FARMERS SHOULD STUDY MARKETING

For some time past we have been losing many thousands of dollars on our poultry because we have not been fattening our fowls properly. The marketing of lean chickens is wasteful and yet comparatively few farmers attempt to fatten them at all. Much less attention is given in this country to the appearance of market poultry than abroad, where it is customary to use shaping cranes weights and other devices to render the dressed fowls attractive. On the other hand, some improvement is being made in Canada and this progress is pleasing. If farmers and poultrymen would take as much interest in marketing dressed poultry as they do in marketing eggs, much better conditions would prevail.

That which is most necessary in the improvement of the Canadian poultry industry is improved stock. Although improvement has been made in methods of fattening, killing and dressing poultry, still the best success will only be made when the quality of the stock on the farm is vastly improved. The two most profitable branches of poultry farming are: First, the trade in new-laid eggs, and, second, the marketing of dressed poultry. A portion of the poultry in all communities is of a good table quality and fairly well fattened when marketed. This portion varies greatly in different localities. Where Plymouth Rocks and Wyandottes and Rhode Island Reds predominate, the average quality of the packer's output is higher than in communities in which smaller or Leghorn breeds are kept. The American breeds, along with the Orpingtons, are the producers alike require some education.

A vast amount of poultry is still being prepared for the larger markets in a careless and haphazard manner, not graded as to size or quality, not uniform in shape or size, and all very unattractive in appearance. These are conditions which must be overcome and educational work is necessary. It is along this line that the Dominion government should take action, for, if anything is to be done, the government should lead the way. Herein lie many opportunities of which the government should take advantage.

IN SASKATCHEWAN.

For a number of years the government of Saskatchewan has been operating poultry fattening stations in connection with their creameries. The purpose of the fattening station was:

First, to obtain information on the cost of fattening chickens; second, to ascertain the feeling of the trade with respect to milk-fed chickens; third, to learn what price could be obtained for that class of poultry; fourth, to show the farmers how they might, with very little cost and trouble, fatten their birds at home; fifth, to study the best methods of killing, plucking and preparing them for market. The government erected a few stations and undertook to supervise the work of killing and preparing the birds for the trade and also to find a suitable market and make payments direct to the farmers who supplied the poultry.

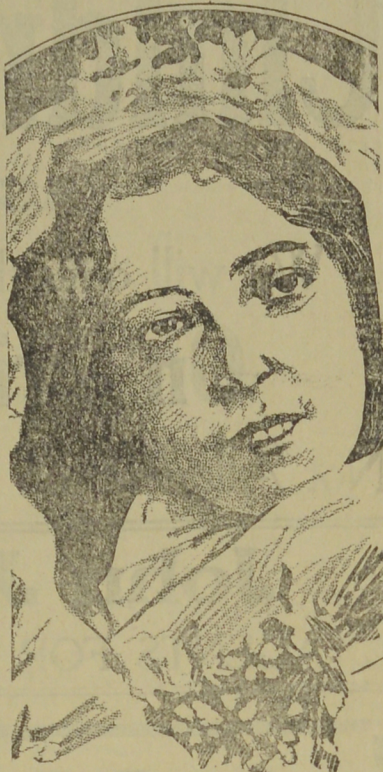

VARIATIONS IN MILK FAT

They Show That Cows Should be Tested at Frequent Intervals

Frequent experiments have shown that one single test of a cow's milk is not reliable as an indication of what percentage of fat her milk normally contains. A great many well known causes affect the test, also some causes that are unknown at present even by the closest students. This "variation in the test" is one of the puzzles of the cow's individuality, and because of these puzzling variations it is advisable to take composite samples at intervals so as to ascertain the average test.

Some painstaking investigations at one of the dairy research stations in England, with seven cows for two days, even covering such details as a separate test of eleven successive pints, three times a day, from the four quarters of the udder, show that while thirty pounds of milk per day was 3.6 per cent, the variation was all the way from only six-tenths of one per cent. up to nine and a half per cent. of fat.

This is clear proof of how misleading one single test may be. If the real earning capacity of each individual cow is to be computed, it must be on the basis of her annual production of milk and fat less the cost of feed; regular weighing and testing give that knowledge which every factory patron should have of each cow he keeps.

The Sheep Pays

Money invested in sheep will nearly double itself in one year, since the fleece will pay for the feed and care of the sheep, and the lambs, often two per ewe, are the profit. It is estimated that ten sheep may be kept where one cow may, and the risk is much less. It may be said that the sheep always carries her pocketbook with her. If she dies, her pelt or fleece pays her funeral expenses. If she lives, her wool in the spring and her lambs in the fall pay double revenue. No other stock pays as large a percentage of clear profit on the money invested. Nothing else will build up a rundown farm as quickly as a flock of sheep. While pasturing, the sheep's manure is distributed about so evenly that no manure spreader could equal the sheep in its work.

Poultry Industry

The value of the poultry industry to New Zealand was stated at a conference of poultrymen to be two millions sterling per annum, this sum changing hands for products, produce and materials in order to keep the industry going. The average price of eggs and table poultry was fully 50 per cent. higher than it was ten years ago. Five years ago the total count on one hand the number of persons engaged in poultry farming for a living. Now they could be numbered by the score. Farmers too, were giving poultry their attention, since they were realizing that the high prices received for eggs and table birds made the keeping of poultry a valuable adjunct to farm pursuits.

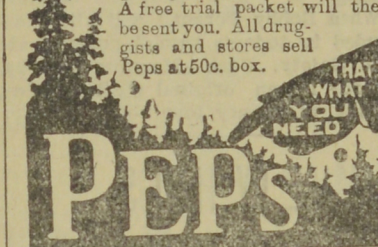

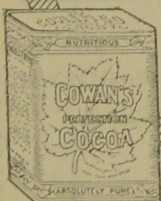
