Spinners there have followed with close attention the development of the growth of the flax plant in Western Canada, and are desirous of receiving shipments of the fibre if it can be obtained on competitive terms with supplies from other sources. Some three years ago a few small trial shipments of unretted flax fibre were sent from Canada. Mr. J. M. Mussen, Canadian trade commissioner at Leeds says consumers express their readiness to give their consideration to offers that may be received at any time from Canadian firms interested in seeking export markets for this fibre.

SUCCESSFUL DAIRYING

Depends to Large Extent Upon Knowing Individual Worth of Cows

There are such excellent concrete examples now and again outcropping of men who prove that it pays to take up cow testing, that their records of success make stimulating reading for dairy farmers all over the Dominion.

Here is a good example of what one man at Cedar Hall, Quebec, in the Gaspé Peninsula, accomplished by carefully watching his fairly good cows and feeding them better. The first year his eight cows gave him 33,511 pounds of milk, an average of 4,188 pounds, at a feed cost of \$32.50, netting a total profit of \$76.82, an average of \$9.60 profit per cow. Two of the best cows in the herd the first year were lost accidentally, two heifers made up the herd to eight again; a pure bred sire is kept.

The next year his eight cows gave him 41,408 pounds of milk, an average of 5,176 pounds, or 1,000 pounds of an increase per cow. The feed cost \$4.12 more per cow, but the total profit was \$177.29, or an increase of 130 per cent. in the profit. It pays to give additional feed if the cows kept are of the type to make use of it profitably.

The forcible realities are these: The gross income from milk increased by \$133.43 from the same number of cows, the profit far more than doubled, and the owner has received every encouragement to try for still better results. That is where a trial cow testing trip generally lands the herd owner.

Shooting Oil Wells

Keen interest is being taken in the development of the Manitoulin oil fields by Senator Poirer and representatives from all the chief centres on the Island assembled at Green Bay to witness the shooting of some of the wells. E. A. Stokes, of Petrolia, was on hand, and a fuse was lighted, and a sharp shock was felt and the earth trembled, from the mouth of the pipe a greyish liquid shot into the air to a height of about eighty feet and fell gracefully to the ground. This was followed immediately by a second gush of a watery liquid which ascended to a height of about a hundred feet. About fifteen quarts of nitro-glycerine were used in shooting the well.

VANISHING WILD LIFE

Many Species of Birds Rapidly Becoming Extinct

"To date there are eleven species of North American birds that have been exterminated by 'civilized' man since 1840," says Dr. Wm. T. Hornaby, director of New York Zoological Park, "and there are twenty-three other species of birds pressing each other closely for the sad distinction of being first to lengthen the list of extinct species." Only one living specimen of the carrier pigeon is now known to exist yet formerly wagon loads were poured into the market. Dr. Hornaby has no hesitation in placing responsibility for this wholesale destruction on man. "There are," he declares, "probably millions of people who do not realize that man is the most persistently wicked and wasteful of all predatory animals. Others kill only what they think they can consume. If something is by chance left over, it goes to satisfy the hunger of the humbler creatures of prey." From one end of the continent to the other there is a resistless desire to kill.

TO HUNT FOR ANDREE

Norwegian to Probe Stories Concerning Explorer's Fate

Christian Leden, the young Swedish explorer, who brought back from Northwest Canada in 1911 Eskimo stories which apparently threw additional light on the supposed fate of Professor Andree, will spend another year and a half or two years in exploration of that far northern district. Mr. Leden said he expected to obtain further information regarding Andree, the scientist, who started in a balloon for the North Pole in 1897.

The explorer has a full description of all instruments in Andree's equipment, and will be able to identify any such articles that he may find in the Eskimos' possession. The stories previously told him related to the descent from the sky of a "large bubble" containing two people, thought by the Eskimos to be devils, one of whom was killed by arrows and the other left to his fate when the natives became frightened and fled.

Cement Mushrooms

Among the most uncommon uses to which concrete has been put in Belgium is the making of mushrooms for decorating gardens, and dwarfish figures of gnomes for supporting the garden seats. If the imagination were sufficiently elastic, it might be presumed that the gnomes had pillaged the mushroom garden at night and, to escape detection, had crawled under the seat, where they became concrete images.
