to handle the two "Empresses" there as well as the fleet of other steamships that will make St. John their port this winter.

"The arrangement is only a tentative one and will be subjected to revision when West St. John has the harbor and wharf facilities to properly accommodate the ocean traffic naturally tributary to the port. The company decided upon its policy after the subject had received consideration and the government was no factor in its determination."

the preferred name of most of those who are discontented with the present tide.

The attitude of the church in relation to marriage and divorce will be seriously considered by the convention. An effort is likely to be made so to amend one of the canons of the church that no clergyman of the church will be permitted to perform the marriage ceremony of any divorced person whatever.

The woman suffrage question will not be a legislative subject before the convention but it may be included in the report of the commission on social service as a subject of interest and one on which the church is seeking information. Diocesan conventions with each passing year are more and more granting to women the right of vote in parish affairs, but not the right to hold office.

gain access for Canadian produce to foreign markets. They had achieved the first at once, still further modifying the tariff by a British preference of 25 per cent. and still later of 33 1-3 per cent. They had started an era of railroad development that would in a short time quadruple the mileage in Canada existing at the time they took power and they had had canal schemes in view that would have still further increased the facilities of communication in Canada. As for the third, there had been a marvellous increase in their exports and it was in the course of trying to still further enlarge the markets of Canada by securing for Canadians entry into the great country to the south that they lost power. The people had decided otherwise.

TORY RULE DISASTROUS.

The speaker then turned his attention to the two years since the Conservative government had come into power.

"I address the partisans of the Borden government," he said. "I ask them if the country is as prosperous as it was then. I await a response from any honest man. They are silent. Well, listen to the response from their conscience, it is that the country is not as prosperous as it was."

Sir Wilfrid said that there might be some circumstances beyond the control of the government affecting this, but the fact remained that the country was not so prosperous and that real estate had diminished in value and was more difficult to sell, that money was scarce, that laborers had no work and that their salaries did not increase, although the cost of living did. Speaking of the increase of the Canadian market through the new American tariff, Sir Wilfrid pointed out, in a short comparison of the present tariff with the reciprocity agreement, that the benefits conferred under the latter would have been much greater. He told of Mr. Foster's visits to China and Japan to make trade treaties and their ignoring of the natural market right at their doors.

CANADA NAVY NECESSARY.

He could find little that the Borden government had done except discover an "emergency" that does not exist. In explaining why the Laurier government had decided on a navy, Sir Wilfrid pointed out that at the time of Confederation there was no need for one, but by 1909 their seaborne shipping and commerce had increased to such an extent that one was necessary. There was no country in the world of the population of Canada with a maritime boundary that did not have a navy. It was so self-evident when the first proposition was introduced in the House of Commons that every one, Conservatives, Nationalists and Liberals, had voted for it except Mr. Monk, who was home in bed, not considering the matter sufficiently important. The law they had made was still on the statutes in spite of the solemn promises made by the Tories and Nationalists before the election. They had come their proposal to give \$35,000,000 to Great Britain on the score of urgency. The last word had not been heard on the question and the country would yet understand the error they had made in 1911.

"Have we in Canada lost the strength of our arms, the keenness of our minds, the vigor and enterprise of our characters that we depart from all the traditions belonging to our constitutional system and attempt to send thirty-five million dollars to Great Britain to build ships on the ground that we cannot do it for ourselves or man them when built?"

COUNSELS OF DESPAIR.

"It was a bad time for the nation when such counsels of despair obtained at the head of the government, but as sure as the sun disappeared for a time at nightfall and reappeared as brightly as ever next day, so would the Liberals of Canada come once more to the conduct of affairs in Canada with the truly national policy to which they had already given their adherence."
