LIBERALS AND MACDONALD, MAN.

Winnipeg, Nov. 25.—Though it is taken for granted here that Mr. R. L. Richardson will be offered the Liberal nomination for Macdonald in the by-election rendered necessary through the unseating of Alex. Morrison, his former opponent, it is not thought probable he will accept. Mr. Richardson is busily engaged at present in settling his paper, the "Tribune," in a six-story building, and it is said he would find a difficulty in taking the time necessary to fight a strenuous by-election.

The suggestion is made that the Liberals and Grain Growers may compromise on a candidate, though nothing has been said as to the identity of the man. There appears to be little doubt that Mr. Morrison will again be the Conservative candidate.

No arrangements have yet been made for nomination conventions, but they will be called at once, with the election less than three weeks away. The only certainty is that there will be no acclamation for anybody.

SHAUGHNESSY IS OPTIMISTIC

Montreal, Nov. 26.—Sir Thomas Shaughnessy is quoted in an interview as giving the following opinion on the outlook in Canada:

"The pause in the flow of money into Canada has been beneficial in that it has enforced on Canadians that careful and economical handling of money in business and in private affairs which has been the real secret of Canada's past prosperity.

"The flow of immigration into Canada cannot cease, for it is due to economic conditions which show no signs of changing. Wages, the price of good land, and the opportunity for work are all in favor of Canada as compared with Great Britain and Europe; and the United States, our former competitor for this immigration is now inclined rather to restrict than encourage any further influx. The poorest laborer coming into a new country such as Canada is the incarnation of capital for he brings with him the capacity to work and to transform some undeveloped natural resource into a thing that can be used; and thus he by his labor creates wealth.

"Canada therefore must, welcome the immigrant for many years to come, and must continue to provide increased facilities of transportation, colonization and housing. To provide such facilities, the European capitalist and the investor will, in my opinion, continue to furnish the money, for, owing to the propaganda carried on by the dominion and the provincial governments, the Canadian Pacific Railway and other industrial bodies, for labor and for the profitable investment of capital, the opportunities in Canada are thoroughly realized across water and it is only the temporary financial stringency, due chiefly to the Balkan war, which has caused any apparent slackening of such investment."

GLOOMY OUTLOOK ON STEEL TRADE

New York, Nov. 26.—It is by no means certain that the long lane of depression has as yet been left behind. The views expressed by Mr. Chas. M. Schwab are far from being bullish. He goes on record again insisting that "this country faces the most serious depression it has ever known—a condition effected by the new Democratic tariff.

"The transportation rate," continued Mr. Schwab, "between Bethlehem, Pa., and New York is as great as that between Rotterdam and New York. It was true, when Mr. Andrew Carnegie said it, that the cost of steel production in this country was so much cheaper here that we could compete with the world and win, but conditions have changed. (Patents which were held in this country have run out and are in operation abroad. The cost of making steel has become just about standardized all over the world. And with cheaper transportation under the new tariff other countries can more than successfully compete with us in many lines."

WEATHER PROPHETS

Cat's fur is full of electricity, and before a thunderstorm a cat is always extremely lively and playful, probably on account of its electrical condition. Before rain is expected you will see a cat assiduously washing its face.

Donkeys will bray loudly and continuously at the approach of a storm. If cows lie down in the early morning instead of feeding, or huddle together with their tails to windward, then there is rain about. Like cats, the approach of a thunderstorm makes cows extremely frisky. They run up and down the field and butt imaginary obstacles at such times.

Sheep turn their heads to the wind when the day is going to be fine. But if they graze with their tails to windward it is a sure sign of rain, so experienced shepherds say. Like cows, too, they show an unusual liveliness at the approach of a storm. Even the sedate pig is watched by country weather prophets, for it is always uneasy when rain is coming.

Most birds are restless when a change is expected. Rain is indicated by guinea-fowls and peacocks squalling, by parrots whistling, and by pigeons returning home unusually early.

Ordeal to Regain Caste

It is astonishing the belief natives of southern India have in their "caste," and what they will do to regain it if lost. A certain day in the year is set aside for the ceremony of regaining "caste." An enclosure about twenty feet square is fenced off, and in this logs of wood are burned, the ashes of which are kept redhot by continual fanning.

Those going through the ceremony have to wash themselves in the river about a mile away; then, with strings of flowers hanging round their necks, they run to the enclosure. By the time they reach it the redhot ashes have been raked all over the floor and the idol of whatever caste they belong to has been placed on a platform at one end. In rush the "casteless" barefooted, without the slightest hesitation, and dance round and round on the redhot ashes until they drop from exhaustion and are dragged out by their friends. Before going through this painful ceremony of regaining "caste" a man is first supposed to fast for at least three days.

At the British Association Prof. W. H. Cadman, an archaeologist, announced that he had discovered the old Egyptian secret in poultry-breeding.
