SUSPECT TAKEN

BACK TODAY

George R. Leavitt Wanted for Twelve Burglaries in Bangor and Oldtown ---Not so Defiant as at Time of Arrest

George R. Leavitt, arrested here yesterday morning on the charge of breaking and entering at Oldtown, Me., left for that place this morning in the charge of Town Marshal Avery of Oldtown. Detective James Roberts of this city, accompanied them. Leavitt is wanted in connection with twelve burglaries which have taken place recently in Oldtown and Bangor. The one for which he has been arrested occurred at the establishment of Bickmore Gail Co., which was broken into the night of Monday last, November 24, and the cash register rifled. About \$200 was stolen. This money was in bills of the denominations of \$10, \$5 and \$1 with some silver. The bills were American and many of them issued by Bangor banks so that identification is not difficult. Marshal Avery felt confident that Leavitt could be proved guilty. Up to within a few days Leavitt, he says, was hanging around Oldtown without money and poorly clothed. After arriving in Fredericton he bought many articles of clothing and jewelry, paying with American money. He also deposited \$140 in American bills with the clerk of the Queen Hotel, where he registered.

Leavitt protested his innocence of the charge but yesterday and last night was not so defiant and told stories about himself that were contradictory. At one time he said his father was dead and at another that he was a cigar-maker.

OPERATION OF

NEW C.P.R. BRANCHES

BEGINS MONDAY

Supt. A. Sherwood Over Southampton Branch Today---Time-Table to be Announced Later---Fredericton-Norlon Service as Forecasted

The operation by the C.P.R. of two important and recently constructed branch lines, the Southampton Railway and the Fredericton & Grand Lake Railway, will begin on Monday. The time-table for the train-service on the Southampton Railway has not yet been announced and Supt. A. Sherwood of this city, is going over that line today with a view toward making arrangements. On the other line the train-service will be as has been announced.

The Fredericton & Grand Lake Railway will be operated together with the New Brunswick Coal & Railway Company line as one division. A through train will be run each way daily between Fredericton and Norton. There also will be a train daily each way between Fredericton and Chipman. Both services will prove of great value to Fredericton as the country opened up formerly was difficult to reach from this city, although well settled. At Chipman there also will be connection with the trains of the Grand Trunk Pacific. A large business, both freight and passenger, is expected. A Board of Trade excursion is to be run over a portion of the line as far as Minto next week.

The Fredericton & Grand Lake Railway and the New Brunswick Coal & Railway Company line will be operated under those names but together will form the Central Route of the
