

**Pays Women's Passage**



Merchants of Magdeburg, Germany, organized a school to train young women who wish to become clerks.



Coins Laid on Chute and Tilted into Customer's Hand

It is rather surprising the number of devices patented for the purposes of delivering change into a person's hand. And in view of their number it is still more surprising that so few are in use, for it is often extremely annoying to have to pick up money from a glass showcase, or some other smooth surface. A man has designed a little chute for this purpose. A chute is mounted on movable links,

rising from a comparatively heavy base. When the coins are placed in this chute it is tilted forward and the change is slid neatly into the customer's hand, no clawing of the counter is necessary. After this operation is performed the chute automatically flies back into place, owing to a spring attachment, and is ready for the next visitor.

At the British Association Prof. W. H. Cadman, an archaeologist, announced that he had discovered the old Egyptian secret in poultry-breeding. Egypt, it is known, turned out 130,000,000 poultry annually from native incubators which were used in the same form for 5,000 years. **CORPORAL PUNISHMENT**

Teacher Must be a Psychologist to Know When to Apply it

Corporal punishment in schools is a subject which is brought into the public eye every so often. It is a topic with painful memories for most people and one which is heatedly discussed among the parents of school children, but the average grown-up still believes that corporal punishment is a good thing. Discretion should be used in the application of the rod, however, and it is in the lack of discretion among some school teachers where the system of corporal punishment is weak. There are children who can understand nothing quite so well as a "licking," but there are also children to whom a blow is a serious nervous shock. It is more or less a matter of temperament, which, despite the protests of the press agent, is not the exclusive possession of theatrical stars. The best school teacher must be more or less of a student of psychology and must be able to distinguish between "bad boys" and thoughtless ones.

It must be admitted that there are "bad boys." True, they generally turn out to be the best of men, but they are boys who need an occasional and sometimes frequent applications of the cane or strap, whichever happens to be the favorite weapon of the teacher. To them it is an honor to be "licked," and they display their bruised hands with considerable pride. But to the nervous, sensitive child corporal punishment does more harm than either the teacher or parent may imagine. It bruises the spirit more severely than the flesh. Such a child grows up timid and fearful, shrinking from expected blows before they are threatened.

It is rather a pity that school teachers are not better paid. If they are worth anything at all, they are worth at least double what they receive at the present time. They hold almost supreme power over the children in their classes; it is to them that the rising generation looks for guidance and knowledge, yet they receive what is hardly better than a pittance.—Vancouver Sunset.


