AFTERNOON SESSION

Yesterday afternoon's session opened as near on time as possible with the usual exercises and with the reading and adopting of the minutes. Rev. J. E. Wilson presented his report as superintendent of the Adult Department of the Province. He supplemented his written report by some remarks on the weakness of our organizations.

After singing a hymn Rev. W. A. Ross addressed the Convention on The Rural Church Problem in New Brunswick. Rev. R. J. Colpitts of Macquac opened the discussion on this important topic. A. C. M. Lawson, R. B. Wallace, Rev. W. A. Ross, J. J. Jordon and Rev. C. G. Pincombe followed giving brief crisp remarks. Rev. F. McElfresh Ph.D. then gave his inspiring talk on The Rural Sunday School. This final address was the most eloquent and earnest of the many given at the Convention. At the close of the address the Convention tendered its thanks and appreciation to McElfresh which was feelingly reciprocated.

The offering taken Rev. F. S. Porter of St. John gave his fine address on the Sunday School and the City Problem. It was one of the best at the Convention.

prestige or influence in the province. He will shortly retire from the government and take a seat on the Railway Commission in place of Hon. M. E. Bernier, whose term is almost up.

CODERRE FOR THE BENCH.

Hon. Louis Coderre, though personally popular with everybody, has no political following and besides, he is tired of the political game and would welcome an opportunity to take a seat on the Bench. He has been offered the postmastership of Montreal, Mr. Taillon having expressed a willingness to retire. Mr. Coderre has declined that post, his desire being to be made a judge. In fact, when he accepted a position in the Borden cabinet, it was on the distinct understanding that he would get a judicial appointment, as soon as he desired it.

The new ministers for Quebec, when Messrs. Nantel and Coderre retire, will undoubtedly be Hon. Thomas Chab Casgrain, K.C., and L. T. Marchal. The plan is that Mr. Casgrain shall run in Terrebonne and that Mr. Marchal will seek election in Hochelaga.

Mr. Marchal, it is felt, would have little difficulty in carrying a constituency like Hochelaga, which is strongly Conservative. This gentleman would today be a member of the Borden government if he had so desired. It is well known that his appointment to succeed Mr. Monk had been made, and the governor general was waiting to swear him into office when he put his foot squarely down and declared that under the circumstances he would not think of accepting a minor office in the cabinet and that in the interests of his countrymen, he must have a portfolio as important as the one which Mr. Monk relinquished.

SIR RODOLPHE FORGET, TOO.

There is also talk of further increasing the Quebec representation in the cabinet by the appointment of Sir Rodolphe Forget as minister without portfolio. Sir Rodolphe it is now well known to those on the

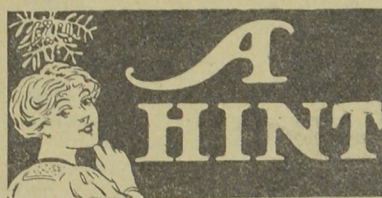
