Neil McLaughlin and this morning the remains were taken by steamer Victoria to Lakeville Corners, where interment is to be made Saturday morning.

BOARD OF HEALTH  
CONFIRMS ITS ACTION  
RE SCHOOL PLUMBING

On Advice of Secretary Mullin of Provincial Board No Further Action Will be Taken--St Mary's Slaughter-Houses Criticized

The Fredericton Board of Health, at a special session held last night, decided on the advice of Dr. B. M. Mullin, secretary of the Provincial Board of Health, to take no further action with regard to the plumbing at the York Street School, in view of the fact that the School Board has agreed to make required alterations should defects be found. The local union of Journeymen Plumbers has complained that the plumbing at the York Street School has not been done in compliance with provincial regulations and has not been passed by the plumbing inspector of the local board. The union has threatened to apply for an injunction. Fred H. Peters is the union's solicitor. What action will be taken in view of the decision of the Board of Health will be decided shortly.

## THOSE PRESENT.

Members present were Chairman J. M. Wiley, G. N. Dibblee, Edward Moore, Peter Farrell and D. J. Shea.

There were also present Dr. B. M. Mullin, secretary of the Provincial Board of Health; Health Inspector Wm. McKay and Plumbing Inspector George Edney.

## YORK ST. SCHOOL PLUMBING.

Dr. Mullin explained to the board that he had not been able to attend the two preceding meetings of the board but would like to take up the matter of the complaint of the plumbers' union in connection with the plumbing at the York Street School. The members of the board severally expressed their opinions, after which Dr. Mullin advised that no further action be taken by the Board of Health at this time in view of the board having accepted the guarantee of the School Board that if any defect be found they would promptly remedy the same. He would consider it inadvisable to proceed any further in the matter at this time.

On the motion of Mr. Moore, seconded by Mr. Shea, the following was adopted:

From Fredericton for Five Cents a  
Ton--Rate to Fredericton Will  
Be 80 Cents

The manufacturers of Fredericton and others who were led to believe that the construction of the Fredericton and Grand Lake Railway by the aid of public money would mean cheap coal for them, are likely to be grievously disappointed over the schedule of rates recently made public. It will be remembered that the new railway was assisted by the province with a bond guarantee of \$15,000 a mile besides a double subsidy from the Dominion government.

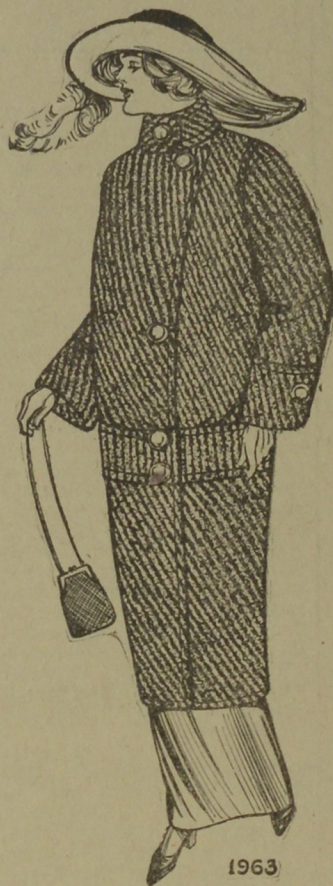

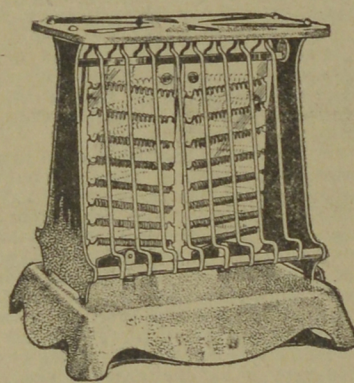
