Changes in Borden Cabinet Will be Announced Soon

Montreal Independent Paper Says That a Big Shake up is on the Tapis—Doherty to Become Chief Justice and Nantil will go to Railway Commission—Cochrane and Coderre Will Also Get Out

Montreal, Nov. 6.—The information was imparted to a Daily Mail representative yesterday that a number of changes in the Borden cabinet are on the tapis; and, that though they may not be announced in the immediate future, they will be un fait accompli before many months are over. From time to time in the past few months there have been rumors that some minor changes in the cabinet were in contemplation, but the present report, which is given on the highest authority, involves nothing less than the retirement of some of the most important members and an entire reconstruction of the cabinet.

A most interesting statement is that Hon. Charles Doherty, the present minister of justice, is slated for the chief justiceship of Canada, and that he will take his seat on the

Supreme Court Bench just as soon as the time is opportune. The chief justiceship will be held for a short while longer by Sir Charles Fitzpatrick, but that distinguished jurist has other ambitions. One of the most active figures in the political arena during the earlier days of the Laurier regime, he has never been entirely satisfied with the tameness of a judicial position.

He has been able to somewhat vary the monotony and keep up his interest in public affairs by acting at intervals as administrator during the absence of the governor general and has never lost an opportunity in that capacity to strike the public eye. For instance, only a few weeks ago, he appeared at the laying of the cornerstone of the Carter Memorial, and made a notable speech. Sir

Charles Fitzpatrick will, as soon as arrangements can be made for the taking over of his judicial office by his successor, retire from the Supreme Court Bench and proceed to England either as high commissioner for Canada, in succession to Lord Strathcona, or as a member of the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council.

MEIGHEN FOR JUSTICE.

As to Mr. Doherty's successor as minister of justice, it is expected that it will be Hon. Arthur Meighen, the present solicitor general, who is now in training for the position.

Several of the present members of the Borden cabinet are in anything but good health and are anxious to retire. Hon. Frank Cochrane, minister of railways and canals, is weary of the political game and would like to have been appointed before now lieutenant governor of Ontario. He will accept that position at the first opportunity.

Dr. Roache, minister of the interior, though somewhat improved in health by his trip abroad, is far from being a well man and would be glad to relinquish the cares of office.

AS TO QUEBEC'S STATUS.

It is generally recognized that the Quebec wing of the government must be strengthened. Even the staunchest Conservatives admit that that is imperative and declare that the government would not have the ghost of a chance in Quebec against Laurier and his lieutenants with the present ministers from that province. The only French-Canadian of conspicuous ability in the present administration is Hon. L. P. Pelletier. Everybody admits his cleverness but instead of directing his attention to strengthening the party generally in this province he has devoted his attention almost entirely to making himself personally solid in the Quebec district, by means of great public works, etc.

The big dry docks at Levis and other contracts have strengthened his position in that particular locality, but at the same time have created much dissatisfaction amongst those who thought that they should have a finger in the pie. Mr. Pelletier's intention at the next election is to contest Quebec county but to run for the County of Levis.

Hon. Bruno Nantel is now regarded in the light of an impossibility as a political force, being entirely without

MONTREAL WEEKLY MARKET REPORT

POTATOES FIRM

Montreal, Nov. 5.—Although prices for a few of the less important articles of daily consumption, such as sugars, Valencia raisins and canned tomatoes, have registered a decline within the past fortnight, the majority of the more material commodities have either advanced or held very firm. Among the latter may be mentioned butter, cheese, eggs, hay and oats and meats. Eggs are now selling wholesale at 42 cents per dozen for the best quality.

The market for potatoes is firm with a good demand and sales of car lots of Green Mountains are 85c and and Quebec varieties are 75c per bag track.

BALED HAY MOVING WELL


A good local and United States demand for baled hay continues with sales of car lots No. 1 hay or spot at \$15.50 to \$16, extra good No. 2 at \$14.50 to \$15 and No. 3 hay at \$13.50 to \$14 per ton on track.

OAT MARKET QUIET

The local market for coarse grain is without any new feature, prices being steady with some business passing in oats in car lots at 41c for No. 2 Canadian Western, 40c, No. 3 S. W. and at 38c for No. 1 feed in car lots ex store.

BUTTER HIGHER AGAIN

The butter market is again higher with finest creamery at 27c to 27½c second grades, 25½c to 26½c; dairy butter, 22c to 23c.

TEACHERS PLAN WAGE FIGHT

St. Louis, Mo., Nov. 6.—An organized movement to secure better salaries for Missouri school teachers is likely to be launched at the annual convention of the Missouri State Teachers' Association, which convened in this city today with a record breaking attendance. The convention will continue three days and already bids fair to be the most important in the history of the association.

In addition to the question of salaries, the convention will give its attention to the educational outlook in Missouri, betterment of the rural schools, vocational training and the subject of industrial education.

State Superintendent William P. Evans, president of the association, called the gathering to order this morning and Archbishop Glennon delivered an address of welcome. Prominent educators to be heard at the subsequent sessions include President E. B. Bryan of Colgate University, Dr. Earl Barnes of Philadelphia, C. A. Prosser, secretary of the society, for the promotion of Industrial Education, and Dr. P. P. Claxton, United States Commissioner of Education.

ILLINOIS WOMEN TO TALK POLITICS

Peoria, Ill., Nov. 6.—Unusual enthusiasm characterized the proceedings today at the opening of the forty-fifth annual convention of the Illinois Equal Suffrage Association by State President Mrs. Grace Wilbus Trout. It is the first annual gathering since the great victory of the Illinois suffragists last spring, when the state legislature granted to them the right to vote on all but state tickets and it is quite natural that the delegates representing the woman suffrage organizations of the state should feel elated over their success. Yet, a spirit of seriousness seemed to pervade the gathering and the president and the other speakers

were loudly applauded when they sought to impress upon the delegates the necessity to perfect the political organization of the women of Illinois and to teach them more fully the responsibilities of the newly gained franchise and the best use to make of their right.

The convention will remain in session three days and the program for the daily sessions general as well as departmental, include addresses by a number of noted men and women closely identified with the suffrage movement, among them Governor Dunne of Illinois, Miss Jane Addams, Dr. Lucy White, Mrs. Medill McCormick, Mrs. Harriet Taylor Thadwell, Mrs. George W. Plummer, Mrs. Florence Bennett Peterson, Catherine Waugh McCulloch and a number of others.
